Famous Socialist Lectures on War

Walter Thomas Mills Lays Blame on "Money Loaners and Industrial Tyrants."

Walter Thomas Mills, the famous Socialist lecturer, spoke to a fair sized audience in Arion hall, Second and Oak streets, last night on "The War in Europe." He said the war is being fought between a group of money loaners "with its head in London and its headquarters in the United States," and a group of industrial tyrants in Berlin with Germany in its grip. The cost of the war in money to date in Europe had not equalled the cost to the American people of the ground rent paid by all the American people to a small handful of Americans and foreigners for permission to live, work and do business in the United States. Tonight he will speak on "What to Do Now."

Huerta Will Put Up Own Cash as Bond

Plans to Take Necessary \$15,000 from Funds in Bank; Others Accused of Violating U. S. Neutrality.

El Paso, Texas, July 6.—(U. P.)—General Victoriano Huerta today declared he would provide bail for himself from cash in a local bank. This is the first opportunity Huerta has had to gain access to his personal funds since he was rearrested Saturday on a charge of conspiring to violate the neutrality of the United States by starting a new revolution in Mexico. He plans to offer \$15,000 of his own money, as bond, but it is understood that the five other men in jail with the former dictator will not be able to raise bonds and will remain in custody. If Huerta is bound over to the grand jury when he is arraigned here next Monday, it is understood he will be tried at San Antonio.

Automobile Tire Is Life Preserver

Roseburg, Or., July 6.—Miss Maude Wilhoit came near drowning and pulling her companion, Fred Dillard, to a watery grave yesterday when Miss Wilhoit became exhausted as the couple was attempting to swim from shore to a float anchored out in the river at Alexander's park. Although hundreds of others were present, the couple's cries for help were thought to have been in vain, and were not heeded for some time, when three young men came to the rescue with an inflated automobile tire and floated the couple to shore.

Forest Grove, Or., July 5.—Word has reached this city of the death of Mrs. Colista B. Smith at the home of her daughter, Mrs. Minnie Peach, at Cleveland, Minn. Mrs. Smith was 95 years of age, and had made her home in Forest Grove for the past quarter of a century, going east to visit her daughter about three months ago.
