

REPRESENTATIVE HERE OF MONTENEGRO PUTS UP \$20,000 IN CASH

Joco Macanovich Arrested
With P. M. Luburich Has
Ample Funds.

TO BE HEARD AT CHICAGO

Charge In Violation of Neutrality of
United States in Soliciting
Reservists for Army.

With utmost nonchalance Joco Macanovich, personal representative of the king of Montenegro, and his private secretary, P. M. Luburich, today handed United States Commissioner Drake a certified check for \$20,000 as bonds to secure their liberty pending formal hearing of the Chicago charge of violating the neutrality of the United States, for which they were arrested here yesterday afternoon.

The money was forthcoming as soon as the bank opened this morning in answer to a lengthy telegram sent east last night by Macanovich through the agency of the local British consulate. At the time it was learned that in addition to a heavy letter of credit which Macanovich carried, he has on deposit in New York not less than \$25,000 in gold.

The men were arrested as they stepped from a British train yesterday afternoon on a complaint sworn to by Deputy United States Attorney Everett Johnson, who was acting on telegraphic advice from Chicago that the men were wanted on indictments returned by the federal grand jury there.

Charge Denied.
They were charged with recruiting Montenegrins in the United States in violation of the country's neutrality, and in this connection Luburich, speaking for his chief today, declared the charge would not hold water.

"Mr. Macanovich was the personal secretary of the king," said Luburich, and he knows international law. For four years he represented Montenegro in Constantinople. We have violated no neutrality. During the 25 days we have been on the road we have recruited reservists to go to Canada, thence to Montenegro to join the colors. Montenegrins who have taken out naturalization papers have not been approached. Neither have the reservists seen by us been ordered to return. We could not compel them to, have only requested them to go. Transportation has been paid by us to Canada. Thus far we have visited Minnesota, Montana and Washington, and as a result of our work probably 3000 reservists have gone to Canada. In Montana we were particularly successful.

In Washington state, Roslyn was one of the last places we visited, and we plan now to continue our mission and go to California as soon as we learn when we are wanted in Chicago. This is an international matter, and we desire to have an extension of time for hearing on the complaint so we can complete our work."

Dr. to the lateness of the hour when they were arrested no bonds could be furnished last night, and the men spent the night in the county jail. They took their confinement with good grace, and as soon as the bank opened were taken to it by Deputy Marshal Fuller and Perry, who had arrested them yesterday.

While they were signing their bonds and preparing to take their departure with several local officials, the men were surrounded by a group of men who spoke with pronounced German accent close and listened to every bit of conversation. They did not give their names. One attempted to engage Macanovich in conversation in German which he speaks well, but the Montenegrin flashed him a knowing smile and paid no further attention.

In granting bonds, Commissioner Drake fixed the date for hearing at July 15. Both men objected strenuously, explaining that they had to complete their mission and did not wish to remain over in Portland.

May Waive Bonds.
It was finally made plain to them that they can waive hearing and make a return direct to Chicago and apparently satisfied that they would be able to postpone action here they signed acknowledgment of service and handed over their certified check.

Johnson today telegraphed the federal officials there acquainting them with action of the office here. Meanwhile the Montenegrins will remain in Portland only long enough to see their way clear to depart for California. That they believe they are within their rights was made very clear by Luburich and he also let it be known that he and Macanovich plan to continue their activities.

Macanovich has been in the United States about seven weeks, according to Luburich, Luburich, on the other hand, has been in the United States for three years. They started west from New York.

"Montenegro is against Austria," he declared today. "We intend to put up the strongest fight we know how and naturally we want all the loyal sons of our country back home to fight against the common foe."

A special train of four cars bearing 147 Montenegrin army reservists en route to Canada from Arizona passed through Portland today. The train arrived early and was held until about 11 o'clock, when it continued on its way toward the border. The local federal officials received no word to hold the train, although it is known that the government has knowledge concerning it. Whether the train will be stopped before it reaches the border could not be learned here.

Many Will Enlist Soon.

Seattle, July 7.—(P. N. S.)—As a result of the activities of Jovan Macanovich, personal representative of King Nicholas of Montenegro, more than 60 men are in Seattle today ready to go to either Vancouver or Victoria to enlist and embark for Cettinje, according to statements made by local

CATHEDRAL AT ARRAS DESTROYED BY FIRE OF BIG GERMAN GUNS

Shelling Necessary, Says Official Report, to Drive Out French Troops.

Berlin, via Wireless to Saville, L. I., July 7.—(U. P.)—The cathedral at Arras was set on fire and practically destroyed during bombardment of the town by German artillery, an official statement announced today. It was explained that it was necessary to shell Arras because great bodies of French troops had been concentrated there.

It was admitted that the English captured a German trench to the north of Ypres, but the position was said to have been re-occupied after a counter attack delivered during last night.

Continuing the statement said: "West of Souchez, two French attacks were repulsed."

"Between the Meuse and Moselle lively fighting is in progress. Half way between the Ally woods and the Aprumont forest, German troops stormed nearly a mile of positions."

"The French continued their efforts to re-take positions captured by our troops about Eparges. They succeeded first in entering a portion of our trenches, but counter attacks regained all positions, excepting a sector of one hundred yards."

Montenegrins. Many others from various parts of the northwest, it is stated, are also preparing to answer Macanovich's call to the service of Montenegro.

Leaders in Seattle's Montenegrin colony make it plain that these men are not traveling in a body, but are proceeding singly to the point of mobilization. In view of the arrest of Macanovich at Portland yesterday, however, it is believed that immigrant authorities will likely endeavor to prevent Montenegrin reservists from leaving the United States.

Seattle Montenegrins assert that Macanovich's real object in visiting various cities in the United States was to raise funds for the Red Cross work in Europe, and declare that he has succeeded in raising more than \$100,000 in this country. They draw the distinction that Macanovich's purpose was to remain in Montenegro and their duty to their country rather than to raise an army.

Denies Recruiting of Army.

Seattle, Wash., July 7.—(U. P.)—Djavar Ljankovitch, who says he is the spokesman of Jovan Macanovich, arrested in Portland yesterday charged with violating neutrality laws, denies Macanovich was here to recruit an army.

"It was only to remind the men in this country subject to military duty and those who were not, as well, that their country would need them in the near future. He did not offer articles or any kind of written agreement for them to sign," Ljankovitch said.

Macanovich aroused his countrymen while in this state, as indicated by the fact that more than half of the 700 Montenegrins in Washington have enlisted.

JURY IN "CASHIER" COMPANY CASE MAY BE READY TODAY

Work of Selecting Talesmen
Still Progressing in the
Federal Court.

SEVERAL MEN EXCUSED

Government Attorney May Be Able to
Make Opening Address This
Afternoon.

When noon adjournment was taken in the United States Cashier million dollar fraud trial in federal court today, just three of the prospective jurors passed for cause at yesterday's examination remained in the box. The remainder, and several others drawn this morning, had been excused on peremptory challenges, nine by the defense and two by the government. The majority excused by the defense were farmers.

When court reconvened at 2 this afternoon the defense had one peremptory challenge remaining and the government two, these two applicable, however, only to new talesmen, as it had twice waived its third peremptory during the forenoon. There was no doubt but that the opening statement for the government would be made before adjournment tonight by United States Attorney Reames, who, with his deputy, John Beckman, is handling the case for the United States.

Contentions Are Waged.

The government has nine principal contentions to substantiate its charges of use of the mails to defraud. Those which Reames will state range from assertions that the company doctored its accounts, published false advertisements of financial condition and arbitrarily raised the price of stock from par \$10 to \$20 per share, to foot people into believing it valuable, to charges that the \$1,000,000 secured from stock sales went, not to benefit the company, but to line the pockets of officials and agents working on commissions.

The 12 veniremen passed when noon adjournment was taken included Hugh Carol, a local grocer, William Fleming, a Silverton realty man, and J. D. Kelly, a farmer of The Dalles, the three veniremen who have thus far escaped peremptories. The others were Frank Christiananson, farmer, Gresham; William Adelle, baker, Portland; George T. Frater, Hood River; A. Allard, Portland, salesman; J. V. Zan, Portland, manufacturer; H. C. Bressler, Salem, retired; Frank Dayton, Portland, merchant; David M. Lamb, Portland, retired hardware man, and Harry Francis of Hood River.

Subject to Challenges.

When adjournment was taken yesterday, the first day of the trial, the jury box subject to challenge later, were:

R. D. Inman, president of the Inman-Poulson Lumber company, Portland; Charles A. Lewis, collection teller of the First National bank, Portland; E. E. Hewitt, farmer, of Monticello, Or.; Hugh Carroll, grocer, in Killingsworth avenue, Portland; Carl A. Carlson, cabinetmaker, 328 Clackamas street, Portland; P. P. Olds, hop grower, Yamhill county; J. W. Welfinsmith, of Forest Grove; C. C. Geer, cattleman, Waldo Hills; William Fleming, real estate and insurance business, Salem; C. L. Kelly, retired stockman, Newberg; Alex. Aitkin, motorman, 326 Thurman street, Portland, and J. D. Kelly, retired farmer, The Dalles.

But they rapidly faded out of the case. Judge Bean made the rule that the defense should have two peremptory challenges to give the government one until the defense had eight and government four, and then the defense should have one and the government one until the jury reached the limit, 10 for the defendants and six for the prosecution.

Carlson and Aitkin were thereupon excused by the defense and Reames followed by challenging Inman, who yesterday, during examination, declared Cakes & Cakes, now with the defense, had been his attorneys for 30 years and he naturally would give more credence to Judge Cakes than any other man, involved in the trial. Hewitt and Wirtz next retired at the hands of the defendants and the government excused C. C. Geer, a relative of Oregon's former governor of the same name.

Two Others Excused.

Ed Washburn, an accountant of Albany, who had been called this morning, and P. P. Olds, a hop grower of Yamhill county, were the next two excused by the defense, and the government then waived its third peremptory and George Harrow, a Hillsboro farmer, Charles Lewis, and C. J. Littlepage, a farmer of Mosier, were challenged by the defense, bringing up their total to nine.

Dan Malarky, attorney for the defendant, Gernert, interrogated the veniremen today, and yesterday he and Thomas Fitzgerald divided the jury.

Thus far 29 veniremen have been examined. Six have been challenged for cause, and 11 removed by peremptory challenge. Of those challenged, four were rejected against the seven men on trial, while two declared that personal friendship either for a defendant or for an attorney for the defense was such that it might stand in the way of their judgment.

Mrs. Nevada Pearl Plummer, wife of N. E. Plummer, inspector of buildings of this city, died this morning at 9 o'clock, at the residence of her sister, Mrs. W. F. Henne, 144 East Fifteenth street. She had been ill for the past two years, and her passing away was not unexpected.

Mrs. Plummer was 30 years of age, a native of Michigan, and had resided in Columbus, Ohio, until about 10 years ago, when she came to Portland. She is survived by her husband and her two children, Nada and Catherine. Her mother, Mrs. Margaret Christian, was with her to the last. Mrs. Carl Monroe of this city is a sister, and H. J. Christian her only brother.

RATE REDUCTION WILL HAVE LITTLE EFFECT ON TRAFFIC

Order Applies to Southern
Pacific's East and West
Side Yamhill Divisions.

Reduction of the arbitrary local rates from Portland to Willamette valley points on transcontinental freight business, recently ordered by the commission, will result in no perceptible change in the movement of traffic, in the opinion of J. H. Lothrop, secretary of the transportation bureau of the chamber of commerce. On receiving the text of the decision today Mr. Lothrop learned that the rate reductions apply only to freight of the first four classifications and to those commodity rates that now apply to Portland only.

The order applies to all stations on the Southern Pacific's east side, west side and Yamhill divisions, the reductions varying from 25 to 33 per cent. The new rates, on the basis of Albany, the farthest point up the valley in which the tariffs apply, are: First class, 20 cents; second, 16 cents; third, 14 cents; fourth, 12 cents. These supplant the rates of 28, 25, 21 and 19 cents, respectively. Rates to nearer points are proportional.

Most of the commodities that move under these rate classifications are shipped from eastern points, and, anyway, Mr. Lothrop stated. It is not expected that the lower rates will stimulate further movement.

Longshoremen at Seattle on Strike

Two Hundred and Twenty Go Out
Because Stevedores Refuse to Apply
Closed Shop Principles to Work.

Seattle, July 7.—(P. N. S.)—One hundred and twenty members of the International Longshoremen's union are on strike in Seattle today following the refusal of Griffiths & Sons, stevedores, to apply the closed shop principle to work at the Smith Cove pier.

The men who went out on strike were working with the cargoes of the steamships Minnesota and Albatross. T. V. O'Connor, president of the international union, has been in Seattle since Sunday attempting to adjust differences between the longshoremen and their employers, but has been unable to bring about an agreement over the closed shop question.

Sanitarium Keeper Is Under Arrest

Seattle, Wash., July 7.—(U. N. S.)—Mrs. Julia M. Goodrich, proprietor of a sanitarium, and her daughter Miss Ethel Goodrich, are under arrest here today as the result of an investigation made by the authorities into the death of Miss Anna Bailey, of Victoria. Miss Bailey died after being removed to a hospital from the Goodrich sanitarium and an autopsy established the fact that she had died as the result of an operation.

Coroner J. Tate Mason will hold an inquest.
