SWEET PEA BLOOMS WILL BE DISPLAYED FRIDAY, SATURDAY

Thousands of Oregon's Rarest Flowers Will Be Shown by Oregon Society.

FANCY BASKETS FEATURE

More Than 400 Feet of Table Room Secured in the Meier & Frank Store.

Thousands of Oregon's choicest sweet pea blossoms will be exhibited by the Oregon Sweet Pea society at its annual exhibit to be held Friday and Saturday of this week in Meier & Frank's new store. Over 400 feet of table room has already been arranged for the display of blossoms which will be entered in competition. These will include all of the standard varieties and colors, including pale pink, red, white, deep pink, maroon, cream, lavender, orange salmon, striped and purple, as well as several new varieties never before exhibited. Notable among these will be the "Martha Wheelwright," a lovely new salmon-colored pea brought out by Captain Pope, the well known sweet pea expert and lover and named by him in honor of Mrs. William D. Wheelwright. A Hillsboro grower is also promising an entirely new blossom and there will be still others.

A feature of the exhibit will be the fancy baskets and decorated tea tables entered in competition. In both of these classes especially elaborate and beautiful displays are promised. Several silver cups and other prizes are offered. The professional florists are planning a surprise for the society in the way of a magnificent centerpiece which will occupy the center of the exhibit room.

The placing of the exhibits will take place Friday morning. From 12 to 2 the judging will occur and at 2:30 the show will be open to the public, remaining open Friday evening, all day Saturday and until 6 o'clock. No admission fee is charged and a cordial invitation is extended to all lovers of sweet peas to be present.

The classification list is as follows: Commercial Growers—Section 1. Class A 1st—Best general exhibit in

vases (without foliage), First and second. Class A 2d—Best table decoration, other than sweet pea foliage allowed. First and second. Class A 3d—Best basket of sweet peas, other foliage allowed. First and second. Class A 4th—Best floral piece, either wire design or set piece. First and second.

Private Gardeners—Section 2. Class B 1st—Best 12 vases, Spencer. Class B 2d—Best six vases, Spencer. Class B 3d—Best four vases, Spencer. Class B 4th—Best vase Orange or Salmon Spencer. Class B 5th—Best vase any color of a new variety. First and second.

Amateurs—Section 3. Class C 1st—Best eight vases, Spencer (eight varieties). First prize, Portland Seed company's challenge trophy. Class C 2d—Best six vases. Class C 3d—Best vase White Spencer.

Class C 4th—Best vase Lavender Spencer. Class C 5th—Best vase Salmon or Orange Spencer. Class C 6th—Best vase Crimson or Scarlet Spencer. Class C 7th—Best vase Primrose or Yellow Spencer. Class C 8th—Best vase Light Pink Spencer. Class C 9th—Best vase Dark Pink Spencer.

Class C 10th—Best vase Striped or Mottled Spencer. Class C 11th—Best basket of sweet peas. Class C 12th—Best vase or centerpiece for table decoration. First and second.

Amateurs—Section 3. Best tea table for four covers. First and second.

All exhibits must be accompanied with a neatly written card specifying name and address of exhibitor. All exhibitors should register one day previous to the exhibition and obtain their table number. Also to leave with the registrar their card and address.

Juveniles and School Children—Sec. 2. Six to eighteen years of age. Class E 1st—Best individual display of not less than six vases (six varieties) of 10 or more stems each, either Spencer or Grandiflora type. First and second.

Class E 2d—Best six vases. Class E 3d—Best vase, white. Class E 4th—Best vase, red. Class E 5th—Best vase, pink. Class E 6th—Best vase, primrose or yellow. Class E 7th—Best vase, lavender. Class E 8th—Best vase, blue. Class E 9th—Best vase or basket, mixed colors, of not less than 25

stems, sweet pea or other foliage allowed. First and second. Children under 10 to receive 5 points handicap.

Special Prizes—Section 7. Class F 1st—Largest and best display of not less than 12 vases from any amateur, grown outside of Multnomah county. First and second. Award, president's trophy.

Class F 2d—For best and most worthy exhibit by an amateur. Grand ribbon of honor.

Class F 3d—New varieties, products of Oregon. No member of any commercial grower's household is eligible to compete in this section, nor in any amateur section.
