

FIVE MONTENEGRINS INDICTED; AMERICAN NEUTRALITY BROKEN

P. M. Luburich, Arrested in
Portland, Is Included in the
List of Those Charged.

SAN FRANCISCO ALSO ACTS

True Mills Will Be Returned There in
Recruiting Cases; Security Not
Stopped in Seattle.

Chicago, July 8.—(U. P.)—Five representatives of the Montenegrin government in the United States were indicted today on charge of violating American neutrality by seeking to enlist persons within the United States. They are: J. J. Macanovich, formerly a Montenegrin charge d'affaires at Constantinople; P. M. Luburich, assistant to Macanovich; J. J. Jovanovich, formerly a Montenegrin Red Cross committee member, arrested in Blois, France; and Anton Zatevich, arrested in New York.

The cases of 13 other Montenegrins will go before the grand jury late this afternoon.

Awake Word From Chicago.

J. J. Macanovich, personal representative of the Montenegrin government, and his secretary, P. M. Luburich, who were arrested here on a Chicago federal indictment charging violation of the neutrality of the United States, are still marking time in Portland awaiting advice from Chicago as to whether they can secure a delay of five weeks in their hearing. They gave bail in the sum of \$30,000, and their hearing before Commissioner Drake is fixed for July 13. They would waive hearing here entirely and go direct to their case in Chicago five weeks hence. This they believe would give them time to complete their mission, which it is charged and admitted is to persuade Montenegrins to return to their country, via Canada, and fight Austria. They were to address Montenegrins here last night, but on advice of Deputy United States Marshal Johnson postponed the meeting. Johnson has wired Chicago repeatedly concerning the case of the two men under arrest, but has received no response.

On Way From Arizona.

Seattle, July 8.—(U. P.)—Returning to their country, not to fight, but to take the places of the men who have been killed fighting, and to become the breadwinners for the women and children of their native land, 147 Montenegrins from the Arizona coal fields passed through Seattle last night. Bosodon Javovich, leader of the party, says the call for volunteers in Arizona was surprising.

"There are few Montenegrins now in Arizona, whereas a few weeks ago the mining districts were practically populated by our countrymen," he said.

Ready for Indictments.

San Francisco, July 8.—(U. P.)—Twenty persons, including, it is believed, the consular representatives of two belligerent nations, were indicted in four indictments to be handed down by the federal grand jury in the district court late today. The indictments are the result of investigations on for the past month in the case of the steamship Sacramento, which delivered an 800-ton cargo of arms to the German Pacific fleet off Chile last November, and the case of recruiting men here for the British army, both alleged violations of United States neutrality laws.

The names of the indicted individuals will not be given out until they are in custody.

The men involved are in various parts of the country, from this city to New York.

In both cases, it is admitted, the funds needed to swing the deals have been traced to the consular offices of Germany and England. The original source of the funds was either New York or Washington, D. C.

Holiday in Denver.

Denver, July 8.—(U. P.)—Mayor William Sharkey today declared Saturday from 7 o'clock until noon as a holiday in celebration of the coming of the Liberty Bell, which will be placed on exhibition during the half day.

FALSE STATEMENTS ADMITTED IN GAME OF "HIGH FINANCE"

Parker Steinfick, trustee in bankruptcy for the Dodge interests, against Kribs and Jones and the J. E. Lumber company to recover about \$24,000 worth of property alleged to have been taken from Dodge in connection with a contract based on alleged false representations.

Statement Is Presented.

Dodge is undergoing cross examination by Attorney A. H. Clark, representing the defendants. Dodge's explanation for making such a statement of his financial condition was that Kribs told him to.

"You say that F. A. Brewer got up a prospectus of a 'gold brick'?" asked Attorney Clark, referring to the prospectus issued by Dodge and dealers. "Is this financial statement of yours a part of the 'gold brick'?"

Clark presented Dodge with a sworn statement which gave Dodge's assets at \$399,369 and his liabilities at \$70,000, which was indebtedness to the J. E. Dodge steamship company.

"I will explain about that," began Dodge. "I told Mr. Kribs what I had and what my companies owed, and he said that would do in connection with the bond issue. He told me to make out a statement of my own financial resources."

"You have here 650 shares of \$25,000," said Clark. "But you did not state that 253 shares of that was up as collateral for the \$70,000 you mention?"

"No, sir."

"You didn't say that the other 390 shares was up with the Security Savings & Trust company as collateral for \$24,000 you owed that bank?"

"No, sir. The J. E. Dodge company owed that."

"Well, you induced the notes and

Indebtedness Is Admitted.

In quick succession Dodge admitted indebtedness with amounts to \$100,000 that was not listed in the statement.

At one point in the cross examination, Dodge made the remark that Kribs and Jones had grabbed everything he had.

And Jones got stuck to the amount of \$290,000 through their deals with you," retorted Attorney Clark.

"I object to that statement," shouted Attorney Mannix, representing the plaintiff, as he jumped to his feet. "Jones and Kribs are not parties in this deal. The money that went in came from the bondholders."

Attorney Mannix indicated that another session is to be sprung in connection with the case this afternoon or tomorrow. Attorney Clark took Dodge back on the testimony he gave at the time of the bankruptcy proceedings, endeavoring to show the discrepancy between his testimony then and his testimony at this time. Mannix objected to this line of cross-examination, saying the records would speak for themselves.

"We have nothing to conceal in this case," said Mannix. "If anybody is trying to conceal anything it is on your part, and we intend to show it up within the next 24 hours."

The basis of the suit is the alleged fraudulent representations made to Dodge by Kribs and Jones to get Dodge to sign a contract to buy a large quantity of timber in Skamania county, Wash., and build a logging camp up Hamilton creek.

Under the terms of the contract, Kribs and Jones took possession of the railroad and all the timber.

By his cross-examination, Attorney Clark is endeavoring to force from Dodge admission that he knew the amount of timber on the Kribs and Jones lands, from cruises made by men employed by Dodge. Every few minutes Clark confronted Dodge with testimony he gave in the bankruptcy proceedings last fall.

THAW MAKES A GOOD WITNESS FOR SELF IN LUNACY EXAMINATION

name but once. And he betrayed no feeling even then. The reference to Evelyn Thaw came when he was asked about Dr. Hamilton, the alienist, who once was in his employ.

"Dr. Hamilton," said Thaw, "betrayed all the evidence he got from me and Evelyn."

When read Dr. Hamilton's report that you were, in his opinion, insane at the time of the second trial," asked Cook.

"No," asked if he knew Dr. Evans, the "brain storm" expert, who testified for Thaw at the second trial, the witness replied:

"Yes, I know him well, and I want to say that he never betrayed any of my secrets to the district attorney. I discharged him from my employ, but later employed him again."

In an apparent effort to tax Thaw's memory by frequently changing the subject, Cook asked him about his childhood. The witness said he went to the public schools of Pittsburgh and to Harvard.

Danish Harvard Incident.

"When you were at Harvard did you live at the house of Mrs. Soyves?" asked Cook.

"Yes."

"While there did you have trouble with policeman's boy, as testified by Nicholas?"

"No. I heard that testified here. Nicholas' testimony was absolutely untrue."

"Do you think your former fellow student committed perjury?"

"The story was untrue," was the answer.

Cook then asked about certain petitions circulated in Thaw's behalf. Thaw said they were started by friends, and that he knew nothing about them until they were in circulation.

"Did you ever have any trouble with any of the state's alienists?" asked Cook.

"I do not know them. Who are they?" asked Thaw.

Cook named Dr. Flint, Dr. McDonald, Dr. Keit, Dr. Ferris and others.

Man Behind Jerome.

The prosecutor then read another letter Thaw wrote from New Hampshire, referring to the men behind Jerome. Thaw reiterated his declaration that at the time the letter was written he did not believe that any rich men were in a conspiracy with Jerome to keep him in Mattewan.

Cook also produced another letter written by Thaw about Dr. Baker. Thaw after admitting authorship of the letter, said Dr. Baker, as well as Dr. Parker, was named, under charges, from the superintendency of Mattewan.

Thaw stepped jauntily to the witness chair at the capital case this morning. His eyes were clear and bright and there was not the slightest trace of nervousness which marked his former trials when his life was in jeopardy for the slaying of White.

As he walked to the stand Thaw turned until he faced his mother, Mrs. Mary Copley Thaw, and smiled. She smiled, too, and there was every indication in her look and manner that she believed that Harry, by his own testimony on the witness stand, would gain the freedom for which the Thaw millions have fought so hard for nine years.

Not Angry Since 1912.

Deputy Attorney General Cook literally snapped his questions at the Pittsburgher.

"When," asked Cook, "were you last disturbed by reports about your son?"

"In 1912," answered the witness.

"Mr. William Travers Jerome made

NORTHERN PACIFIC CO. OFFERS TO CONFIRM THE LEVEE PROPOSAL

Vancouver Council Meets
and Considers Number of
Matters of Routine Nature.

Vancouver, Wash., July 8.—

The city council met in special session last evening to consider a number of routine matters. Because the city charter does not allow the payment of claims or the passage of ordinances at special or adjourned meetings, whatever there was in this line was passed up until the next regular meeting which will be held July 13.

City Attorney Simpson filed a communication from George T. Reed, attorney for the Northern Pacific Railway company, in which it was stated that the officials of the company were willing to confirm the tentative agreement entered into with the members of the council and Commercial club on July 10, 1914, at a meeting about a month ago, to the effect that it would lease to the city all of that part of the public levee under lease, not actually required by them.

In return the company asks for a 10-year renewal of its lease to the waterfront and harbor on which its freight depot and warehouse is located. The present lease will expire November 10, 1915, and if the renewal is granted the company will immediately surrender that part of the waterfront it is not actually using.

Because the matter was brought up at a special meeting no action was taken, but it will be discussed and probably be disposed of at the next regular meeting.

Rockefeller Is 76; Crank Brings Cake

Richest Man Celebrates Day in
Tarrytown Surrounded by Guards;
Feared Gift Contained Bomb.

Tarrytown, N. Y., July 8.—(U. N. S.)—"I am in excellent health and good spirits," was the only thing resembling an interview given out by John D. Rockefeller Sr. today, on his seventieth birthday anniversary. Rockefeller celebrated the day quietly with only a game of golf and dinner with his children and grandchildren on the program.

Rockefeller will not go to his Cleveland estate until late in the month. He is under even stronger guard than usual at his Pocantico Hills place, which has been carefully protected since the attack upon J. Pierpont Morgan by Frank Holt.

Excitement caused by a rumor of an attempt to assassinate Rockefeller proved unfounded today.

The police were keeping close watch on all visitors, however. One giving his name as Anton von Mings of Chicago aroused suspicion but was allowed to go after examination. Von Mings stated that he was both a blacksmith and baker, and left a cake for Mr. Rockefeller's three feet high with the police, as corroboration of a portion of his story. They handled it gingerly, fearing a bomb.

Von Mings Probably Insane.

Chicago, July 8.—(U. N. S.)—Anton von Mings, who was taken into custody at Tarrytown, N. Y., today after he attempted to force his way into the John D. Rockefeller estate there, left Chicago last Tuesday stating that he was going to marry Rockefeller's daughter because he had secured reversal of Judge Landis' \$25,000,000 fine against the Standard Oil company.
