

O. A. C. FOOTBALL FOR SEASON OF '15 GIVEN AN O. K. BY OFFICIALS

Aggies Will Open Relations Between East and West by Two Games.

STEWART GREAT GENERAL

Spring Master Stroke When He Outmaneuvers Washington Rivals and Signs Syracuse University.

Oregon Agricultural College, Corvallis, July 13.—Both in its own stronghold and in those of its opponents, the west will battle with the east and mid-west for football supremacy during the coming fall. "Doc" Stewart's "Aggies" will try conclusions with the famous Syracuse team in Portland on the first day of December. They will also journey to Lansing, Mich., where they will take the Michigan Agricultural college eleven on October 30. Gauged by competitive records both of these teams are fairly representative of the playing strength of the sections they represent and not only interesting rivals but observations thereon will doubtless prove highly attractive to followers of college football in all sections of the country.

Endorsement of this program has been secured from the College Athletic council and finally approved by President Kerr. The trip to Lansing will be the first journey eastward of any Pacific Coast team to match their playing strength against the easterners. The visit of the Syracuse team will be the second invasion to be made by eastern players, a previous trip having been made in 1906, when Michigan came west and defeated California, 47 to 0.

With the final approval of the schedule, including the contract with the Michigan "Aggies," the Oregon Agricultural college will have the best schedule, in every sense of the word, ever prepared for a college team. The San Francisco club arrived this morning from the bay metropolis ready for its eight game series with the Beavers, counting the double headers Saturday and Sunday.

The Seals are still in the lead of the league in the close race and expect to leave here in the same position. New players on the San Francisco club not familiar to the Portland fans are Catcher Block and Pitcher Brown.

Honus McCordie passed through San Francisco yesterday morning en route from Phoenix, Ariz., to Portland, and he arrives here this afternoon on the Shasta. He will probably don a uniform and get into today's game. McCordie is badly needed as a sedative for the infield and McCordie will put him in at once.

Bobby Davis is limping badly, but has been working his strained tendons into shape by warming up the pitchers.

Stroke Was Brilliant One. A. C. game is regarded as a brilliant diplomatic stroke of football followers. "Doc" Stewart had to encounter not only the normal difficulty of initiating a trip so extensive but in addition was kept busy a good part of the time in frustrating attempts of other teams to interrupt the negotiations and defeat the arrangements for playing eastern teams. After having initiated the movement he made provision to handle the schedule of the itinerary in western territory and attempts to take this away from him by the Washington football magnates all down with a bang. The Sound city team failed in their attempt to schedule a game which has definitely gone to Montana to be played on Thanksgiving Day.

The Michigan team jumped into the lead of middle west football by defeating the Michigan university in 1914 by a 13 to 7 score, and the University of Wisconsin, 14 to 7. Last year's game with Michigan was lost by a score of 3 to 6. Michigan was also defeated by Cornell in 1914 by 16 to 0. Michigan university suffered a more pronounced drubbing by the Syracuse team in a 34-0 score, just one week previous to the defeat of Michigan by Harvard by the narrow margin of 7 points.

In addition to the two big eastern games, the following schedule has been prepared for the "Aggie" team: Sept. 26, the alumni at Corvallis; October 2, Williamette university at Corvallis; October 9, Whitman at Corvallis; October 16, Washington State college at Corvallis; October 23, open date; October 30, Michigan "Aggies" at Lansing, Mich.; November 6, Idaho university at Eugene; November 20, open date; December 1, Syracuse at Portland.

The O. A. C. training season will open at Newport on September 2 under the tutelage of Dr. Stewart, Everett May and Coach Favey. Thirty-five men will comprise the squad for preliminary training, nine of them of last year's aggregation, seven regulars and two subs. A good deal of new material will have to be developed since Lutz, Huntley, King, Moore and Anderson will be absent from the squad.
