

HAMMOND TO COME, PITCHER TO DEPART FROM BEAVER TEAM

Keefe and Evans to Be Given One More Week to Show Something.

MAY TRADE OUTFIELDER?

Will McCredie and White Cook Up a Swap? Davis to Be Left at Home When the Team Leaves.

With the announcement from Cleveland last night that Infelder Hammond, who beat Bill Rodgers out of a job with the Naps, had been turned over to Portland, a big shakeup is imminent in the Beaver ranks.

Next Sunday night Bobby Keefe or Rube Evans will be unconditionally released by the Beavers, with the sign pointing now to Keefe.

Two outfielders are pretty much uncertain of their jobs, and they are not Billy Speas and Dave Hillyard. It is understood that another Coast league club wants to trade out of one of the two outfielders on shaky ground.

However, Gardner is hitting the ball hard and against the short right field fence at San Francisco, so that the Oakland club has turned down a swap.

Carlisle or Kane for Doane or Lober would be a fairly even trade, but if McCredie took one or the other, taking into consideration that a trade was offered Portland, it would more likely be Carlisle, who is the left handed hitter of the two Tigers. If he traded for Kane he would have three right handed hitters in the outfield.

Carlisle, too, is one of the best lead off men in the league and a corning good base runner. There must have been some trouble between Manager White and Carlisle, or the Tigers would not be trying to trade him.

Bobby Davis will be left at home when the Beavers leave for Salt Lake next Sunday night. There is no use in packing around extra expense on the road. Judge McCredie said this morning. If Bobby's leg gets better he will report when the club strikes California.

Manager McCredie has been informed that Hammond will join the club in Salt Lake next Tuesday. He is a corking good fielder, judging from his record with the Springfield club of the Eastern association.

Hammond played 126 games at second base, every game that his club played. He was at bat 485 times, made 69 runs and 127 hits, of which 21 were doubles, 6 triples and 6 home runs. He stole 41 bases and 17 sacrifice hits. His average was .309.

Hammond led the second sackers of the league with an average of .369, which is pretty high. He had 297 put-outs, 287 assists and 4 errors.

Manager McCredie says he has been reported to be as fast as the proverbial bullet, and his word seems to be so, judging from the bases stolen and the runs scored.

Seattle, July 14.—(P. N. S.)—Accomplishing what one man has given his life in attempting and many others have tried only to be defeated by the chilling water, H. E. Horan, formerly an instructor in the physical culture department of Harvard university, today is given credit for being the first man to swim Elliott bay. Horan covered the distance of four miles in one hour and fifty-five minutes, and emerged from the water showing no signs of physical exhaustion.

Arthur Cavill, of the famous Australian family of swimmers and former instructor of the Multnomah Amateur Athletic club, lost his life in February of 1913 in attempting the same feat. Cavill was a former world champion.
