Has Visited Gearhart Camp. Colonel James Jackson, United States army, retired, and inspector general of the Oregon national guard, has returned from a trip to California.

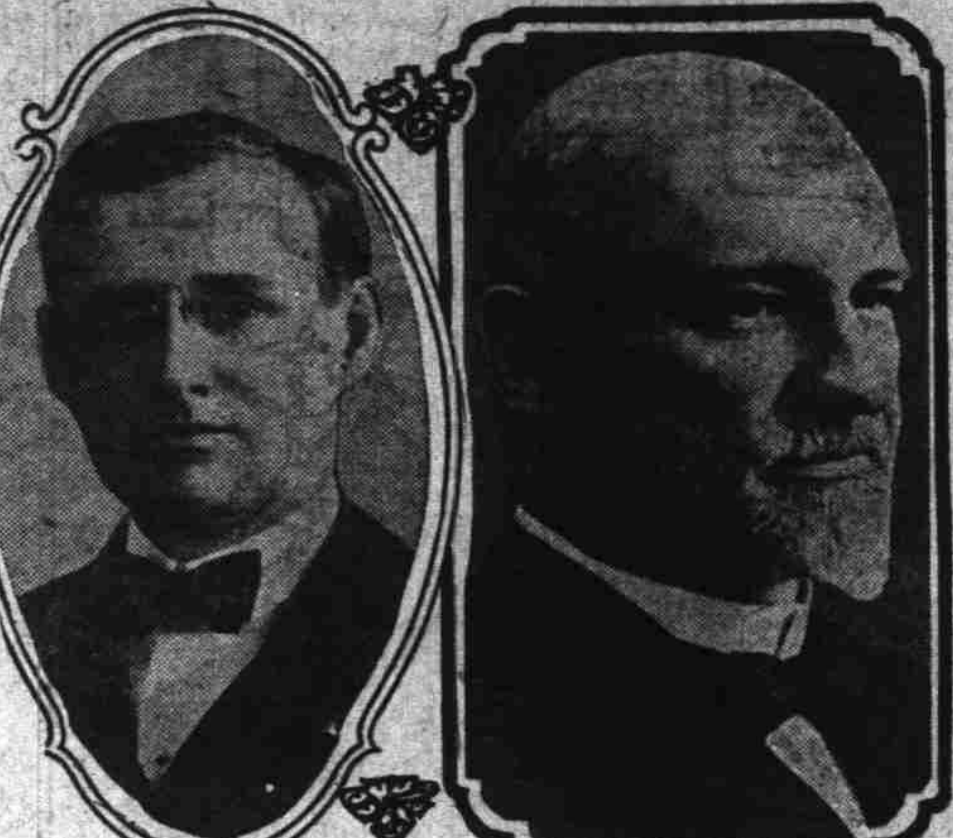

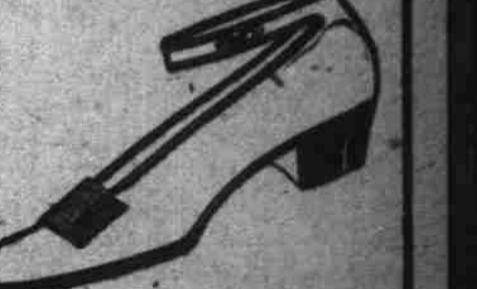
