BEAVERS IN FIFTH PLACE

Hookem Smith Holds Beavers in Critical Stages and Wins 5 to 2 Battle Before Feminine Fans.

Possessed of his glove and a braver, Harold Krause ventured bravely into combat with the saucy Beavers yesterday. Hellmann perched on third on the throw in and Jeremiah jinked up to second, middle followed with a bit to right that cleaned the bases. Jones forced Bodie and the game was practically over for the Beavers who were helpless in the eighth and ninth.

The Beavers, who have been spurling along like a crazy motorboat, are now back in fifth place, with a record of having lost seven out of the last eight games played.

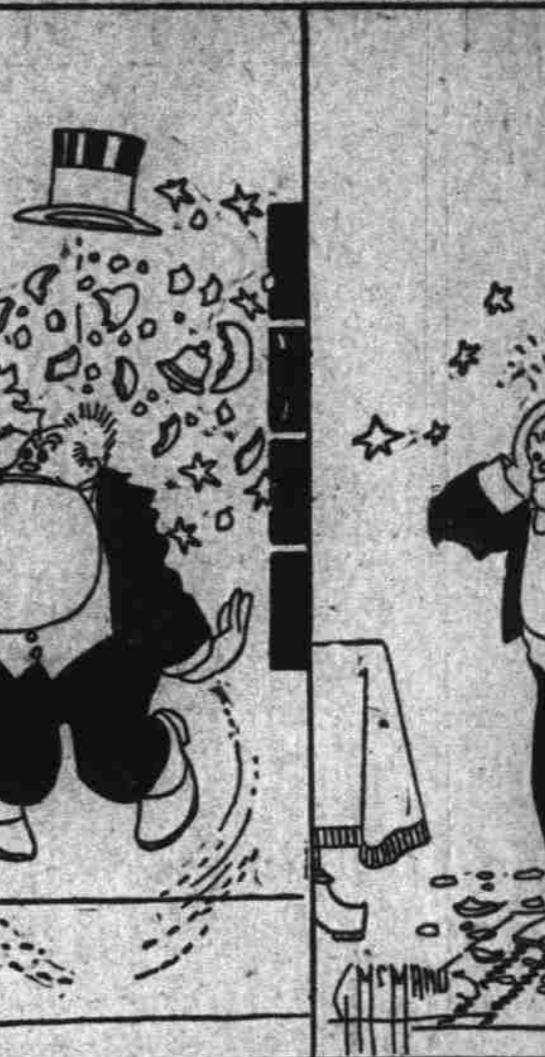
