Cunarder Orduna, With 227 Passengers, Including 21 Americans, is Chased by German but Outmaneuvers

SUBMARINE FIRES AT ORDUNA SEVEN TIMES

Stèamer Was Coming From Liverpool to the U. S. When Attacked.

New York, July 17.—(U. P.)—The giant Cunard liner Orduna, carrying 227 passengers, 21 of whom were Americans, only escaped a Lusitania fate by the superb seamonship of her captain and his officers, according to her passengers. The vessel arrived here today. The Orduna was chased and without warning shelled by a German submarine 16 hours out of Liverman submarine 16 hours out of Liverpool, about 6 oclock on the morning
of Friday; July 9. Scores of passengers said the underses boat fired a
torpedo at the fleeing liner. Probably
the best account of the attack was
given to the United Press tonight by
Baron Marcus Rosenkrantz, a Danish
nobleman, who witnessed the whole
affair from the upper deck. Captain
Taylor and his officers, being also
naval reserve officers, refused to discuss the matter in any way. cuss the matter in any way.

"There was absolutely no warning," said the baron. "The submarine simply slipped up on us and began action before we knew anything about it. I had rather halfway expected something would happen and had gone on the top deck to look around. The lirst intimation I had that anything was wrong was when I suddenly no was wrong was when I suddenly no-ticed a white streak about 25 yards astern of us. It was not, I think, a torpedo, No explosion followed the

The reports will determine whether the Orduna incident, because of the presence of American-passengers aboard, will be mentioned in the new American note now in the preliminary stages of formation. William Creen, Life Termer, Attacks Slayer of Mary Phagan With Butcher Knife Cutting Jugular Vein.

CONDITION OF VICTIM SAID TO BE SERIOUS

Believed Parties in Sympathy With Relatives of Girl Slipped Knife in.

Milledgeville, Ga., July 18.—(Sunday)—(U. P.)—Leo M. Frank's throat was slashed last night by William Creen, aged 45, serving a life term for nurder. Frank's left jugular veln was severed and he may die. He was at-tacked at 11:10 o'clock as he lay sleep-ing in the prison dormitory.

Creen used a sharp, home-made butcher knife. Creen, Frank and hundreds of other prisoners were in the dormitory on the second floor of the two-story building. They had retired at 9 o'clock, the regular time. Two guards were stationed at two entrances to the room, and the lights were turned down. Frank's cot was about 40 feet from one entrance. Creen's was four cots further along in the line. No one saw Creen, but he was be-lieved to have slipped out of his cot, crawled under the three between him

right side. Slashes Frank's Throat. As Creen struck Frank, the man in sprang towards Creen. Prisoners leaped from their cots, and general pandemonium reigned. Before Creen could strike again, he was seized and the knife wrested from him. Frank sank back on his cot in a pool of blood. the next cot gave the alarm. Guards

Creen was rushed to Warden James E. Smith, and is now in irons in a solitary cell in the basement of the dormitory building. He has not spoken a word since the assault.

Frank was lifted from his cot and taken to the operating room. Two in the building and gave Frank immediate attention.

Victim Ess Even Chance. One of the physicians who rendered was Dr. C. W. McNaughton, serving i life sentence for murder. The other, Dr. L. M. Harris, was convicted of another crime in Columbus, While these two doctors worked over Frank, a hurry call was sent Dr. Guy D. Compton, prison physician, at his home half a mile away. He arrived within a few minutes. The three physicians performed an operation imme-diately, stitching together the wound in Frank's throat. It took over two The United Press correspondent en-

tered the room after the operation and asked Frank, who had remained conscious, how he felt, "Pretty well," said Frank, smiling. Dr. Compton later stated Frank had n almost even chance to recover. While the left jugular vein is severed, the windpipe and spinal cord are intact. He has lost much blood, which; combined with his poor phys-

Blood Continues to Flow. The knife which Creen used is said by Warden Smith to have been ob-tained from the farm Saturday afternoon, when Creen assisted in killing several hogs. Smith expressed the he-lief that Creen concealed the knife about his clothing and lay awake sev eral hours awaiting his chance. Frank has been at the farm about

hree weeks.
The prisoners are allowed the free dom of the floor until 8 o'clock and the lights are turned down promptly at 9 o'clock. After that hour no pris-oner is allowed to move without pernission from a guard.

Attack Causes Much Excitement. Excitement which followed the at tack lasted for hours.

At 1:30 a, m. Frank was still on the operating table. Doctors had not succeeded in fully stopping the flow of blood. They admitted that the pa-tient's chance for recovery was narrewing. At 1:45 physicians completed the stitching and at that time they believed the operation would prove suc-cessful. They had joined the jugular yein, and Frank was then taken to the

Mrs. Frank is in Milledgeville, where she was stopping so as to be near her husband. She immediately started for he state prison farm when she learned of the attack on her husband.

## MURDERERS LEAVE **BODY ON ALTAR STEPS** OF CATHOLIC CHURCH

Spike Driven Into Head of L. A. Miller, Salesman-Girl Finds Remains.

Los Angeles, Cal., July 17 .- (U. P.) Murdered and spread out in the shape of a cross on the altar steps of St. Augustin's Catholic church, the body of L. A. Miller, Los Angeles salesman was found by a little girl this after

Death was caused by a spike being lriven into Miller's forehead. A small hole was discovered in the middle of his brow. Nearby was a small vial of colorless fluid, Handkerchiefs scattered on the ground outside the church were probably used to tie Miller's hands and feet before death. The man's clothing was carefully raped over the altar railing. No watch

was found and no money.

Probably Murdered Outside. Entrance to the church had evidently been gained through the vestryroom. adjoining the chancel. The outer door of the vestry was open. It gives diical condition, resulting from long rect entrance into a cornfield, and a confinement, lessens his chances for few paces from it police found marks recovery. killed there or stunned by a blow, and his body dragged into the church. That a number of men participated in the crime is believed owing to the rampled condition of the earth around the vestry door. Several chairs had been placed near the inner door of the vestry, indicating that the murderers

sat there and peered into the chancel.

Girl Finds Body. Detectives are working on a theory that Miller was selzed by a gang, taken into the church, spread-eagled on the altar steps, gagged, and then killed by the slayers at their leisure.

To find a possible motive for this sort of crime, the police are inquiring into Miller's past history.

Another theory is that Miller was tilled for purposes of robbery and his body left on the altar steps by thugs actuated by a spirit of bravado.

Laura Machaeo, caretaker in the church, discovered the body when she went there to clean and sweep in preparation for Sunday's services. Miller had been dead for some time.
