

LLOYD GEORGE GOES TO WALES TO END STRIKE

Reports in London Are That Great Coal Strike Will Be Over in Few Hours; Appeal to Strikers to Be Made.

London, July 19.—David Lloyd George, minister of munitions, will leave for Cardiff tonight, where he will appeal to the striking miners of South Wales to return to work that factories may not be forced to close down and England's army and navy be crippled by lack of ammunition in her hours of trial.

Announcement that Lloyd George would go to Cardiff was made this afternoon following a meeting of the cabinet during which the grave situation growing out of the strike in Wales was discussed. Lloyd George is popular in labor circles and it is hoped that this may aid toward bringing about an end to the strike if the proposal submitted by the government through the board of trade to the executive council of miners fails.

Efforts were made to quit the government as to the coal strike in parliament today. Questions were asked particularly as to possible plans for placing the mines under government control. In answer to these questions, Runciman, president of the board of trade, replied that no good purpose could be served by making public facts concerning the situation at present. The greatest crisis since the beginning of the war can only be averted in England by the government taking over the coal mines.

This was the growing conviction among officials today when the cabinet met in special session to consider the strike in South Wales. The situation is regarded by the government, every member of the cabinet attended the meeting.

Believe Operators' Profits Big.

It is the belief of the government that the miners would not object to temporary control of the coal fields by the crown. This would remove the chief contention between the men and employers, based on the belief of the miners that the operators are piling up great fortunes from the war prices on coal. The miners demand a share in what they believe to be the increased proceeds of the operators. Unless the mines are taken over, government investigation of the conditions of the dispute which is threatening the navy's coal supply is remote.

It was suggested in some quarters today that the operators be forced to grant the demands of the men, pending future negotiations. Under this plan, it was declared, the miners would at least return to work and coal would again be produced for the navy and munition factories.

Men Support Leaders.

Members of the cabinet have rejected the suggestion, however, on the ground that such action would indicate government weakness.

The strike leaders now have the firm support of the men in their determination to remain on strike until all demands are granted. The executive council of the government, which conferred today at Cardiff with representatives of the government, but there was believed to be little prospect of an agreement.

Available supplies of coal are rapidly diminishing. The production of munitions is jeopardized and though the navy is now well supplied an extended strike would have a serious effect upon this arm of the British fighting machine. The shut-down of the mines cuts off hundreds of thousands of tons of coal daily.

Claim Settlement Near.

London, July 19.—(U. P. S.)—Settlement of the Welsh coal miners' strike is imminent, according to reports published here today by the Star.

As the result of negotiations, the end is expected within a few hours, the Star states.

Returned to Face Mann Act Charge

Willie Gross, Mentioned in the Sam Kraemer Case, Brought Back From New Orleans.

Willie Gross, who is alleged to have accompanied Sam Kraemer on the trip from Portland to New Orleans that resulted in the latter's recent commitment to the federal penitentiary at McNeil's island, was returned to Portland yesterday by Deputy United States Marshal D. A. Sanders, of New Orleans.

Gross is wanted by the federal authorities here to face charges of having transported Ethel Mendelsohn from Portland to New Orleans in violation of the Mann act. The Mendelsohn woman was brought back to Portland in company with Gross and is held as a witness against him.

Gross was arrested in New Orleans last February, giving bonds to appear July 5. July 6 he forfeited his bond and was re-arrested. Deputy Marshal Sanders, who brought Gross to Portland, is a brother of ex-Governor J. Y. Sanders of Louisiana.

RAILROADS WANT TO MAKE AN INCREASE IN DEMURRAGE CHARGES

Application of Oregon Laws Made Affecting the Refrigerator Cars.

Railroads of Oregon have applied to the public service commission for permission to increase the demurrage charges on refrigerator cars from a flat rate per day to a graduated higher rate, depending upon the time the car is held out of service by shippers or consignees. The commission has notified the carriers that it will sit to hear the question Friday, July 30, at 10 o'clock a. m.

The rates now charged are as follows: For the first 48 hours, nothing; for every day thereafter that cars are held, \$2. The rates sought are: First 48 hours, nothing; as now; for the next three days, \$2 per day; for the following three days, \$3 per day, and for continuation for longer periods, \$5 per day.

It is pointed out by the carriers that the increase is designed not so much to derive revenue from cars thus detained through delays in loading and unloading, as to provide a penalty for unnecessary delays. The roads contend that under ordinary conditions the refrigerator cars should be unloaded within the 48 hour "free time" limit. With a higher penalty attached to long delays, the shipper or consignee would make more of an effort to liberate the car.

At this season of the year heavy demands are made for refrigerator cars and delays in unloading are responsible for "car shortages."

The application was filed by W. P. Allen, commissioner of the Northwest Transportation system, on behalf of the Oregon carriers.

Two Incendiary Fires Suspected

About \$500 damage was done by fire to a dwelling owned by J. D. Burkey at Forty-third street and Fifty-second avenue southeast, shortly before 11 o'clock last night. The blaze is believed to have been of incendiary origin.

The house had been unoccupied for three years, but last night boards had been carried from the basement, broken up in the kitchen, and set fire to. An attempt was also made to set fire to the home of Mrs. Ida Burkey, 5711 Fifty-sixth avenue southeast, Saturday night, according to a report made to the police, but the fire was extinguished before serious damage was done.

Health Officer to Visit Woodburn

Dr. Calvin S. White, state health officer, will go to Woodburn today to meet with city officials tonight to go over plans for a sewer system to be established there. Under the state law passed by the last legislature the state health officer is required to sanction sewer plans for small municipalities before the sewers are constructed.

WATER SUPPLY AT LINNTON FOUND TO BE CONTAMINATED

Springs and Wells Tested by City Health Officer Marcellus This Morning.

COLON BACILLI IS FOUND

Water Said to Be Unfit for Use—May Be Compelled to Have Bull Run Water.

Residents of Linnton will be compelled to use Bull Run water as quickly as they can secure the service if they would not use water which is contaminated. This morning City Health Officer Marcellus announced that tests of samples from springs and wells about Linnton show that the water of that vicinity contains colon bacilli in such quantities as to be unfit for human consumption. Many residents of Linnton have failed to have the Bull Run service because of the cost but with Linnton now a part of Portland the cost has been reduced and it is believed that Portland water will supersede well and spring water at once.

Dangerous Sentiment Developing.

"My friends, I am not an alarmist, but there is a serious condition in this country which we must not overlook. We are proud of the fact that our chief executive today is a man of peace. But there is a dangerous sentiment developing over this country. The other day a high government official said to me in this city made an invidious comparison between our navy and our schools. We must not neglect proper defense."

"We must not degenerate into intellectual mollycoddles, but must remain true patriotic American citizens. We believe in the 'Peace on earth and good will to men' principle, but we must be prepared to meet any emergency to defend our country."

The governor's remarks were interrupted by frequent bursts of applause.
