Salt Lake City, July 21.—Manager Walter McCredie with a new leadoff man and a spitball pitcher with a lot of confidence descended upon this town yesterday and won a 6 to 1 ball game from the Salt Lakers.

Salt Lake's only run off Coveleskie was made in the first inning, when two doubles were bunched by Zachar and Ryan. Barbour and Tennant hit in the second and third inning and after that the locals were helpless, not a hit being made for the remaining six innings.

Portland put over a run in the first inning, when Derrick singled, took third on Speas' single and scored on a sacrifice fly by Bates to Shinn.

In the fourth inning the big blowup was as follows: Coveleskie got a homer over the left field fence. Carlisle walked and Derrick beat out an infield hit. Schmutz made Speas foul so Hannah and Bates fly to Shinn, but Bill Stumpf pumped out a triple to the clubhouse and Carlisle and Derrick

scored. Fisher singled and scored Stumpf and Hilliard ended the inning by his usual stunt of fanning.

FRANK RIEHL IS CHINGREN STAR AT INDIAN MEET

Beats Frank Troeh and Les Reid for the Honor at Tacoma.

Tacoma, Wash., July 21.—Some mighty class shooting was recorded the first day's trophy competition of the Pacific Indians shoot at Manito range yesterday and a Tacoma professional, F. C. Riehl, won the chief honor of the day when he captured the Chingren diamond badge, emblematic of the Pacific Coast target championship.

Three men were tied for this trophy, including L. H. Reid of Seattle and Frank Troeh, a Vancouver amateur. Each had shot 49 out of 50 birds, and in the shoot-off Riehl winged 20 birds straight. There were 12 entries in the event, which was won last year by George E. Stacy of North Yakima.

The shoot was at 18 yards range. Stacy scored for the amateurs when he won the second competition for the M. L. Davis cup out of 23 entries. Stacy broke 48 out of 50 birds at 15 yards range.

In the eight target events of 15 birds each, shot during the morning, Frank Troeh was high gun, scoring 118 birds out of the 120, a fine record. Two others had 116 scores and there were a number of ties at lesser scores for the 10 silver prizes.

The winners of these prizes were the following: Troeh; Riehl of Tacoma; W. H. Hillis of Portland; Matt Grossman of Seattle; H. R. Everding of Portland; P. J. Holohan of Portland; E. M. Morris of Portland; Martin Rickard of Corvallis, Or.; C. E. McKelvey of Seattle, and E. W. Cooper of Tacoma.

The prizes offered for the two low guns were won by Carl Coon and Lock Riehl of Tacoma. Mrs. O'Connor, Spokane, won the silver card tray for the women. H. Boston of Seattle holds the record for the day's long run, winning as a trophy a handsome silver service.

Today there will be eight more events at 15 targets each, with 10 silver prizes to the high guns, excluding winners of yesterday. Today, also, the solid silver trophy presented by Frank C. Hart of Tacoma will be shot.
