New York, July 22.—(U. P.)—Many attacks on the genuineness of the Jess Willard-Jack Johnson fight at Havana have been made but the worst of all is the latest issue of John Bull, which has just reached this country from England. Horatio Bottomley, the editor of the paper, stands by any disclosure his periodical makes. He charges that Johnson declared the fight was a fake and that Johnson is now forced to admit it, because he has not received \$50,000, a guarantee that was promised to him for laying down to Willard. In support of his charges he reproduces a number of telegrams claimed to have been sent by Johnson.

Langer Holds Three American Records

San Francisco, July 22.—(U. P.)—Ludy Langer, crack swimmer of the Los Angeles Athletic club, today is the holder of three American records, all established within the past five days. Langer's latest record was hung up yesterday afternoon when he did 850 yards in 12 minutes, 33.5 seconds at the exposition yacht harbor, bettering by nearly 10 seconds the former national record made by C. M. Daniels at Rochester, N. Y., in 1909. Langer's other two records are the 500 yard indoor swim and the 440 yard outdoor. The previous 500 yard record was 12:18. Joe Wheatley and Bud Goodwin, both of New York, were second and third respectively, both finishing inside of the old record. Herman Laubs of St. Louis, Mike McDermott of Chicago, Norman Ross of Portland, and Walter Spencer of Oakland finished in the order named. Austin Mosher quit before the half mile was reached.
