

EXPORTERS WILL TRY TO FORCE ULTIMATUM OVER FOOD BLOCKADE

Cotton Interests and Packers Unite to Try to Gain Special Session of Congress.

EMBARGO THREAT IS PLAN

Publicity Campaign Showing Germany More Yielding Than England Is Part of Interests' Plan.

Washington, Aug. 3.—(U. P.)—An ultimatum or a strong message amounting to an ultimatum is what a contingent of exporters want from President Wilson in answer to Great Britain's refusal to modify the British order-in-council and the rejection of all American contentions as to the rights of neutral commerce. A committee of exporters, headed by the president's hand to accomplish freedom of the seas at the earliest possible moment.

The cotton interests are the strongest element in this movement. The packers, whose shipments have been consistently held up in England, are next. Behind them are smaller exporters, and, with a formidable army, the combine is confident of forcing its program in one way or another.

World Embargo.
The plan of the combine of exporters is to demand that the allies cease interference with all shipments consigned to neutral countries. In the event of refusal of this demand, they would call an extra session of congress and place an embargo upon shipments to the allies. They will seek to have President Wilson's note to England fix a time limit in which the American demands may be accepted, and this would amount to an ultimatum.

Failing to succeed in their efforts to get an extra session of congress, the combine of exporters will wait until the next regular session and will then make a strong fight to have their program (designed to force recognition of their rights) put through.

More Than Submarines.
They are already arranging for a publicity campaign in support of their position. Their view that the submarine warfare, with its resultant loss of American lives, is overshadowed by the damage resulting from the blockade of the allies is not without merit. Germany, in practice if not in theory, has bowed to the wishes of the United States, while the British refuse to accede to any demands with regard to neutral rights, either in theory or practice.

The situation as between Great Britain and the United States is not satisfactory. Their view that between this country and Germany growing out of the submarine controversy, Germany has not officially acceded to the demands made by the administration with regard to the submarine warfare, but has conformed to them in practice. Great Britain has emphatically refused to recognize any of the rights claimed by the United States for its commerce upon the seas.

Germany Watches Outcome.
Germany is now awaiting the outcome of the Anglo-American negotiations. If the United States takes as determined a tone toward the British as was taken toward Germany in the manding recognition of American rights it was predicted today Berlin will formally acquiesce in the American contention as to the submarine warfare.

The belief was expressed that if the United States takes a firm stand with England, Germany, will at least be as mindful of neutral rights in practice as has been during the past few weeks. Secretary Lansing now has under consideration the three British notes rejecting all American demands as to the rights of neutral commerce and the German rejoinder in the Frye case. The British notes, the last of which was received yesterday are regarded as of the greatest importance by far.

Switzerland Objects, Too.
London, Aug. 3.—(I. N. S.)—A dispatch from the Daily Mail correspondent at Bern, Switzerland, says: "The Swiss importation trust is greatly annoyed at the British demand that an embargo be placed on certain articles which it is customary to ship into Germany."

"The trust opposes the demand, asserting that a compensation for exports to Germany is absolutely necessary to it in the form of German goods. Switzerland is an important channel of Germany's trade with the outer world. Great interests are involved. England's demand may precipitate a crisis."

Will Be Married Upon High Seas

Albany, Or., Aug. 3.—To be united in marriage on the high seas while en route to their home-to-be at Sitka, Alaska, will be the experience of Miss Louise Pirle of this city. Miss C. A. Anderson, a graduate of O. A. C. who is engaged in mining engineering in Alaska.

The wedding will be the culmination of a romance starting in college. Miss Pirle and her mother, Mrs. Grant Pirle, left yesterday for Portland to join Mr. and Mrs. A. L. Anderson. The party will sail Saturday for Cordova to meet the groom-to-be. Miss Pirle is also a graduate of O. A. C.

The wedding is to take place on August 15.

William S. Boswell Was Mining Pioneer

Baker, Or., Aug. 3.—William S. Boswell, 52, died last evening at his home at Malheur City, following a brief illness. He was identified with the mining industry in eastern Oregon for more than 50 years. He was successful in mining as well as in other lines of business.

Mr. Boswell leaves a daughter and five sons. Mrs. Boswell has been very low for several weeks and her death also is momentarily expected. Mr. Boswell leaves much property.

Sues to Quiet Title.
Vancouver, Wash., Aug. 3.—Suit to quiet title to 40 acres of land in section 6, township 3 north, range 2 east, was filed in the superior court yesterday by George E. Marsh against J. W. Weaver and others.

Fort Hensel Soon To Fall, Says Rome

Chief Defense of Malborghetto Crumbling Under Fire of Heavy Howitzers, Is Italian Claim—Tavis Shelled.

Rome, Aug. 3.—(I. N. S.)—Confident of immediate success, General Cadorna has begun mapping out the Italian campaign to follow the fall of Goritz. Fort Hensel, the chief defense of Malborghetto, today was reported rapidly crumbling under the fire of heavy howitzers, and the cutting of Austrian communications between Trentino and Carinthia was deemed certain.

The Italian bombardment of the Tavis group of fortifications was proceeding successfully and equal headway was being made in the operations against Goritz.

IMPORTANT REPORT ON NOMENCLATURE TO BE MADE TONIGHT

Five Years of Preparation by Osteopaths Made to Fix on Uniform Terms.

Papers were read this afternoon at the osteopathic convention by Dr. S. V. Robuck of Chicago, Dr. C. H. Spencer and Dr. H. H. Fryette.

Tonight the session will be devoted to reading of reports from the board of trustees of the association, the legislative bureau, the publicity department, osteopathic publications, and the department of education.

As a concluding number Dr. H. W. Forbes, president of the College of Osteopathic Physicians and Surgeons at Los Angeles, will render what is considered the most important report of the entire convention. It has taken five years to prepare and comes after a conference between the faculties of the seven colleges of osteopathy.

The report has to do with the nomenclature of osteopathy and definitely fixes osteopathic terms so as to be uniform throughout the world.

Common Nomenclature Formulated.
Osteopathy as a younger science grew up with a difference in terminology for the same things in different parts of the country.

As a result of conferences, similar to the world wide conference held by osteopaths and chemists a common nomenclature has been formulated. Announcement was also made this morning that Dr. Forbes has been elected editor of the Western Osteopath, published at Los Angeles, the official organ of the entire Pacific coast district.

Conventions, convention sessions and special meetings are occupying every minute of the delegates' time as this is a working convention pure and simple.

Rotarians Entertain Osteopaths.
Osteopaths who are Rotarians were entertained at the Rotary club luncheon in the Benson hotel this noon.

The Chamber of Commerce has extended club privileges to all of the visiting delegates.

Prof. Guttberlet Goes to Carroll
Waukesha, Wis., Aug. 3.—Professor John E. Guttberlet, P. H. D., graduate of Bethany college, Kansas, now of Oregon, has been made professor of biology at Carroll college. He has published several articles in scientific magazines. He comes to Carroll from the University of Oregon, where he has been professor in zoology. He succeeds Doctor Amos B. Plowman.

Demurrer Is Overruled.
Demurrer to a complaint for damages brought by Cohen Brothers against the Maxwell Motor Car company as the outgrowth to an agency contract canceled by the corporation, was overruled by Judge Bean in the federal court. The Cohens held a contract to sell the cars in Oregon, entered into in August of 1914, and the company canceled it in February of 1915, and the present suit is a result.

EX-MAYOR OF EUGENE SUE
Mary Matlock Asks Separate Maintenance.

Ex-Mayor J. D. Matlock, of Eugene, was sued yesterday by Mary F. V. V. Matlock for separate maintenance. She did not name the amount desired, leaving that to the court to determine. Mrs. Matlock has secured a divorce from Matlock but that decree was set aside. Mrs. Matlock alleged that her husband gave her a building in Eugene at the time of their marriage and that their troubles arose over that building as Matlock wanted it back. In the divorce decree she was given the building and a part of other property owned by Matlock. She alleged that Matlock's income is about \$400 a month. She was allowed \$475 temporary alimony and \$350 suit money in connection with the divorce and alleges that it is all she had to keep her.

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EVIDENCE IN DODGE SUIT CONCLUDES WITH VERBAL PYROTECHNICS

Attorneys in Case Will Commence Arguments Monday; Briefs Will Be Presented.

EARLY DECISION UNLIKELY

Court Expects to Find It Necessary to Review Mass of Testimony Before Making Up Mind.

"It's all over but the shouting" with the Dodge case before Circuit Judge Kavanaugh, and that part of the trial will begin next Monday when the attorneys in the case will make their arguments before Judge Kavanaugh. Three days will be allowed for this part of the proceedings, a day and a half for each side.

Yesterday morning Judge Kavanaugh's courtroom resembled a volcano. Violent eruptions disturbed the dignity of the court but amused the spectators. In the afternoon quiet reigned after a few moments spent in rebuttal evidence introduced by Attorney Mannix for the plaintiff.

The defense rested at noon after one of the stormiest sessions of the case. It was the twenty-ninth day of the actual trial and the nerves of all concerned were on a wire edge as a result of the strain.

Following the argument briefs will be presented by both sides of the case and Judge Kavanaugh will take it upon himself to make a decision. He said yesterday that in all probability it will be necessary for him to go over a greater part of the testimony before making his decision.

Both Sides Charge Fraud.
The case was brought in the name of Parker Stennick, trustee in bankruptcy of the E. H. Dodge interests, against Frederick A. Kribs and Willard N. Jones. Damages of \$614,000 and rescission of a contract between Dodge on one side and Kribs and Jones on the other, is asked.

Fraud is charged by each side. The suit involves timber lands and a logging railroad in Ekmanian county, Washington.

PICTURE THEATRES INSPECTED
Only One Irregularity Is Found Last Night.

But one moving picture house of six visited last night by Chief Probation Officer Dukes of the juvenile court and Deputy District Attorney Ryan had features to its dressing room that did not meet their approval. At the Princess, on Fifth, near Burnside street, only curtains separated the men from the women while dressing. The manager informed the investigators that he had already arranged for permanent partitions in the place and was allowed to proceed with the vaudeville part of his show on that promise.

Five other houses—the Majestic, the Columbia, the Burnside, the Sunset and the Casino—were found to have proper dressing quarters. Further investigations of picture houses will be made Thursday night.

The investigation followed the discovery of a 14-year-old girl in a theatre dressing room without even a curtain to divide the room. All places in the city will be investigated before the campaign ends.

ESTATE VALUED AT \$39,000
Widow of C. F. Burkhardt Files Petition.

Alfred C. F. Burkhardt, one of Portland's early florists, who died suddenly Wednesday evening, left an estate valued at \$39,000, according to the petition of his widow, Mrs. Anna Burkhardt, for appointment as executrix of his estate, which was filed for probate yesterday. Mr. Burkhardt left the property to his wife subject to division on her death among his six daughters, ranging from 18 years to 2 months in age. He provided that contest of the will should disbar any daughters from their share in the estate. The will was drawn up November 3, 1913.

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At Escanaba, beginning at 3 p. m., a light snow fell yesterday.

Hammond, Ind., Aug. 2.—(I. N. S.)—Lives of hundreds of people were imperiled today by a cloudburst in the Calumet region, in the northern portion of Indiana, when 10 inches of rain fell. Scores of people were driven from their beds by the onrush of water into their homes.

Mrs. John Kennedy, an aged woman of Hammond, was overcome with shock when she was literally washed out of her bed, and may die. The damage here will reach more than \$500,000.

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Boy Is Drowned.
Punkstunaway, Pa., Aug. 3.—(I. N. S.)—A cloudburst descending upon Punkstunaway and vicinity today resulted in the drowning of Ralph Rapinsky, aged 4, and heavy property loss.
