

NEW POLISH KINGDOM, RULED BY AUSTRIAN, REGARDED AS LIKELY

Archduke Karl Stephan, a
Nephew of Austrian Em-
peror, Considered.

London, Aug. 6.—(I. N. S.)—In diplomatic circles here today it is a matter of common conjecture that the capture of Warsaw will be followed by a proclamation of a new kingdom of Poland under a Hohenzollern or Hapsburg suzerainty, with Archduke Karl Stephan, nephew of the emperor, as king.

Such a kingdom probably would comprise the present so-called kingdom of Poland and Russian Poland, together with the Polish provinces of Posen, held by Prussia since the treaty of Vienna in 1815, and a large portion of the province of Galicia, which the same treaty gave to Austria.

Archduke Karl Stephan, who at present is the admiral commanding the Austrian navy, is well known in Poland. He is a nephew of the aged emperor Francis Joseph.

Two of his daughters, the Archduchesses Eleonora and Renata, are married to Prince Alexander Czartoryski and Prince Hieronymus Radzinski, two of the most prominent members of the Polish aristocracy.

The Arch Duke himself has made his home in Galicia and is well known for his pro-Polish sentiments. It is only to be expected, in view of the sentimental and personal connections of the prospective candidate for kingship that the plan will be greeted with enthusiasm.

Kaiser to Return Sunday.
Emperor William, the Rotterdam Courant says, will return to Berlin Sunday to preside over an important cabinet conference at which the heads of all German states and the Austrian arch dukes will be present.

Proposals may be considered for issuing the Polish proclamation at that time.

These plans may be submitted to the German reichstag for confirmation on August 17, the court adds.

The Daily Express correspondent at Amsterdam sends the following dispatch describing how the fall of Warsaw was received in Berlin:

Cyclists Carry Tidings.
"Warsaw is ours."
"This was the cry ringing throughout Berlin Thursday afternoon. The Kaiserin received the news by telephone from the Kaiser and ordered General von Kessel, commander of the troops in Berlin, to send cyclists throughout the capital announcing the evacuation of the Polish capital."

"More than 100 cyclists, followed by the few motor cars still available in Berlin, dashed through the crowded streets yelling the news."

Citizens Exchange Kisses.
"The scenes of enthusiasm which occurred were indescribable. Citizens and policemen kissed one another in the streets. The crowds sang the national anthem. Schools were immediately closed and the children sent home. Every house hung out a flag and newspaper extras were thrown in sacks into the streets, where the people bought them."

"There also was wild enthusiasm in Munich because the Bavarian Prince Leopold commanded the army that reached Warsaw first."

makes the immediate retirement of the Russians across the Bug imperative. The official statement gave no details of the operations east of Warsaw where the Bavarians under Prince Leopold are continuing their pursuit of the Russians driven out of the Polish capital.

Petrograd Railway Bombarded.
German aviators, it was stated, dropped bombs upon Plesetsk, which is on the railway leading to Petrograd. Of the southeastern operations, the statement said:

"Between the Vistula and the Bug, Field Marshal von Mackensen continues his victorious advance. The Austrians have driven the enemy north-west of Novo Alexandria. We are pressing upon the enemy in the region north of Cholm."

In the Courland district the fighting everywhere has resulted favorably

to the Germans, the statement declared.

An official statement from Vienna announced the capture of Ivangorod, the fortress guarding Warsaw on the southeast. Ivangorod is 60 miles from the Polish capital on the right bank of the Vistula river.

The occupation of Riga, the important Baltic port, which has been used as a base for the northern Russian armies is only a matter of hours.

Evacuating Novo Georgievsk.
Novo Georgievsk, the fortress, 20 miles west of Warsaw is being hastily evacuated by the Russians. It is believed to have been dismantled of big guns some time ago, but the garrison left behind to make a last fight is rapidly withdrawing in an effort to escape capture by the Bavarians who hold Warsaw.

Field Marshal von Hindenburg on the north and Field Marshal von Mackensen on the south are delivering simultaneous smashes against the Russian flanks, threatening the capture of a whole army corps.

The world has never witnessed such a retreat as that which the Russians are now making over a front of more than 300 miles, with great German forces hacking and driving at their flanks and lines of communication in an effort to envelop and destroy them.

Russians Try to Save Railway.
With rare courage and desperation, recognized by friend and foe alike, the Russians are trying to save the railway from Warsaw to Petrograd, toward which General von Buelow is battering his way from the Baltic region.

The rush of von Mackensen northward toward Brest Litovsk from the Lublin-Cholm line spells disaster to the Russian left wing if it succeeds.

The flower of the Russian army is opposing the Austro-Germans in this region. Every foot of ground is being fought for by the Germans as the Russians slowly withdraw, resisting at every step.

Between the widely separated wings of the Russian forces a steady retreat is in progress. Grand Duke Nicholas is endeavoring to wheel over 1,000,000 men into the German line, an effort to block the German steam roller which has ground and crushed its way through Galicia, across the plains of Poland, toward Warsaw and is now threatening to sweep on eastward.

Russian Rout Is Predicted.
The greatest strategist of the ages could not organize so signally a steady retreat without sustaining enormous losses in guns and men. And for this reason military critics are predicting the rout of the Russian armies.

The German public is so engrossed with the mighty effort to cut off the Russian retreat that there is little speculation as to what the next German move will be. It is hinted in official circles that it will startle the world.

Bavarians Pursue Russians.
News from Warsaw following the capture of the city was meager today. The victorious Bavarians under Prince Leopold are understood to be hot pursuit of the retreating remnants of the garrison. It is supposed, therefore, that the Russians either did not succeed in leaving the city or that the bridges spanning the Vistula or the Bavarians quickly threw pontoons across and hurried into Praga, the eastern suburb of the city.

At least 100,000 Russians are still in the angle west of Warsaw, of which Novo Georgievsk is the apex. With the Germans in possession of Warsaw on their rear they are threatened with capture. Retreat by railway is impossible, as the only two lines which might be used lead directly into Warsaw.

If an attempt is made to retreat over the plains in a northeasterly direction the Russians face the danger of being cut off by the German advance upon the Warsaw-Petrograd railway.

Russians Make for Swamps.
The Bavarians who occupied Warsaw are expected to reach Novo Minsk, 27 miles east of the Polish capital by tonight in their pursuit of the retreating slavs. It is not believed the Russians will attempt a stand east of Praga, but will continue to withdraw as rapidly as possible until they are at least reach the swamps about Siedlec.

The forces of General von Buelow are now within artillery range of Riga. Aviators have dropped circulars into the town announcing that the Germans are about to enter. The Russian forces about Riga are maneuvering only in the hope of escaping but with no prospect of saving the Baltic port.

Announcement of the capture of Riga, whose capture will be almost as important as that of Warsaw, is expected before tomorrow.

Natives Going to War.
Kingston, Jamaica, Aug. 6.—(I. N. S.)—The inhabitants of Tuck's island have decided to follow the example of Jamaica in sending a contingent of 100 men to England. Voluntary subscriptions are being raised in sufficient sums to train the men and pay their passage to the motherland.

The contingent soon will be ready to leave. The fund being collected in Jamaica for the purchase of aeroplanes for England is growing rapidly.

WAR SUMMARY BY J. W. T. MASON

New York, Aug. 6.—(U. P.)—The fall of Ivangorod, the fortress guarding Warsaw on the southwest, is a military complement to the capture of Warsaw. The fall of the great Polish capital and the taking of the Ivangorod fortress, is part of a greater German campaign whose objectives are the obliteration of the field forces of Russia.

Although the capture of the Vistula line is no end in itself, it must be regarded as the war's greatest success, as one of the supreme military achievements in all world's history. The mainstay of the accomplishment is due to the fact that the miracle was wrought with only part of the German power. Germany is holding France and England in check; Austria is presenting an impenetrable front along the Italian border. Yet the German forces have enough strength to capture the principal Russian strongholds. It is this that makes the victory rank almost with those of the combats of the legendary Titans.

The belief held in London that Germans will concentrate forces about Calais will probably prove unfounded. The evident purpose of the present German strategy is to force Russia to quit the field. It would be of equal shortightedness on the part of the Germans to abandon the eastern offensive now as it would have been to quit after the fall of Lemberg. The depression among the normally pessimistic Russians increases with each German victory. The lack of ammunition does not explain the continuous Russian retreat since the first of May.

The frightful strain of the year's fighting is undoubtedly beginning to undermine the Russian morale. The Germans believe that this may cause Russia's complete collapse in the near future.

The western lines are not as pierceable as the eastern. In fact it is doubtful whether it is breakable at all inasmuch as the British and French are better prepared than the Russians. At the same time the westerners have been saving ammunition since the eastern drive began in order to meet possible offensive attacks against themselves. They are rested and are today ready for the greatest possible defensive combat.

To force a separate peace from Russia will probably continue to be the Kaiser's purpose.

**President Praises
Girl's Work in War**

Miss Daisy Polk of San Francisco Values Letter Written Her by Woodrow Wilson, Who Extended His Thanks.

San Francisco, Aug. 6.—(I. N. S.)—Miss Daisy Polk, sister of Willis Polk, the San Francisco architect, today has as one of the mementoes of her work of mercy in the war torn region of Europe, a letter of thanks from President Woodrow Wilson such as rarely falls to an American girl. The letter reads:

"My Dear Miss Polk—My attention has been called to the splendid work you have been doing as a member of the American relief committee and the international relief committee. I wish to thank you for it in my own name and in the name of the American people."

WOODROW WILSON
"President of the United States."

Miss Polk was secretary of the now famous American relief committee in London, organized by six American women, the outbreak of the war, four of whom are westerners.

The American embassy in London entrusted the committee with the entire work of aiding stranded American women in the war zone.

Miss Polk was arrested three times in her work, once in Germany and twice in France, while on missions of mercy.

**Driver Arrested
For Child's Death**

Los Angeles, Cal., Aug. 6.—(P. N. S.)—Justice Forbes today placed responsibility squarely on auto drivers to protect pedestrians when he held John Oguchi, chauffeur for Mrs. A. R. Frazer, daughter-in-law of Millionaire Frazer of Ocean Park, to answer in the superior court on a charge of manslaughter in connection with the death of 3-year-old Emma McBeth. Testimony was given to the effect that the machine, driven by Oguchi, approached a group of children without warning. The McBeth child was struck and killed.
