Additional Members 54,961 in Last Fiscal Year: More Ministers Ordained.

Presbyterian church growth last ear broke all records in all directions. Reports tabulated for the church year, show a membership of 1,513,046, will be rendered. an increase of 54,961 last year.

This is the greatest increase ever ade by this church in a single year v other than consolidation, and it folows a year when 110,000 persons were yterian membership since there was a resbyterian church in America. More Ministers Added.

Some years ago there was an un- ing. isual rise in Presbyterian figures hrough union of the Cumberland ranch, but last year's figures for the ear and for all years broke even the ecord of the Cumberland year. The number of ministers is largest, and so is the number of Sunday school

Within the last 10 years the Presby terian church has added 500,300 to its nembership, and 350,000 to its Sunday chool rolls. More new ministers were ordained last year than in any other ear in its history, and the number of ministers-9670-is the largest since the church was formed.
