

EX-PRESIDENT TAFT WILL SPEAK BEFORE BAR ASSOCIATIONS

Address Will Be Big Feature of Meeting of Lawyers of Oregon and Washington.

PROMINENT MEN COMING

Lengthy Program Will Be Interpersed With Many Entertainment Features and Side Trips.

On the afternoon of Monday, August 23, Portland attorneys and their guests attending a joint convention of the Oregon and Washington state bar associations will listen to ex-President William H. Taft, who will speak on "The American Government." This address will be one of the big features of the convention.

The convention will last three days and is the first joint session to be held by the two state organizations. The sessions will be held in the Hellie theatre on Monday and in the library on Tuesday. Monday afternoon and Tuesday morning and afternoon will be devoted to serious work.

Guests Will Be Welcomed.
The Monday session will be opened with welcoming addresses by Governor Withycombe and Mayor Albee, to which Frank Reeves, president of the Washington association, will respond. Ex-President Taft will follow and addresses by Mr. Reeves and Judge A. S. Bennett of The Dalles, president of the Oregon association, will complete the day's program.

Monday evening will be devoted to a reception to be held at the University club from 8 to 10 o'clock. This reception will be an informal "get-together" affair. Light refreshments will be served.

Prominent Men to Speak.

Features of Tuesday's meetings will be addresses by United States Senator George Turner of Spokane on "The Bench, the Bar and the People"; United States Senator George E. Chamberlain of Portland, on "Governmental Supervision of Water Power and Natural Resources"; Herbert Harley of Chicago, secretary of the American Juridical society, on "Present Data for Judicial Organization"; and Dr. Paul Roccoy, on "Expert Evidence in the Courts From the Standpoint of a Physician." Disciplinary business and resolutions, with a separate meeting during the day of the Washington association, will complete the working part of the session.

Trip Over Columbia Highway.
A lawn fete at the Waverley Country club grounds, preceded by a steamboat trip on the Willamette river, during which music and dancing will drive away thousands of other, and trouble, will occupy the conventioners Tuesday evening.

The Columbia highway will attract Wednesday. At 9 o'clock automobiles will start from the Multnomah hotel. Luncheon will be provided picnic style at Benson park. All owners of automobiles who desire to enjoy the Portland attorneys in entertaining the visitors are urged to communicate with Attorney Albert Ridgway.

All Lawyers Invited.

All members of the bench and bar are invited to the convention, whether members of the associations or not. Opportunity will be given those not members to attend as special members. All members will be welcomed at the meetings without charge. The registration books will be open Sunday, Monday and Tuesday, August 22, 23 and 24, at the Multnomah hotel, The Arlington club, the University club, the Portland Chamber of Commerce and the Waverley Country club. An extended courtesy of their organizations to the associations and visitors' cards will be furnished.

Ex-President Taft will be in Portland by Mrs. Taft and Miss Helen Taft, who will accompany him to San Francisco. The ex-president will come to Portland from Salt Lake City, where he is to address the American Bar association meeting. He will leave Portland immediately after making the address to the joint session.

Ex-President Taft will also be the principal speaker at a breakfast in his honor to be given Sunday morning, August 22, by the Portland Press club. The affair will be for members only, and will be at the Hotel Benson. Short talks by newspaper men and music will complete the program.

Mt. Tabor Park Drive Is Praised

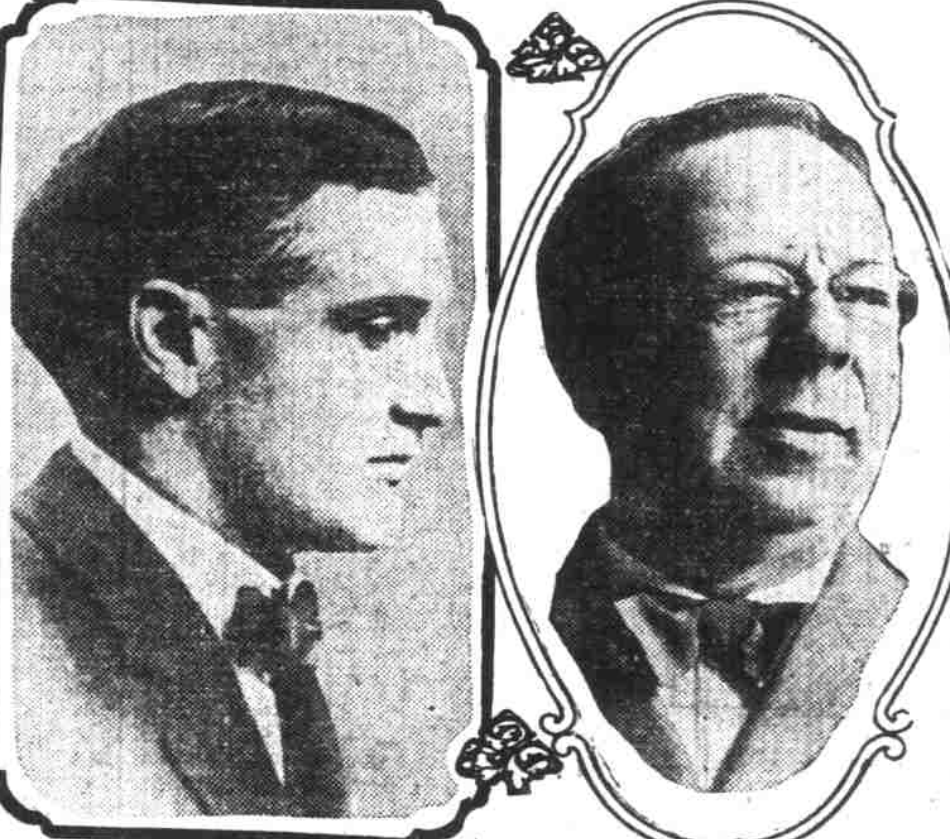

CITIES INVITED TO MEET COMMITTEE ON RIVERS, HARBORS

Portland Chamber of Commerce Makes Plans for a Big Demonstration.

All the cities and towns that are particularly interested in the improvement of Oregon's rivers and harbors have been invited by the Portland Chamber of Commerce to send representatives to meet with the members of the congressional committee on rivers and harbors, who will visit Oregon August 17 to 20.

This committee has very much to do with the appropriations made by congress for river and harbor improvements, and an effort will be made by the Chamber of Commerce to impress upon them the immense territory which the Columbia river serves.

The chamber has invited the following cities and towns to send representatives to present their claims and participate in the entertainment of the committee: Kennewick, Goldendale, Roosevelt, Walla Walla and Pasco, all in Washington; Lewiston, Idaho; Pendleton, Umatilla, The Dalles, Oregon City, Salem, Astoria, Marshfield, North Bend, Florence and Roseburg. The committee will arrive Tuesday night from Grants Pass, and the tentative program is to go up the Columbia river past the Celilo canal Wednesday up the Willamette valley and inspect the Oregon City locks on the return trip Thursday and down the Columbia river, inspecting the Jensen and other fine and other improvement work at the mouth of the river Friday.

The United German Societies of Portland welcome August 16, Dr. C. J. Hexamer, of Philadelphia, past president of the National German-American Alliance at its convention in San Francisco. Dr. Hexamer, head of an organization of 2,500,000 members, will stop at the Imperial. BORAH HEARTILY IN FAVOR OF TEAL IDEA UPON CANALIZATION

Snake and Upper Columbia Rivers Development Project Is Given Consideration.

MUST ELIMINATE GRAFT

Sufficient Support Can Be Found if Bill Is Kept Clean, Declares the Senator.

Recently Joseph N. Teal proposed to the people of Idaho that they participate in a campaign for the canalization of the Snake and Upper Columbia rivers, together with the development of hydro-electric power for irrigation and industry.

In a letter, United States Senator William Borah of Idaho gives his opinion of the plan, saying: "I always regard anything Mr. Teal may say on this and kindred subjects as entitled to more than passing consideration."

Support Is Promised.
"I find myself in perfect agreement with Mr. Teal as to the great benefits to be derived from the further improvement of the Snake and Columbia rivers. I shall be glad to give any support I can to this project, or line of improvements and to all other legitimate improvements of our rivers. I am a thorough believer in the importance of our real waterways and of those streams the improvement of which will be of benefit to the people generally in matters of transportation."

"There is much indication that the shameless graft which has characterized the rivers and harbors bills for some time will hereafter be eliminated and that men who desire conscientiously to support a proposition which should be permitted to do so without feeling at the same time that they are supporting a proposition which should have no place in decent legislation."

Must Keep Bill Clean.
"If the bill can be kept clean there will be no difficulty whatever in finding sufficient support and sufficient means to improve such substantial and worthy river work as that of the Snake and the Columbia. I hope to be able to be of substantial service to your cause. I know its full value not only to our state and to the city of Lewiston, but I think I can appreciate after reading articles from such men as Mr. Teal and Mr. Stainton, of Lewiston, the value of this improvement to the whole region covered by these streams."

"The principal thing the grand aerie provided for was a reserve fund to guarantee funeral and sick benefits, estimates being made on actual insurance figures and old line company experience."

Scenery Is Exalted.
"There are only two places in the civilized world that exceed Portland for beauty and scenery. One is Naples, the other Santa Barbara. Nature has done a great deal for the people of Portland, and therefore you are not responsible for it, but you have done and are doing a great deal for yourselves."

"The Eagles are preparing for the time, which is not far distant, when the insurance commissioners of every state will see that funeral and sick benefit orders properly provide for and guarantee what they agree to pay."

"You people in Portland have some wonderful institutions. While we have some fine department stores we do not have them in their own buildings. And then there is your magnificent public water system and your beautiful parks. The Columbia river road is a great thing to bring nature closer to the tourists."

"The grand aerie at Spokane appropriated \$10,000 to help out the weaker local aeries struggling under adverse conditions. This is much stronger for the Spokane convention. In a few years its guarantee fund will make it the richest fraternal order in the United States."
