ing fight for the possession of the remains of William Gutmiller is on here between Mrs. Mary Early and the Hahnemann hespital authorities. The medical men are anxious to hold the body because it is valuable to science, owing to the fact that Gutmiller's heart was on the right side and his other organs were transposed, Mrs. Early, who says Gutmiller owed

her money for board, insists that he told her she might sell his remains to pay his debts. He died Wedneday in the Hahnemann hospital from the effect of poison taken with suicidal

Dr. C. V. Clemmer, superintendent of the hospital, showed Mrs. Early the law covering such cases, and insists possession of the corpse. The woman appealed to the coroner, who informed her that if she did get the body she would have to bury it. Then he added that the disposition of the remains was up to the state anatomical board. 
