

PETROGRAD IS OBJECT OF RIGA CAMPAIGN OF GEN. VON HINDENBURG

Famous Field Marshal Assumes Personal Command of Offensive Along Baltic.

London, Aug. 12.—(U. P.)—With the official announcement from Berlin that Field Marshal von Hindenburg is in command of the German forces in the Baltic region and not General von Buelow, new interest centered today in the fighting about Riga and toward the Warsaw-Petrograd railway.

Success in Turkey Necessary. In the event of the failure of the offensive which the Kaiser has apparently determined to continue against the Russians, the early forcing of the Dardanelles is regarded as the only chance that ever for the Russian situation is to be saved.

Petrograd Real Objective. As a result of the placing of Field Marshal von Hindenburg in command of the north flank and the steady thrust that is being made further into Russian territory in this region, the power is growing in military circles that Petrograd is the real German objective.
