Important Railroad Center 60 Miles West of Brest Litovsk; Russia's Secondary Defense Line, Is Occupied.

RUSSIANS WITHDRAWING TO STRENGTHEN FLANKS

Germans Claim Capture of 7450 Prisoners in the Past Two Days.

Russia Criticizes England.
Petrograd, Aug. 13.—(U. N. S.)—For the first time since the beginning of the war, criticism of Russia's allies is appearing in the press, whether with or without official sanction is not known.
The Novo Vremya, the government organ, says today: "It is unthinkable that during a war for life or death English cruisers should hesitate to stop shipments of cotton, a commodity of vital importance in the manufacture of ammunition for the German artillery."

Berlin, Aug. 13.—(U. N. S.)—Prince Leopold's Bavarians today occupied Siedlec, an important railroad center, 60 miles west of Brest Litovsk. Official announcement of the capture was made here today.

General von Scholtz and General von Gallwitz have taken 7450 prisoners in the past two days. Following the capture of Siedlec, Prince Leopold is advancing against the railroad at Sokolow. The speed of his force is maintaining, indicating that the Russians have withdrawn from that region and are strengthening their flanks in the vicinity of Brest Litovsk.

Seven German Armies Missing.
Seven separate and distinct Germanic armies were missing about the Vistula and Bug rivers today, according to a great smash on the Brest-Litovsk road. They are commanded by General von Scholtz, Prince Leopold, General Danke, General von Koenigs, General von Woyrsch, Archduke Ferdinand and General von Mackensen.

At the same time Marshal von Hindenburg is hammering the Russian line extending from Kovno to the Dvina river.

Control Important Lines.
The Germans were astride two of the most important railroads east of Warsaw. The capture of Sokolow gives them control of a portion of the Brest-Litovsk-Kiev railway, and they also control a part of the Warsaw-Petrograd railway by reason of the capture of a junction southwest of Ostrow.

The bombardment of Novo Georгиеvsk, both from land and river, is continuing day and night. Ulians have occupied Vladimir Volynski, 75 miles southwest of Lublin, and are making an official announcement here today. Cossacks, before evacuating the city, fired nearly every building in the city, and it was practically in ruins before the Germans took possession.

Vladimir Volynski is the first purely Russian town taken. Other cities and towns taken by the Germanic allies were inhabited mainly by Poles and Jews.

WHEAT SLUMPS, MAY MEAN DARDANELLES SOON TO BE OPENED

Allies Cancel Large Purchases of Wheat in This Country.

Chicago, Aug. 13.—(U. N. S.)—Discussing the cancellation of wheat contracts by European buyers, George C. Marcy, president of the Armour Grain company, said today:
"The cancellation of the contracts is puzzling. I cannot understand it. Something very important must have occurred on the part of the allies which makes it impossible for them to purchase wheat. It is possible that the Dardanelles are to be opened. This would release a large amount of Russian wheat."

James A. Patten, prominent grain operator, said:
"The cancellation of the wheat contracts indicates one of two things: either Europe has found a new supply which means Russian wheat, or Europe finds that it cannot pay for wheat contracted for. If peace were in sight, Europe would still need wheat."

September wheat lost a full cent at the opening of the Board of Trade today and dropped an additional 3/4 during the first 15 minutes of trading. December wheat lost 3/4 cents at the opening, but regained 1/4 cent during the next 15 minutes. Other grains were weak in sympathy with wheat.

The slump in the market was due to the stories of wholesale cancellations of grain orders by the allies.
Paying for Dacia's Cargo.
Washington, Aug. 13.—(U. N. S.)—French Ambassador Jusserand today made a second payment on the cargo of cotton carried by the American ship Dacia, which was confiscated by a French warship.

Arms Shipments to Be Continued United States Notifies Austria Law Cannot Be Changed Now

Washington, Aug. 13.—(U. P.)—A reply to Austria's recent protest against the shipment of munitions to the allies was cabled to Ambassador Benfield in Vienna by the state department last night, it was announced today.
It is known that the American note upholds the right of this country to export arms to any belligerent. In the communication to this country Austria maintained that the shipment of munitions to the allies while the central powers could not obtain war supplies from the same source was not in keeping with the United States declaration of neutrality.

Washington, Aug. 13.—(U. N. S.)—The coast guard cutters Bear and Unalga today were ordered to proceed to San Francisco immediately from their present stations in Alaskan waters to participate in "Coast Guard Day" at the Panama Pacific exposition.

Villa Plans New Republic.
El Paso, Tex., Aug. 13.—(U. N. S.)—A new republic of Mexico, formed by the states of Chihuahua, Sonora and Coahuila, is planned by General Villa, chief lieutenant General Anaya, according to Teofilo Aldana, a Villista general, who arrived here today from Jalisco.

U. S. Troops Fired On.
Nogales, Ariz., Aug. 13.—(U. P.)—Mexican raiders fired on United States troops guarding the San Rafael valley 30 miles east of here, according to reports today. The fire was not returned.

Battle Expected at Monterey.
Washington, Aug. 13.—(U. N. S.)—Four thousand Villistas, under General Hernandez, have left Piedras Negras to attack the Carranzistas at Monterey, according to reports received by the state department today from Consul Blocker at Piedras Negras.

Political Prisoners Released.
Berlin, Via Wireless to Saville, L. I., Aug. 13.—(U. P.)—All political prisoners in Warsaw have been granted amnesty by the Germans at the suggestion of the citizens' committee. Among the Russians liberated is the labor leader, Meden, a semi-official announcement said today.

Rear Admiral McGowan Dead.
Twilight Park, N. Y., Aug. 13.—(U. N. S.)—Rear Admiral John McGowan, aged 72, died suddenly today. Admiral McGowan joined the navy in 1882.

Swedes Are Angered.
Stockholm, Aug. 13.—(U. N. S.)—The Swedish press today was unanimous in bitterly condemning the action of the British authorities in refusing to allow shipment of coal purchased for use of the Swedish navy.

Hawaii Justice Named.
Washington, Aug. 13.—(U. P.)—President Wilson today reappointed President Robertson chief justice of Hawaii.

Chairman of Industrial Relations Commission Says "Wall Street Dictates" to Your Commissioners.

Walsh declared the report must show who was responsible for the Ludlow massacre.

25,000,000 Feet
Of Lumber Burned

Blaze in Feather River Lumber Co.'s Yard at Portola, Cal., Spreads to California Box & Lumber Co.'s Yards

Sacramento, Cal., Aug. 13.—(P. N. S.)—After destroying lumber valued at \$50,000, the fire which swept Portola, Plumas county, today, was reported under control late this afternoon. The blaze, believed to be of incendiary origin, originated in the yards of the Feather River Lumber company and for a time threatened the great saw mill of that company.

It then spread to the California Pine Box & Lumber company's yards. More than 25,000,000 feet of lumber went up in the smoke.

FEDERAL TRADE COMMISSION IN SESSION HERE

Portland Business Men Tell Investigators What They Believe Is at the Bottom of Depressed Conditions.

TIMBERMEN DISAGREE ON STAGNATION CAUSE

Grain Exporter Says Grower Must Eventually Pay Increased Shipping Rates.

Varying reasons for the admitted stagnation of the northwest lumber industry were cited today at the hearing of the federal trade commission at the Chamber of Commerce. O. M. Clark, president of the Clark & Wilson Lumber Co., took decided issue with William D. Wheelwright, president of the Pacific Coast Export Lumber company, in declaring that over-capitalization and over-production are not the chief ills.

Mr. Wheelwright had told the commission that the shortage of tonnage is not so glaring a handicap as the over-expansion of the industry and the over-stocking of the world's supply. He had held that for the delivery of bona fide orders there are ships enough. In the first place, however, the increasing cost of stumpage, following the excessive bonding of timber lands, has required a constant pro-

20 Hurt in Crash
Near Los Angeles

Two Cars Bound for Glendale Come Together; Women and Children Caught in Wreckage.

Los Angeles, Aug. 13.—(P. N. S.)—Twenty women and children were injured at noon here today when a Los Angeles railway motor car crashed into a Pacific Electric car bound for Glendale, at a grade crossing.

The occupants of both cars were thrown into a panic when it became evident that the accident could not be avoided. Several women attempted to jump from the windows of the cars, but were prevented by their cooler companions.

Car crews, aided by pedestrians, quickly passed two women and two children from the car windows to safety.

Oil on the rails under the car descending the grade, evidently dropped by automobiles, it was believed, caused the motor car to lose control of its car, which crashed into the passing Glendale car.

The Glendale car was knocked entirely from its trucks, hung at a dangerous angle and threatened to topple over.

British Ambassador

Everything points to the fact that the girl committed suicide shortly after 2 o'clock this morning. A heavy calibre revolver with three exploded shells in the chamber, and a note asking that Mrs. Klein be notified, were found at the end of the outstretched fingers of the girl's left hand.

The girl was extremely pretty. She was tall and slim, had auburn hair, of which she wore a bob.

ENGLAND ONCE MORE
RAIDED BY ZEPPELINS,
SIX KILLED, 23 HURT

Two Armies Take Part in

London, Aug. 13.—(U. P.)—Zeppelins raided the east coast of England last night for the second time this week, it was announced today.

Six persons were killed and 23 injured as a result of the raid, the admiralty statement said.

The locality raided by the Zeppelins was not given and the time of the raid was merely fixed as "yesterday evening and last night."

Many Victims of Bombs.
As a result of today's raid 20 persons have been killed and 37 wounded within four days, by Zeppelins. Fourteen civilians were killed and 14 wounded in the last raid, which occurred Tuesday. Flight Lieutenant Lord was also killed in pursuing the Zeppelins with the British aeroplane squadron.

Two Zeppelins participated in last night's raid. The dead include four men and two women; the injured three men, eleven women and nine children. All were civilians. One of the dirigibles is believed to have been damaged when the raiders were engaged by the British aeroplane flotilla. The admiralty statement announcing the raid said:

S. P. COMPANY CLAIMS TITLE TO SEA SHORE

Lincoln County Settlers Up in Arms Against Stand Taken in Regard to Tide and Marsh Lands Along Coast.

NEWPORT BEACH PLATS FILED FOR TAXATION

Matter Will Probably Be Settled in Court; Farmers Ready to Fight.

The Southern Pacific Railroad company is making claim to the entire water frontage on the coast line or Lincoln county from Otter Rock, about six miles north of Newport, down to the southern boundary of the county, a distance on a bee line of about 30 miles, and a much greater distance when the bays and inlets are considered.

Within this district is the Newport or Nye beach, one of the most popular beaches in the state, and which is visited by thousands of Oregonians and others every year.
If the Southern Pacific's assertion of title is sustained by the courts, which undoubtedly will be called on to decide the question, it will be within the power of the railroad company to put up "Private property; keep off" signs almost anywhere along the Lincoln county coast. Only a few spots will be exempted.

Legislature Gave Away Lands.
In 1874 the state legislature sold what was then Benton county into bonds to the railroad company by giving away "all the tide and marsh lands" in the county to the Willamette Valley & Coast Railroad company, which was succeeded by the Corvallis & Eastern, now owned by the Southern Pacific. EMMA GOLDMAN AND
