

GEORGE KAHLER ENDS WINNING STREAK OF DOC WHITE'S TIGERS

Big Righthander Keeps Hits Scattered and Two Scores Due to Long Flies.

HILLYARD HITS A HOMER

Cracks One of Fromme's Fast Ones Into Left Field Bleachers With Two Runners On in the Eighth.

Big George Kahler threw out his chest, took a reef in his belt and proceeded to make the Vernon Tigers have yesterday. And Big George's stable mates took the hint and gave Arthur Fromme a taste of the medicine the Beavers have been quaffing of late. The score was 7 to 2, augmented in the eighth inning by a home run into the left field bleachers by David Hillyard with two runners ahead. Kahler had the unique distinction of seeing the visitors score two runs on the two hits that he allowed up to the eighth inning, both being made on successful flies by Billy Purcell, which permitted Dick Bayless to score from third. Running in this game played, were two double plays on each side. Twice at critical times, the one in the eighth being with two men on singles and Hillyard's hands on the line. Gus Fisher allowed Berger to start two double plays in the fourth and sixth.

Lober left and scored when Mitze threw badly to second to head a steal by Lober. Kahler allowed Lober to get caught at third on a poorly laid out. Kahler forced Kahler and on a hit and run play, Hammond singled between first and second, sending Carlisle to third and the pals pulled off a double.

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Fromme went up in the eighth. Bates opened with a single to left and Stump walked. Fisher sacrificed and turned out at first, which necessitated Carlisle finishing up the game. Then Hillyard produced a hiatus of the ball to the left field bleachers and three runs were tallied off.

Wilhoit and Purcell in the eighth and Risberg, pinching in the ninth, brought the Vernon hit total up to five for the day.

SEMI-FINALS ON AT SEATTLE FOR STATE NET TITLE

Joe Tyler Needs All His Experience to Beat Fulton.

Seattle, Wash., Aug. 13.—(P. N. S.)—Approaching the climax of a week of the best tennis Seattle has seen in recent years, semi-finals in the Washington state championship tournament are being played on Blackiston courts today. Interest in today's play centers chiefly about matches between Van Dyke Johns, the California wizard, and Hugh Kelleher, of Seattle, and between Sam Russell, of Seattle, and Joe Tyler, the Spokane player who holds the northwest championship title.

The "Big Four," as Tyler, Russell, Johns and Kelleher are called, have played remarkably steady tennis during the week and, although given stiff opposition in some instances, have never been in serious danger of being eliminated as contenders for final honors. Championship aspirations of two of them, however, are certain to receive a setback before today's play ends.

IS JACK MONROE DEAD ON FIRING LINE IN FRANCE?

Frank Moran Says He Read of Picturesque Fighters' Death.

New York, Aug. 13.—(I. N. S.)—Jack Monroe, who once fought Jim Jeffries for the world's championship, lies dead somewhere in Northern France or Belgium. Frank Moran, just back from England, says he read Monroe's name in the list of killed and heard his heroic death spoken of several times by wounded soldiers, back from the fighting lines.

Jack Monroe had about as adventurous a life as any man that ever followed the ring. Playing tackle on the Butte Professional football team, he helped clean up the big college and club teams between Chicago and San Francisco. Later Monroe threw the hammer and put the shot. He was a great athlete.

While playing football Monroe visited Jack O'Brien's training camp one day and became interested in boxing. Entering the coast championships at the Olympic club, he knocked out three rivals and became heavyweight amateur champion. He turned professional and fought Jeffries four rounds, winning the purse offered to anyone who would stay. Monroe said he played football with Jeff. Jeff went to his knees once and it was Monroe who knocked him down.

Clark Ball grabbed Monroe and took him east. Here he whipped Tom Sharkey, knocking Tom down with a straight left to the jaw. He knocked out Al Limrick, Peter Maher and several others. He showed himself a

game, rough and ready, good natured fellow. He fought Jackson six rounds. Monroe's finish came when he fought Jeffries a return match in San Francisco and was quickly knocked out. After that he went north, prospecting in the Canadian wilderness. He was first on the ground in the big Cobalt discovery and his claims made him a rich man.

For several years Monroe was mayor of Elk City, a responsible capitalist and a member of many clubs in Canadian cities.
