## DRASTIC REGULATION SAID TO JEOPARDIZE PICTURE FILM HOUSES

### Portland May Lose Prestige as Center in the Pacific Northwest.

### MANAGER GIVES VIEWS

#### Ordinance Under Which Censorship Board Now Operates Said to Be Dangerous Weapon.

"Enforcement of drastic laws and measures inimical to the interests of the moving picture people in Oregon is apt in the future to deprive this city of the privilege of being a distributive point for the films and Seattle would logically benefit because of Portland's loss," said T. C. Malcolm, manager of the General Film company.

This unfortunate condition results, he means that Portland, so to speak, will become a way station and the central depot and clearing house will be on Puget sound. I would regret to see this come about. I am intensely interested in the future welfare of Portland and am anxious to see any worthy industry succeed here, but I will say that if this system of censorship of the moving picture interests—both film exchange men and theatrical managers—does not cease, something will have to be done in self-defense.

#### Portland Would Suffer.

"In the event of Seattle being made the central point for Oregon, Washington and Idaho, it would simply mean that Portland would have to use films at convenient times. The business is one of much detail and value of films is based upon their age. Delays which we have already been contending with have resulted in severe losses.

"I am strictly opposed to the present means of censorship in Portland. The policy in vogue under the present city ordinance appears to be a narrow, shortsighted one. The vast financial interests of the theatre men and film exchange men seem to be forgotten in the attempt to enforce the ordinance to the letter.

"The present city ordinance makes no provision for an appeal, such as we had under the old measure. If our films fail to meet the approval of the board, or the dominating factor of it, it simply means that we have to pay to their demands or lay ourselves liable to arrest and fine and possibly imprisonment.

#### Call Ordinance Dangerous.

"If we are arrested now we are prohibited from showing the film complained of to the jury, as evidence. We have no means of determining the fairness of the board's action. We are virtually at the mercy of the board. The decision as to whether we have actual grounds for an appeal is left to the whims of the board. The ordinance is so wide, has so many possibilities of interpretation, that it is a dangerous weapon when not rightly used.

"The value of an appeal board is self-evident in the following case: A local board of censors of Pezbury 27 and passed by the appeal board, headed by Judge Stevenson, of the municipal court, on March 2 and run on March 3. The ordinance was a recent one, adopted March 22. The same film was again returned to Portland for exhibition July 22, which fact led to the arrest of the exhibitor, with embarrassing conditions for himself.

#### Action Decried Unfair.

"I contend that the action of the present censorship board was entirely wrong, grossly unfair to the exhibitor, and almost discouraging to the view of the case previously given by Judge Stevenson. I believe that the present board should respect all decisions made by the board of censors, and when given. These appeal decisions were rendered only after the most careful investigation and personal inspection. The judgment of an expert and trained in the law, and one whose duty it is to daily mete out justice to those who appear in court, regardless of whether competent local men and women to aid him in reaching a decision. Their judgment is said to fairly represent public opinion.

#### Censorship Is Approved.

"I want to make myself absolutely clear in this whole matter. I am not in a hurry to seek to make it a hardship for anyone who is trying honestly to enforce the law. In fact, I am always willing to aid in the enforcement of all laws. Again, I am heartily in favor of censorship of films. The business must be protected from unscrupulous and designing persons. But in the administration of the powers of the censorship board, a member thereof, is very apt to make grievous error in judging between what is right and what is wrong.

"Many a good play has been ruined because of the arbitrary action of the one wielding the power of the censor. The proper kind of an ordinance in my estimation is one that will be practical in all its details and one that will perform a valuable service in improving the morals of the community. And such an ordinance should not be enforced in an antagonistic manner.

The present ordinance falls far short from meeting the requirements of the present time."
