

### INTERVENTION ISN'T PLANNED FOR MEXICO NOW, INSISTS LANSING

#### Secretary of State Denies It Was Discussed at the Pan-American Conference.

Washington, Aug. 13.—(U. P.)—Secretary of State Lansing said this afternoon that intervention in Mexico was not mentioned during the Pan-American conference which resulted in the framing of an appeal for peace to be forwarded to the warring Mexican factions. Invitations to the conference were oral, he said, and intervention talk was banned.

The secretary intimated that the note to the Mexican leaders would go forward tonight. It contains about 400 words. Lansing characterized the Carranzista agents here as persona grata, but said they had no diplomatic standing.

Villa Would Get Out. General Villa today offered to eliminate himself as a factor in Mexican affairs. The manner in which the revolutionary leader chose to announce his willingness to retire came far from clarifying matters, however, owing to a provision that the "Cientificos" shall not be represented in any new government that may be formed.

In a message through his foreign minister, Diaz Lombardo, to the agency here, Villa said:

"If peace conferences between the factions reach a successful end and only General Villa but all civil and military elements affiliated with the Carranzista party will be disposed to eliminate themselves in necessary, with the single condition:

"Cientificos Are Barred. That the men who are placed in charge of the new situation shall solemnly agree to restore constitutional order and that they shall not be drawn from the decadent and odious clique of reactionary party."

By implicating General Villa, declared against intervention, which the administration has deprecated, but regarded as necessary finally if order cannot be restored.

"I firmly believe in President Wilson's good will toward Mexico and that the United States will not attempt armed intervention inasmuch as it has the cooperation of the Latin American powers, including Argentina, which is opposed to intervention," Villa's message continued.

Carranza Is Carried. If President Wilson had planned intervention within a period more or less remote, he surely would not have invited Carranza.

So far as General Carranza is concerned the situation was unchanged today. The "first chief" is unyielding, though it is hoped he may show a different attitude when the peace plea framed by Secretary Lansing and the Latin-American envoys is actually delivered to him.

While the Carranzista commander at Matamoros has offered to cooperate with General Planon in putting down the border disorders, he coupled his offer with the assertion that the trouble was due to Texas politicians and charged that the Carranzista included opponents of the Brownsville sheriff's reform crusade. The situation on the border, though tense, was considerably improved.

Improvement was also reported from Vera Cruz, where quiet prevails.

Following a conference with President Wilson, Assistant Secretary of War Breckinridge said no more troops would be sent to the border for the present.

### Egg Label Law Is Attacked in Court

#### Californians Claim Statute Requiring Labeling of All Eggs Imported From Foreign Countries Is Illegal.

San Francisco, Aug. 13.—(U. P.)—The labeling of eggs imported from foreign countries and placed on sale here is a violation of existing treaties between this country and Canada and the state senate and court today to interfere with federal commerce.

This is the contention today of Timothy Healy and John L. McNab, attorneys for the egg association, secretary of the Master Bakers' association, secretary of the police court of selling unlabeled Canadian eggs. The charge was brought by the Petaluma chicken raisers.

Foley's attorneys will test the case in the higher courts. Pending its settlement, 100 cases of Canadian eggs are being held up.

### Sailors Must Get Butter and Water

#### Commerce Department Begins Enforcement of New Seaman's Law by Insisting Enough Food Is Provided.

Washington, Aug. 13.—(I. N. S.)—Enforcement of the seaman's law was begun today by the department of commerce, port officials being ordered to see that sailors were allowed five cents daily, in accordance with one of the provisions of the act.

Wife Murderer Hanged. Wethersfield Penitentiary, Conn., Aug. 13.—(I. N. S.)—Frank Grella, wife slayer, was hanged in the penitentiary here today. Grella confessed when he was arraigned. He frequently requested that his execution be not delayed.

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### GERMAN DRIVERS SINK EIGHT MORE VESSELS; TWO LIVES ARE LOST

#### Three Trawlers and Norwegian, Swedish and British Steamer Those Sunk.

London, Aug. 13.—Eight victims today raised the toll of Germany's submarine warfare to 23 for the last four days.

The trawlers Aufry, Thrush and Humphrey were sent to the bottom by shell fire, the crews escaping in each instance.

Earlier reports recorded the loss of the Norwegian steamer Aura, the Swedish steamer Kiruna, the British steamer Summerfield and the British steamer Jacoma.

The master of the Summerfield and the engineers' wife were drowned. Seven others of the crew were rescued and landed. Two were so injured it was necessary to rush them to hospital.

The British steamer Opeidokoprey was also a victim of submarines, it was learned today.

The Kiruna was reported ashore off Scotland. It is believed that the vessel was thrown on the rocks to prevent her from sinking from damage sustained either from torpedoes or mines.

The crew of the Kiruna this afternoon abandoned the vessel and landed at Wick.

Feared Crew Lost. Copenhagen, Aug. 13.—(I. N. S.)—The torpedoing of the Norwegian steamship Aura by a German submarine was reported in dispatches received here today. It is feared the 16 members of her crew lost their lives.

Steamer Jacoma Torpedoed. Dundee, Scotland, Aug. 13.—(I. N. S.)—The British steamer Jacoma, registering 2965 tons, has been torpedoed by a German submarine, according to advices received here today. The crew landed safely.
