

AUTOMATIC ELEVATOR ORDINANCE WILL BE CLOSELY CONTESTED

New Measure Proposed Designed to Safeguard Passengers From Accidents.

PUBLIC HEARING PLANNED

Some of the Hotel Men and Others Favor Ordinance and There Are Others Who Oppose It.

Aimed to prevent accidents, an ordinance regulating the construction of automatic elevators in hotels, apartment houses and business places has been prepared by Building Inspector Plummer, and is to be the subject of a public hearing to be held in the city at 2 o'clock Thursday afternoon. It is believed that the proposed ordinance will be the subject of considerable discussion as it has the support of many apartment house owners and the opposition of many. This is the first time the city has taken to regulate the automatic elevator and it is believed that enforcement of the proposed ordinance would mean the elimination of accidents.

According to Building Inspector Plummer, most of the accidents have occurred by passengers being caught between the sides of the elevator shaft and the elevators. To prevent accidents of this nature two plans are proposed. One is to require an auxiliary door on the car itself and electrical connections so made that the car cannot be operated unless both this door and the regular elevator door are closed. The other is the construction of what is known as a "flush shaft." This would require the building of elevator doors flush with the shaft sides and mean the elimination of all space between the sides of the shaft and the car.

The proposed ordinance is to be discussed by hotel and apartment house managers at a meeting of the Apartment and Hotel association Wednesday night. C. L. Horn, president of the organization, says the plan of regulation is good and means greater safety.

BUILDING STANDARD SOUGHT

Amendment as Proposed Affects Condemned Buildings.

That no question can arise as to the deterioration of structures when condemned by the city bureau of buildings, an amendment to the ordinance providing for the condemnation of buildings will be submitted to the council by Commissioner Dieck tomorrow.

Up till now owners of buildings have found their structures in a certain stage of deterioration and inspectors from the bureau of buildings have found them in a more advanced stage. When the inspectors attempted to have the structure removed opposition arose and the courts would not enforce the ruling of the inspectors. The amendment will fix a standard by which deterioration can be determined.

WILL PAY FOR ALL DAMAGES

Change of Grade of Broadway Is Now Assured.

With property owners in the vicinity of Broadway and Williams avenue agreeing to pay for damages to property of Mrs. Anna E. Buckley done by lowering Broadway, all obstructions in the proceedings for changing the grade of Broadway have been removed and the city can now go ahead with the actual plans.

Under present proceedings the paying of Broadway from Lawrence street to Union avenue is dependent upon the change of grade proceedings as it is proposed to lower Broadway at Williams

Pan-American Unity Urged by Barrett

American Nations Must Stick Together or Expect Aggression From Europe or Asia Later, Says Director.

San Francisco, Aug. 24.—(U. P.)—"The influence and power that will cause Europe finally to keep the peace is Pan-American unity."

This warning, signed by John Barrett, director of the bureau of American republics, was pondered today by Latin-American consular representatives.

"We have got to make our 21 nations stay together to any petty jealousy or difference," Barrett said. "Pan-America has got to stand together or die. It has got to stand together or die. If the spirit of Pan-America does not stand, we shall be lost, with Europe on the one side and Asia on the other. Pan-Americanism is the question of the hour. It is the responsibility of the hour."

Mrs. Veatch Was Pioneer of Salem

Was Native of Boone County, Mo., Born 73 Years Ago, and Had Been in Oregon 52 Years.

Salem, Or., Aug. 24.—Mrs. J. P. Veatch, 50 years a resident of Salem, is dead, aged 73 years, the end coming at her late home, 828 Marion street. Death followed closely that of her daughter-in-law, Mrs. Olivia Veatch, former resident of Salem, but of late years a resident of Boise, who died at Seattle Saturday.

The funeral of Mrs. J. P. Veatch will be held tomorrow afternoon 2 o'clock from Webb & Clough's undertaking parlors.

Mrs. Veatch was born in Boone county, Missouri, and when six years old became a resident of Iowa. She married Mr. Veatch in 1860 and they crossed the plains to Oregon in 1863, settling at LaGrande, Union county. In 1865 they moved to Salem.

The surviving children are: A. W. Veatch of Salem and J. W. Veatch of Boise, Idaho; the daughters are Mrs. Olive Owens and Mrs. Anna Cape of Portland, Mrs. Alice Wynne of Cottage Grove, Mrs. Carrie Tibbals of Fort Casey, Wash., and Ethel Tummeau of Salem. She also leaves two brothers, W. N. Lawrence of Portland and four sisters, Miss Mary F. Lawrence and Mrs. Anna Hasking of Portland, Mrs. Belle Bray and Mrs. Ella Newman of California.

JAPANESE IN SEATTLE ORGANIZE TO BETTER WORKING CONDITIONS

Ultimate End in View Declared to Be Japanese Federation of Labor.

Seattle, Wash., Aug. 24.—(P. N. S.)—Organized to promote closer relations between the workers of Japan and America and to remove causes of misunderstanding and distrust now existing, the Japanese labor association of Seattle, held its public meeting here last night. Nearly 1000 Japanese of all ages attended the meeting, the program of which combined speech making and Japanese music and dancing.

The object of the association, as outlined in an address by C. T. Takahashi, its president, who is also a leading merchant of Seattle, is to weld the Japanese of Seattle and the north-west into an organization that will support the American labor movement in its efforts to improve labor conditions. Takahashi declared that the Japanese were as anxious as the American workmen to improve working conditions and elevate standards of living. The association, he stated, would endeavor to bring Japanese labor to an equality with the standard set by the American wage earner.

It is the intention of the promoters of the association to eventually make it the Japanese central labor council of Seattle, modeling its organization after the union in vogue with affiliated bodies of the American Federation of Labor.

A Japanese federation of labor embracing the oriental workers of America is declared to be an end dreamed of for the future.

He is accompanied only by his niece, Miss Pauline Settenfeld, who will remain with her uncle for a few days until he is comfortably established for his enforced stay in Mendocino county.

Mrs. Henrietta Settenfeld, Ruef's sister, who met him a mile from the prison yesterday morning, said today that she believed her brother had spent the night at Ukiah as he had planned. With her sister, Mrs. A. Hefingh, Emil Kahn, Ruef's business agent, and a few others, Mrs. Settenfeld accompanied Ruef to Cloverdale in an automobile. There Ruef bade his relatives goodbye and with his niece continued on the way to Mendocino. His sister, Kahn and a few others returned to San Francisco by automobile.

Mrs. Settenfeld declared that her brother had not yet perfected business plans to follow upon his return to this city, but said that he would be busily engaged.
