ORDER INCLUDES ALL FACTORIES IN EMPIRE

Action Believed to Be Result of Dissatisfaction of David Lloyd-George.

London, Aug. 26 .- (I, N. S.) -- Britain today took hold of the manufacture of munitions as a state function. An official announcement by the press bureau declared that all ordnance factories in the British empire would be immediately taken over by the government, and would be under control of the ministry of munitions.

This action was believed to be the outcome of David Llyd-George's dissatisfaction with the speed of preparing for the great struggle to come when the allies make their supreme effort. It is expected it will do away with possibility of strikes and may be a forerunner to conscription.
