FOURTH STRAIGHT IS LOST BY CHAMPIONS TO SEAL PASTIMERS

Jawn Lush Larruped Hard and Seals Take Lead in the Coast League Race.

BODIE BIFFS THE BULLET

Doubles by Italian and Dutch Schaller Clinch Game—Stumpf and Fisher Save Shutout for Beavers.

San Francisco, Cal., Sept. 4.—For the fourth straight time the obnoxious little Beavers from north of the Siskiyou stepped right up and took their beating. The score was 5 to 1. It was "Spider Baum" day and the Seal pitcher celebrated it by winning an easy victory, quite in contrast to the usual stunt of a pitcher when he is made over.

And the Seals are leading the old league. That the Beavers were not blanked was due to the blingling of Gus Fisher in the fifth. Stumpf doubled and Gus rushed to the front with a two-bagger. McCredie made good his word in trying to make an outfielder of Fisher and had him stationed in right again yesterday.

August garnered a pair of bingles, Carich followed with a grounder to Jones and Stumpf beat the throw home. Derrick bunted and Beatty threw to Jones to catch Fisher, but the toss was late and the bases were worn filled. Ward rolled the ball to Jones, who caught Fisher at home, and Sepulveda relayed to Beatty to nab Ward for a double play. Baum made Lush pop to Downey and the Seals were out of danger for the rest of the game.

San Francisco made two runs in the first inning when, with the bases full, Beatty's infield single scored Schaller and Jones' infield out allowed Bodie to score.

The Seals added three to the total in the fifth, doubles by Schaller and Bodie scoring Baum, Fitzgerald and Schaller.

EIGHT ARE LEFT OF 128 STARTERS IN TENNIS MEET

Wm. Johnston's Defeat of Behr Makes Him Strong Contender.

Forest Hills, L. I., Sept. 4.—(U. P.)—Of the 128 entries for the national tennis championship only eight were left when play started today in the fifth round for the title. Monday will see the semi-finals, with the victor for the championship on Tuesday.

Aside from the unexpected upset given Karl Behr by W. M. Johnston of California, the players remaining for the closing matches are the men who were generally picked to fight their way through. Johnston's stock was boosted high today as a result of his defeat of Behr, and he is regarded as a strong contender. Another coast player not yet eliminated today, however, as Johnston meets C. J. Griffin of San Francisco. It was Griffin who beat Ward Dawson of Los Angeles and reduced the number of California representatives to three.

McLoughlin has one decision over Johnston for this year in the exposition championship. The "corner" was forced to his limit to win, however, and should this pair meet again here a real battle is anticipated. The matches today were: E. Norris, Williams and William Hand vs. N. C. Wright and T. R. Pell; W. M. Johnston and C. J. Griffin; Maurice McLoughlin and F. T. Hunter.

Davis, for the care and custody of their three children and for \$50 a month alimony. Dr. Davis began suit against his wife several weeks ago, for a decree of divorce, alleging desertion, but yesterday she filed an answer and cross complaint, seeking a decree. She alleges in her cross complaint that her husband was unwilling and unable to support her properly. He receives a salary of \$1500 a year, she alleges. She also avers that she was not allowed much freedom, that her husband was suspicious and that he compelled her to overwork. They were married at Beatrice, Neb., September 27, 1897, and came to Eugene in 1910 from San Francisco. Mrs. Davis left here in 1912.
