

# ANNUAL SHOOT OF NATIONAL GUARD AT CLACKAMAS STARTED

Sergeant Pearson of Roseburg Captures Butterfield Trophy for Third Time.

## HANSEN'S SCORE IS HIGH

Seventy-three Hits Out of Possible 75 Hits Scored at 900 Yards; State Team Match Today.

Crack shots of the Oregon National Guard have lost none of their cunning, compared with last year. Yesterday, in the first day's shoot of the annual state rifle and pistol contests, the individual scoring was very high, many of the contestants turning in scores of 45 and 49 out of a possible 50. Wednesday, in the preliminary shoot, Sergeant S. W. Pearson of Roseburg captured the Butterfield trophy for the third time. Pearson's score was 57 out of a possible 100. The individual contest for the state trophy was run up to the 1000 yard distance yesterday and was completed today. The distances were, rapid fire at 100 and 300 yards, slow fire at 300, 500 and 1000 yards. Sergeant Harry Hansen, Company C, Third Infantry, with 43 out of 75 hits, was ranking man in the 600 yard shoot, with Corporal D. R. Chase, Seventh company, C. A. C., second with a score of 72. This was the only distance in which the winning scores were completed and announced.

**State Team Match Today.** For the shooting yesterday there will be given four silver medals and five bronze medals.

The state team match is being shot today. The distances are the same as in the individual matches. The state trophy goes to the winning team in the match, while bronze medals will be awarded each member of the team. The governor's trophy match will probably be shot off Saturday morning. The state pistol match will conclude the shoot. It is a free for all match, open to civilian clubs and organizations as well as ex-servicemen.

The contesting individuals and teams represent all arms of the service and all parts of the state. Portland has six teams, one team from headquarters of the Third Infantry, one from the Eighth company, coast artillery; one from Troop A, cavalry, and one from the Naval Militia. Eugene has two teams entered and Oregon City, Woodburn, Salem, Dallas, McMinnville, Corvallis, Albany, Cottage Grove, Roseburg, Medford and Ashland have one each.

**Officers in Command.** Adjutant General White is in general charge of the competition, with Colonel McLaughlin as executive officer and Major W. W. Wilson range officer. Other officers detailed are Captain Eugene Mosberger, Woodburn, in charge of the pistol; Captain Frank Vincil, Roseburg, camp surgeon; Captain George Shumacher, camp adjutant; Captain M. B. Huntley, Eugene, range officer; Captain Leo Pironi, Captain H. O. Hulse and Lieutenant Fred M. West, all of Portland, range officers; Captain A. J. Vance, Medford, range officer; Captain J. A. Buchanan, Roseburg, range officer; and Lieutenant R. R. Knox, Albany, range officer.

## CANCER CURABLE IF TREATED PROMPTLY, SAYS DR. MACKENZIE

In an address yesterday afternoon, Dr. K. A. J. Mackenzie suggested that cleanliness is one of the surest pre-

ventives of cancer. He said that cancer if treated surgically in its earlier stages is curable. He advised immediate operation as soon as the surgeon is convinced the growth is malignant. Waiting to be sure before an operation is made, he said, is dangerous.

Eighteen thousand women died last year of cancer of the breast, he continued, adding that these lives were wasted, because they could have been saved if the operations had been performed when the cancers were local. The address precipitated much discussion, some of the physicians disagreeing with Dr. Mackenzie that all cases of cancer are curable if the operation is performed before the growth becomes malignant and while it is still localized. Dr. Ernest F. Tucker and Dr. A. N. Creadick were among the speakers yesterday afternoon. **A New Method of Baking Cakes**
