SCHEMES TO FLOAT THE WORLD'S BIGGEST LOAN ARE DISCUSSED

J. J. Hill Arrives to Participate in Planning and Favors Making Loan.

New York, Sept. 13.—(U. P.)—With the arrival of J. J. Hill, railroad magnate, negotiations were started for the world's greatest loan-estimated at from one half to one billion dollars, lestred by representatives of the Euopean allies.

Hill is reported to be strongly in fafor of the loan, maintaining that if it is not made, America may find her banner crops a failure, inasmuch as a Europe without money could not purchase in the great American market. Moreover, it was said he considers that South America will step into the breach if America does not, and that she will furnish not only a loan, but in addition will be a source of much of the allies' supplies, aside from mu-

The form of the proposed loan is unknown, but it was suggested in the street that a syndicate composed of bankers from all parts of the country will be formed to underwrite it and offer the public notes at 5 per cent, submarines and aeroplanes would secured by France, England and Rus-


