

KAISER WILHELM AND HOLLAND QUEEN EACH IN AN AUTO SMASH

Wilhelmina's Machine at The Hague Suffers Mishap and Kaiser's on Front Wrecked

Amsterdam, Sept. 21.—(U. P.) Kaiser Wilhelm and Princess Joachim were slightly injured in an automobile accident today, according to Berlin dispatches. The imperial automobile was wrecked. No other details were given.

The Hague, Sept. 21.—(U. P.)—Queen Wilhelmina of Holland and the 6-year-old princess, Juliana Louise, narrowly escaped death or serious injury today when their automobile crashed head-on into another car, wrecking both.

Both the queen and princess were slightly bruised. Occupants of the other car were seriously injured and had to be sent to hospital.

The queen and her daughter were returning from the opening of parliament, where the queen made an address.

The princess leaped as the cars crashed, but the queen remained seated and was showered with class.

She was calm and unflinching, unassisted, instructing her chauffeur to summon physicians to attend the others.

The accident occurred near parliament. Members were excited over a report that the queen had been seriously hurt, until a statement was made from the rostrum that she had escaped.

The queen was applauded when she told parliament that the government will introduce a bill eliminating the present hindrance to woman suffrage.

She announced also that parliament will be asked to vote credits for an increased navy and for special defense of the island colonies.

Bills for state insurance and for reorganization of the taxation system will be supported by the government.

Labor Men Oppose Service. Vancouver, B. C., Sept. 21.—(U. P.)—Opposition to the proposed policy of conscription is manifesting itself in the annual meeting here of the Trades and Labor Congress of Canada.

A number of the 170 delegates present are advocating sending all persons now interned in prison camps to their native countries at the close of the war.

Accuses Wealthy Brother of Fraud

Mrs. Caroline F. Olney, of Oakland, Cal., charges C. W. Riskey, aided by other rich men, in conspiracy.

San Francisco, Sept. 21.—(U. P.)—Charles W. Riskey, H. G. Humphrey and W. H. Moffat, said to be the largest and wealthiest cattle men in the west, are accused of conspiracy to defraud by a sensational suit filed in the superior court this afternoon by Mrs. Caroline F. Olney, a widow of Oakland, and a sister of the defendant, Riskey.

Mrs. Olney accuses her brother of resorting to fraud to deprive her of one-third the income of a \$2,000,000 corporation and charges that Humphrey and Moffat conspired with Riskey to defraud her.

Kaiser, Czar and King George Like to See Themselves in Film, Declares Veteran Photographer.

San Francisco, Sept. 21.—(U. P.)—The Kaiser, the czar and King George are "movie" fiends. So are other royal princes of Europe. They all like to be "mugged" in the movies and then see themselves riding in film.

P. E. Eft of Copenhagen says so. And he ought to know, for he has been taking pictures of kings and queens all his life, first with the camera and then by film.

At the Hotel Washington today, prior to departure for Los Angeles, Eft said that the Kaiser, czar, King George and all the other big ones abroad pose for him. "I have been taking the czar all his life," said Eft. "He is a charming fellow." Once when he liked a picture he slipped me on the back and said "great stuff," or words to that effect.

"King George is a good subject, too. He sits quite still. The Kaiser likes to be 'mugged,' but they all want company in the picture. They don't like to be photographed or filmed alone."

"Altogether I would rather pose a monarch than a commoner. They 'sit' better. And they like it better."

Will Not Proceed Against 2 Officers

Washington, Sept. 21.—(U. P.)—No proceedings will be taken by the war department against Captain Waldron and Lieutenant Gardner of Fort Stevens, Or., because they were with a party of friends in a restaurant at Astoria when a toast to the German cause was drunk.

Secretary of War Garrison has sent a letter to Senator Chamberlain in which he stated the explanation of the officers was satisfactory and "that the entire incident was too trivial to warrant action."

One of Stefansson Party Has Died

Ottawa, Ont., Sept. 21.—(U. P.)—The new land explorer Stefansson located in the frozen north is urged in part, with an abundance of game, and a coastline of 100 miles, said his report made public today by the naval service department.

The report, dated Herschel Island, August 2, via Nome, said that Engineer Blue died of scurvy, but that no other members of the expedition were lost in the months when the world feared that the explorer and his followers had perished.

Woman Shoots Man, Then Kills Herself

Aberdeen, Wash., Sept. 21.—Ann Johnson, a domestic, aged 25, after attempting to kill Joseph Stein this morning, turned upon herself and committed suicide.

SUSPECTS ESCAPE TENACIOUS BULLDOG AND HAIL OF BULLETS

Pair Later Arrested and One, Police Say, Confessed the Theft of Auto Tire.

Hail of bullets from a detective's revolver and the savage attack of a bulldog that clung tenaciously to the trousers of a fleeing robber suspect, aroused the residents in the neighborhood of Twenty-second and Kearney streets last night.

The man escaped after a spirited chase that led for several blocks. Two men were taken into custody later at Fifth and Washington streets, however, and one of them, the police say, confessed to the theft of an automobile tire.

The men gave the names of Fred Fowler and Roy Patterson. The stolen auto tire was identified as the property of Dr. D. H. Hand.

Young Woman Discovers Suspects. Fowler's companion was seated in an automobile near the scene of the chase and saw the two men flee away.

The presence of the two suspects was first discovered by Miss Florence Rybke of 77 Kearney street. She was sitting on the front porch with a number of other occupants of the house when a strange noise was heard in the bushes near by. She arose to investigate and a man was seen to run toward the alley.

The police were notified and Detectives Howell and Hill responded. The sleuths found an automobile tire hidden in the alley, and suspecting that the thieves would return for it, they concealed themselves and kept watch.

About 11:30 o'clock the suspect, who later proved to be Fowler, appeared at the alley, but when he saw the sleuths started to run.

Detective Hill fired four shots at the fleeing man, and a big bulldog joined in the chase on Twenty-second street. The dog lunged to the man's clothes for a hundred feet or more, but finally lost his hold and the man escaped. In the meantime the second man had disappeared in his machine.

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Umatilla Officials Come for Meeting

Delay in Installation of Water System Necessitates Conference With O. W. R. & N. Company; Joint Supply Plan.

Umatilla, Or., Sept. 21.—Owing to repeated delays on the part of the O. W. R. & N. company in fulfilling its part of an agreement with the city of Umatilla in the matter of providing a city water system, it is made necessary for a committee to go to Portland in an effort to hasten the work.

By the agreement the city was to buy the distributing system and the railroad company was to provide the well, pumps and tank. Though there has been a lapse of 60 days since the city has completed its part of the agreement at a cost of between \$11,000 and \$12,000, all that the company has done in the meantime is to sink a well.

Funds for the city's share were raised by bond sales. These bonds are dated June 1, consequently the city of Umatilla is paying interest and with no income.

A. G. Means, Mayor Starcher and one other member of the council of Umatilla will go to Portland to discuss the matter.

Y. M. C. A. Features Planned for Boys

Twenty of Older Lads Will Have Charge of Certain of the Activities This Year.

Extensive plans for work in the boys' division are being laid at the Y. M. C. A. by J. J. Meehan, boys' secretary, for the winter.

One of the innovations of the year will be the direction of the activities of the lads by 20 of the older boys, from 17 to 20 years of age. A meeting of these leaders has been called by Mr. Meehan for 6:30 o'clock tonight, when a program of activities will be formulated. Each will be assigned to conduct the affairs of some club and will have general direction over the work in his department. All have been association members for at least seven years.

One of the big events of the year will be the Round Up October 1, when 500 boys will gather to talk over the affairs of the winter. There will be a banquet when tables will be set on the floor of the gymnasium and a program of "stunts" that were given at camp will be a feature. Class schedules and games will be discussed. Parents are invited to the program after the business session.

The "Camp Annual," the official magazine for the boys' camp, will be issued within a few days under the direction of the Boys' Camp Alumni association.

From December 27 to January 1 there will be a holiday hike by 12 older boys into the region about Spirit Lake camp. Mr. Meehan announced that the first boys who register will be taken on the trip, but the last must pay their expenses out of money that they have earned themselves and are not permitted to seek funds from their parents. If there is little snow in the mountains the lads will take the Mount Adams trail and hike 57 miles across the mountains.

CHAMBERLAIN DIFFERS WITH SUFFRAGETTES WHO CALL ON HIM

Senator Does Not Approve of Methods Employed in Furthering Cause.

Senator George E. Chamberlain was waited upon this afternoon by 30 members of the Women's Congressional Union who wanted his support of the Susan B. Anthony amendment for nation wide suffrage.

The senator promised his support but he differed with them absolutely in the manner in which they have gone into the fight.

"Your body came here and used means hardly legitimate to defeat me at the last election," he declared. "I was the originator of the national suffrage, yet my very ideas were distorted in an effort to defeat me."

"The matter is not a political one. At least not as far as party is concerned. There are suffragettes who are Republicans and others who are Democrats. Cut out the fireworks and carry on a careful deliberate campaign along the right kind of lines and you cannot help but succeed."

Virginia Arnold, one of the delegates, attempted to defend the action of the congressional union at the last election. She made a long talk. Fully a dozen of the women addressed the senator.

Brook Goes to Lome. Lome, Or., Sept. 21.—(U. P.)—Brook of Heppner has accepted the position of cashier of the Bank of Lome. Mr. Brook is married and has a family, who will move to Lome with him about October 1.

Auto Damaged in Crash. When a Sunnyside streetcar at Fifth and Morrison streets, yesterday afternoon, struck an automobile driven by Victor McKenzie of 701 Hoyt street, the machine was knocked forward and struck another car in charge of F. Hale of 1721 Davis street. Mr. McKenzie's machine was badly mangled, but not put

out of commission. The other car was slightly damaged.

Fire Damages Hospital. San Bernardino, Cal., Sept. 21.—(U. P.)—Sixteen patients were injured and the lives of 159 others were endangered when one of the buildings of the San Bernardino county hospital caught fire shortly before noon today.

The injured and other patients were removed safely and the fire was extinguished before serious damage was done to the hospital.

Want Bigger Signs On Neutral Vessels

Germany Desiring Not to Injure Neutrals by Diver Warfare Wants Markings Plain.

Washington, Sept. 21.—(U. P.)—Further evidence that Germany intends to steer clear of trouble with neutral ships, reached the state department today in the form of a request for planer marking of these vessels.

"The department is in receipt of a communication from the German ambassador to the effect that he is advised by his government," said a statement, "that merchant vessels which desire to show their neutral allegiance by painting their national colors on the side, make the mistake of having these distinctive signs so small that they cannot be made out from a distance."

"The German government suggests, therefore, that the foregoing be brought to the attention of American shipowners in their own interests."

British Transport Sunk by Diver

Berlin, via wireless to Saville, L. I., Sept. 21.—(U. P.)—A German submarine sank a 15,000-ton British transport of Candia, according to a Constantinople telegram received here today.

The transport was heading for Egypt with troops, destined for the Gallipoli operations. No details were given regarding casualties. Candia is a town of Crete.

Mosquito Fleet Returns. San Francisco, Sept. 21.—(U. P.)—The torpedo boat destroyers Preble, Whipple, Paul Jones and Perry, constituting the "Mosquito fleet," returned today after an absence of two months from this port. During that time a month was spent in cruising Alaskan waters.

"Only that Mrs. Robin has a new baby, and that she is trying to teach it to fly, and it's the cunningest little thing you ever saw, and it went and flew right up into the lilac bush over by the fence."
