"Winged M" to Be Minus Star Halfback in Turkey Game With U. of O Eleven.

CHANGE IN THE DEFENSIVE

Oregon Men Said to Be Eager to Get Revenge for the Defeat They Had Early in Season.

Portland's football classic—the annual gridiron battle between the University of Oregon and the Multnomah Amateur Athletic club—will be played on Multnomah field next Thursday afternoon at 2 o'clock.

The "Winged M" team will be minus its star halfback, Grover Francis, in the turkey day battle, and the loss of this player will make some difference in the club lineup.

Captain Rupert changes on changing the defensive lineup. George Philbrook, who played a great game against the Olympic team last Sunday, will be used on the defensive end.

The Lemon-Yellow aggregation will be in better condition than the clubmen this year. The majority of the "Winged M" players still feel the effects of the sea trip up from San Francisco, and they have but four days in which to get their bearings.

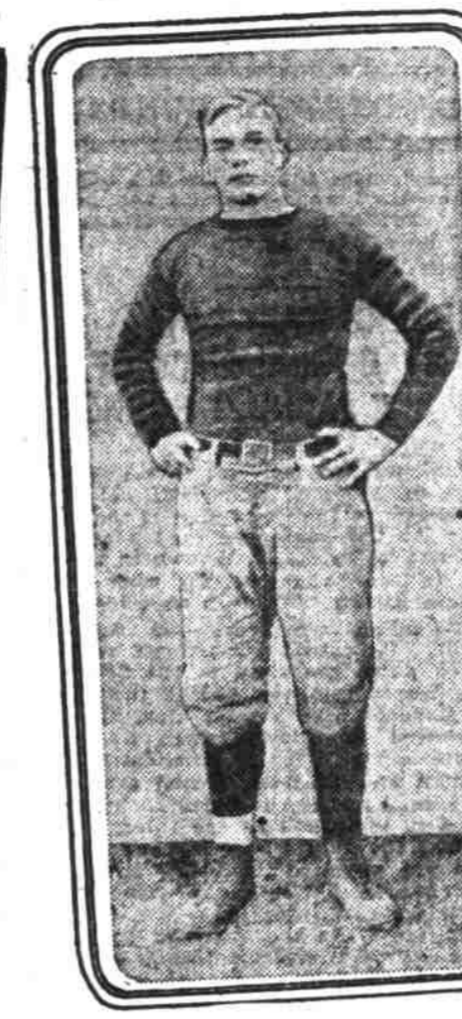
Oregon has but four victories to its credit over the club men, and, according to reports from Eugene, they are seeking revenge for the early season defeat handed them at their bearings.

PORTLAND STAYS IN LEAGUE IF AL BAUM IS ABLE TO FIX IT UP

Prxy of Coast Coterie Says Railroads Are Coming to Bat on Rates.

ROSE CITY SHOULD BIDE

Question of Transferring Franchise Never Considered, Avers Baseball Chief in San Francisco.

San Francisco, Nov. 20.—(U. S. N. S.)—Portland will not be shooed out of the Coast league field, according to President Al Baum.

"I'm almost positive," said Baum, "that the circuit will be in no way changed when we open next season. During the past 24 hours I have been in frequent consultation with the railroad officials and they assure me that satisfactory progress is being made on our case. That can mean only one thing—we will get the court-tesles we have requested.

"The impression that we decided definitely to erase Portland's name from our list at the meeting seems to be widespread," he said, "when such, as I was careful to explain, was not the case at all. At no time did I believe that we would be forced to such a regrettable extremity. I have tried to make it plain that Portland would be dropped only in the event that the railroad officials refused to grant us the desired rates. Now the question is shot at me from all sides. 'Where will the franchise be transferred?'

"There will be no transferring of any franchise until after Portland has ceased to belong to the Pacific Coast league and as far as I can see that won't be this year nor next nor the year after. The railroad officials have shown every disposition to treat us fairly in this matter. The question received a favorable vote from the general manager in attendance at the meeting and is now in the hands of a special committee which will pass on it definitely during the next few days."
