ONE of the prettiest circus acts ever touring the west will be the headline attraction at the Empress Theatre starting tomorrow afternoon. "Original Act Beautiful" is the title, introducing a big Arabian white horse together with four beautiful white English setters, presenting famous hunting scenes in living statues. The act is entirely dressed in white and a man and a woman in white riding habit take part in the exhibition. Happy Jack Gardner and company will present "The War Zone," a comedy-drama. The scene is laid in a field hospital on the western frontier. Seymour and Robinson will offer a comedy acrobatic turn. The male member of the pair does a lot of sensational and freak tumbling stunts, while his pretty partner's acrobatic feats are only slightly less difficult and thrilling. Ollie Carew, a charming comedienne, late of "September Moon" company, will offer a pretty singing and dancing act. Mumford and Thompson in "Humorousities" introduce a lot of humor and good singing. Ann and Corbett are novelty drum and hoop dancers, who are introducing soft and hard shoe dancing in a revolving drum, which is said to be a big novelty. Eddie Lovett and Annie Wyatt will present a comedy singing, dancing and talking act entitled "The Substitute."

Fourteen girls will shine at the Orpheum this week in the show which will open this afternoon. The headline is Laura Nelson Hall, who was chosen by Henry W. Savak to portray the title role of "Everywoman," and who is considered to be one of the most beautiful women on the American stage. Miss Hall and her little company will present a comedy called "Demi-Tasse."

Four Portland girls will appear as the extra attraction in the show. They are Frieda, Hilda, Alice and Betty Werren, daughters of Mr. and Mrs. F. Werren of 24 Hamilton avenue, who will sing several harmony selections. All four girls are native Oregonians, having been born and reared in Portland. Alice and Hilda are stenographers employed by the Portland Railway, Light & Power company, and Frieda is a modiste. They range in years from 16 to 21. The Misses Werren are under the chaperonage of Mrs. Jean Wolk, instructor of girls' gymnastics in the Washington and Lincoln high schools.

Other acts in the new Orpheum show are Ballet Divertissement, nine girl dancers from the Metropolitan Opera house in New York, appearing with Swan Weed, a San Francisco girl, as star; "General" Ed Lavine, the man who

has "soldiered" all his life; Nonette, the violinist who sings; Lew Hawkins, the Chesterfield of minstrelsy; the Flying Werntz Duo and the Orpheum Travel Weekly which will show moving picture views of France, French India and Madagascar.

Starting with the matinees today Dillon and King will present at the Lyric theatre "Madam Cherry." Mike and Ike are in Paris having a good time and run across Madame Cherry who leads these two funsters a merry chase. Miss Grace Allen, the pretty little sweetheart of the Dillon and King company, will be seen in the title role. Charlie Kelly will be seen as a dashing lieutenant and Frank Harrington will essay the role of Frenchman. There will be six musical numbers besides the opening and closing ensembles. On Tuesday night, as usual, the profit-sharing plan will again be given and on Friday night, after each performance, the chorus will present their customary contest. Thursday being Thanksgiving day, performances will be given the same as Sunday.

Theatre Operated, Owned by Women

London's Newest Wartime Feature Notable Departure; Scene Shifters Live Wear Skirts. London, Nov. 20.—A theatre owned and operated by women is London's newest wartime feature. Stagehands, scene shifters and other male workers at the Kingway enlisted one by one until the playhouse closed. It is now reopened by the proprietress, Miss Lena Ashwell and mere man plays no part in its conduct except as an actor or in the audience. LYRIC—A comedy young woman, well known in London stage circles, is stage manager. The limelights are worked by girls who sit aloft amidst the upper scenes, clad in mannish overalls and linen coats. The electric switchboard operator is likewise feminine. All the scene shifters wear skirts and have always done so. A uniformed female ticket taker stands at the door while the ticket offices are devoid of men. A woman's orchestra furnishes the music under the footlights. There is even a woman press agent.

Where Is Applause Of Yesteryear?

Where is the applause of yesteryear? The crowds come and pay and stay, but compared with the thunderous receptions of old the applause of today is a faint and chilly pattern, comments the New York Times. For with every passing season applause in the theatre is growing fainter and fainter. A blight seems to have fallen

upon an ancient and honorable custom. Many causes are at work at this dismal task. The gallery where once the gods stamped and whistled and cheered is either deserted or gone entirely. Its widowed patrons are at the movies, which are teaching them to be as humanly silent as the photoplay itself. The movies are partially responsible, perhaps, the disappearance of the orchestra may have something to do with it. Certainly the calmer acting and the quieter dramaturgy of the twentieth century tend ever to invite your reflective approval rather than the immediate outburst.
