Weather Conditions. A severe storm is central over British Columbia, which is moving rapidly eastward. Warnings were changed to southwest this morning at Aberdeen, Strait of Fuca and at Puget sound reports. The following maximum wind velocities occurred since yesterday morning: North Head, 72 miles southeast, Tisowan Island, 82 miles southwest, and Seattle, 44 miles east. Moderately heavy to heavy rains have fallen in western Oregon, Washington, northern Idaho and extreme northern California. The pressure area extends from California eastward to the Gulf states, and thence northeastward along the Atlantic coast. The barometer is relatively low over the upper Mississippi valley, and light snow has fallen in that section of the country.
