COST OF OPERATING APARTMENT HOUSES IS UNDER DISCUSSION

How Money May Be Made Out of Business Considered at Meeting of Owners.

"What does it cost to operate an apartment house?" "How may money be made in the apartment house business?" Answers to these questions were essayed at a meeting of the apartment house owners or operators at a meeting last Monday night in the Central library.

Speakers were E. B. McNaughton, Robert Strong, W. D. Whitcomb and H. Goshier.

It was admitted that the average apartment house owner does not know what it costs to operate the establishment.

A final recommendation was that profits be made more sure, not by raising rents to tenants, but by practice of greater efficiency in management, including the abolishing of unnecessary expenses.

Mr. Whitcomb presented charts showing in detail the expenses that must be figured both in bare meeting the costs of an apartment house and in running such an institution at a profit.

Summarized, these figures follow: Ground at \$20,000, building at \$100,000. Rent per month, \$1,000. Fixed charges, \$200.00. Operating and maintenance expenses, regular, \$200.00. Operating and maintenance expenses, irregular, \$100.00. Total per month, \$1,500.00. \$1,167.58.

Thirty apartments or 80 rooms not including space occupied by operator or janitor. Average annual income per room to meet expenses and give a fair return on investment, \$14.50. Net if every apartment is occupied all year, \$1,740.00. Average necessary annual income per room to meet expenses only, \$17.11. Average necessary annual income per room to give absolutely nothing to the operator for his time or for his investment in land, building, equipment and fixturing, \$19.89.
