COLLEGES COMPLETE ATHLETIC SCHEDULES WITHOUT TROUBLE

Annual Conference of Intercollegiate Delegates Adjourns; Successful Session, CONFERENCE IS STRONG

President Dymond's Statement Shows Need of Two Separate Bodies—California Delays Training.

Completing their schedules in football, baseball, basketball, track and wrestling, the annual meeting of the Pacific Northwest intercollegiate conference adjourned next year. The session was the best ever enjoyed and bearing the squabble over the freshmen rule, there was very little grumbling over the rulings. Every recommendation suggested by the University of Oregon representative passed the conference and these were adopted in the Pacific Coast Intercollegiate Conference rules.

It was decided to stage the Pacific Northwest intercollegiate track and field championships in Pullman, Wash. This is the only town in the northwest which has made this meet pay. Portland and Seattle have both tried but failed. Portland has tried to meet again this season, but it was not enthusiastically received. The Pacific Coast intercollegiate track and field meet will be held in Berkeley, May 6.

The basketball championships of the northwest will be decided in the western division this year. The eastern teams will play among themselves as they did last year and the western teams will play among themselves.

The basketball title will be decided by percentage. This action was taken because the University of Oregon has dropped basketball for the 1915 season. Washington and O. A. C. will play two games against each other on their respective floors and will play one home and one away game with Whitman, Washington State and University of Idaho.

George Varnell of Spokane was named chairman of the football official selection committee and George Bertz, a member of the sporting department, will probably mean that Dietz's team will be seen in action against the Multnomah club eleven.

Whitman scheduled a game with Idaho during the meeting of the delegates expressed himself as being well pleased with the outcome of the conference. John Strout, graduate manager of the University of California, before departing stated that he would soon hold a conference with Graduate Manager Behrens of Stanford. He was confident that Stanford would change its attitude in the near future.

Coasters Make Announcement. The Pacific Coast Intercollegiate conference, formed during the annual meeting of the Pacific Northwest intercollegiate conference, December 1, 1915, in view of the fact that three of its four members are also members of the Northwest conference, makes the following announcement: December 1, 1915, in view of the fact that three of its four members are also members of the Northwest conference, makes the following announcement:

"Athletics in the Northwest conference colleges that are west of the Cascade mountains, to wit, the University of Oregon, the University of Washington and the Oregon State Agricultural college, have reached a stage where these institutions desire to compete under a one-year rule, and also to compete with the University of California and Stanford University, hitherto non-conference institutions.

"The Northwest Conference colleges that are east of the Cascade mountains have at this meeting affirmed that they do not desire a one-year residence rule for themselves, or to compete regularly with California schools.

Chance Given to Stanford. "The University of Oregon, the University of Washington and Oregon State Agricultural college, therefore, being desirous of maintaining the present status of the Northwest conference and at the same time of bringing the University of California and Stanford University under uniform rules for competition, have organized the Pacific Coast Intercollegiate conference for the purpose of governing such competitions under uniform rules for the enforcement of the one-year residence rule among themselves. It is not the intention or expectation of the Northwest conference that Northwest conference schedules are to be materially disturbed; and it is the plan of the institutions that are members of both conferences that games among themselves shall continue under the championship in each conference.

"All rumors or statements that the formation of the Coast conference has proceeded out of hostility to the Northwest conference or from a desire to disrupt the Northwest conference are untrue."

Digest of Constitution. The constitution of the new Pacific Coast conference provides that each institution shall select a single voting representative who shall be a faculty member not financially interested in athletics, and who may work with the voting of athletic directors, coaches or graduate managers.

The conference may at any regular meeting constitute itself a board of appeal to which may be referred for possible reinstatement all students who have lost their amateur standing through ignorance or pardonable cause. No student shall participate in intercollegiate sports unless he has passed all entrance requirements, unless he carries 11 hours of work for the semester of residence previous to participation and 11 hours of work satisfactory
