Though the Bulgarians have done vallantly, two assaults against the British front cost them eight thousand troops. They swept forward in mass formation through a heavy fog to with-in 500 yards of the British line. Then machine guns and rifles shattered

By a successful flanking attack, the Bulgars, however, forced the French to evacuate strong positions in the hills, and their artillery thereupon wrecked the French second line.
