ANGLO-FRENCH FORCES OWEN OUT OF SERBIA

Germanic Conquest of Country Completed by Occupation of Lake Doiran and Gievgeji; Losses Heavy.

TWO ENGLISH DIVISIONS REPORTED ANNIHILATED

Berlin Reports Country Free of Enemy Excepting for Few Guerillas.

Berlin, by wireless to Sayville, N. Y., Dec. 13.--(U. P.)--The Teutonic conquest of Serbia is completed, for the Anglo-French forces have been completely driven out of the country.

Bulgarians under General Todoroff occupied Lake Doiran and Gievgeji, two English divisions were annihilated in the final fighting.

There are no more free French or English Macedonia, the statement said. The last Serbian regulars have fled into Albania, while the Bulgarians are pursuing them by way of Struga and Gievradi. Moreover, with the exception of a few hundred guerillas, no hostile forces remain in Serbian territory to oppose the central allies.

BULGARIAN ADVANCE REACHES GREECE AT A NUMBER OF POINTS

Athens, Dec. 13.--(U. P.)--The allies reported evacuation of Gievgeji and Lake Doiran, in the southeastern corner of Serbia, was confirmed today. Pressing forward slowly, the Bulgarians are said to be five miles from the Greek border.

Since Saturday the allies have been retreating into Greece, in disorder, some reports indicate, and are expected to make a stand and fight off the pursuers at almost any moment. It is understood here that in the event the Bulgarians enter Greek territory and continue their onslaught against the allies, Greece will not oppose them. The Bulgarian advance has reached Greece at several points, and while the Greek military authorities are closely watching these forces, no official statement is obtainable as to what course the government intends, should the Bulgarians invade Greek territory.

Though the Bulgarians have done valiantly, two assaults against the British front cost them eight thousand troops. They swept forward in mass formation through a heavy fog to within 500 yards of the British line. Then machine guns and rifles shattered their ranks.

By a successful flanking attack, the Bulgarians, however, forced the French to evacuate strong positions in the hills, and their artillery thereupon wrecked the French second line.

Montenegrins Captured.

Vienna, Dec. 13.--(U. P.)--Six thousand prisoners have been taken by the Austrian invaders of Montenegro, west of Ipek, the war office claimed today. The invaders have arrived at Korica and Rozaj.

The message was an urgent appeal to the rulers to halt the slaughter and prevent wives and mothers from being further bereaved. It suggested an immediate truce, after which, through mediation and discussion in the Ford peace court, the war might be ended and soldiers instead of "hanging another bitter winter in the trenches may be sent back to their labors and firesides."

Bulgars Attack in Snow.

London, Dec. 13.--(U. P.)--In spite of a terrific snowstorm, 250,000 Bulgarians are attacking the allies along the Greek border. Official advices received here today say the Bulgars have lost 8000 men in their last two attacks. The allies also have suffered heavy losses.

Agree With Greece.

Saloniki, Dec. 13.--(U. P.)--A satisfactory agreement has been reached between the allied and Greek authorities for free movement of the allies' foodstuffs between Saloniki and the frontier, the zone in which the allies must retreat. As part of the agreement, the allies 'took over' the Saloniki custom house.

GREAT NAVY NEEDED BY UNITED STATES, IS SEN. TILLMAN'S PLEA

Urges Passage of \$11,000,000 Appropriation for Government Armor Plant, TO ENLARGE NAVY YARDS

Appointment of Robert Lansing Confirmed--Stock Exchange Regulation Bill Defeated by Senate.

Washington, Dec. 13.--(U. P.)--"A great American navy second only to that of Great Britain is an imperative necessity, not only for national honor, but to maintain the peace and nobler Monroe doctrine for Americans." So said Senator Ben Tillman of South Carolina, chairman of the senate naval affairs committee, in a speech from the floor of the senate, today, urging the passage of his bill providing for an appropriation of \$11,000,000 to construct a government armor plant.

"It stands for reason," said Senator Tillman. "That a stronger and more efficient navy would do away with the necessity for a larger army. If our navy makes it impossible for an enemy to land troops we will not need a large army."

Progressives Get Plums.

Washington, Dec. 13.--(U. P.)--Old line Republicans of the senate today notified the Progressive Republicans and Senator Poindexter with some of the chief committee assignments.

The radicals, unopposed in the senate to place Senator Kenyon on the foreign relations committee, were restored to good humor by the following appointments from their ranks:

Poindexter, interstate commerce; Clapp, Philippines, Norris, banking and currency; Works, judiciary; Borah and Cummins, judiciary and interstate commerce; Jones, commerce.

World Tax Mutinions.

Washington, Dec. 13.--(U. P.)--A resolution levying sufficient tax on munitions to pay the entire cost of America's preparedness program was introduced in the senate today by Senator Kenyon of Iowa.

Lansing Confirmed.

Washington, Dec. 13.--(U. P.)--President Wilson's appointment of Robert Lansing as secretary of state was confirmed today. Adjournment was taken to Thursday.

Stock Exchange Bill Defeated.

Washington, Dec. 13.--(U. P.)--The senate today by a vote of 43 to 25 defeated Senator Owen's stock exchange regulation bill.

FORD SENDS A PEACE APPEAL TO KINGS OF WAR-MAD COUNTRIES

Oregon Senator Proposes That All Boys Between the Years of 12 and 23 Be Enrolled in U. S. Army.

BOYS WOULD SERVE ON SPECIAL CADET CORPS

From 18 to 23 They Would Be in Regular Citizens' Army 20 Days a Year.

Washington, Dec. 13.--(U. P.)--Conscription to raise the proposed citizen army advocated by the administration was proposed in a bill by Senator Chamberlain of Oregon, introduced today. The Oregonian proposed that all but those specially exempted for physical, religious or other specific reasons would be obliged to serve between the ages of 12 and 23 under penalty of a \$100 fine for failure to comply. Those between 12 and 17 years of age would be organized into cadet corps, while from 18 to 23 they would be in the citizens' army.

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LIND'S SISTER AND BROTHER HEARD FROM

Victim of "Green Trunk" Mystery Born in Sweden and Visited Old Home in 1911; Identity Established

BROTHER RECOGNIZES PICTURE PRINTED HERE

Real Name Was James Linn but He Changed It to Lind Years Ago.

John Lind, the victim of the "green trunk" murder, at 405 Stark street, Friday, November 13, 1911. His sister and a brother living in the United States. The brother, who resides in Chicago, has positively identified the likeness of the murdered man, which appeared in The Journal, as that of his brother, John.

A photograph, the only available one in the Chicago files, has been forwarded to Chief of Police Clark.

John Lind, whose body was found in the green trunk in the Wilamette river, was born in Trifol, Halland, Sweden, January 1, 1862, according to the Chicago Directory.

He was one of a family of nine children, having five sisters and three brothers. The two sisters and a brother are in Sweden; two sisters and one brother live in this country, of whom a sister and a brother reside in Chicago. The parents are dead.

Real Name Was James Linn. John Lind, or Lind, was not the dead man's right name. It was James Linn but for some reason he changed it several years ago.

Lind, to call him by the name he was known by, came to America about 20 years ago, settling in the vicinity of Boston. There he lived for some 25 years, being employed as a coachman and later the driver of a public auto. He was a coachman for a Mr. Roberts of Wakefield, Mass.

After coming to this country he paid two visits to his native Sweden. The last time was in 1911, when he was known to have about 25,000 crowns, or \$62,500. Since then his American relatives are not informed as to his financial affairs, but he was not prone to talk of money matters.

Three years ago Lind left Boston. He made a short stop in Chicago, and then went to San Francisco, where he lived for some time.

BAKER PROPOSES TO RUSH CONSTRUCTION OF THE AUDITORIUM

Commissioner Would Keep Faith With People, Who Voted Necessary Bonds.

"I intend to proceed with the building of the public auditorium and have it complete as soon as possible." With these words, George L. Baker, city commissioner, today publicly answered those who advocate postponing the construction or abandoning the public auditorium plan, in an address this afternoon before the members of the council of the chamber of commerce.

"The people voted the bonds for the public auditorium," said Baker. "The vote was two to one, and mandatory. Later the people indicated unwillingness to appropriate money for a site for a larger building and said they were satisfied with the Market block, 210 by 210. My faith is clear before me to follow instructions, and I shall do so."

George C. Magon, manager of the Non-Farmers league, said, to get a view of public sentiment, he had talked to 500 people during the past three weeks, and they had all indicated wish to postpone the auditorium. He exhibited a drawing intended to show that the auditorium as planned would only give about 2000 people view of the stage.

J. A. Poulhous, resident architect of the auditorium, pointed out the advantages of unobstructed seating to the audience. He said that he was not averse to an auditorium of many meeting rooms.
