compared with \$34,342,475 for November last year, making an increase of This great increase is somewhat exaggerated, however, as construction

work a year ago was greatly depressed by reason of the war. The building permits for November, 1913, totaled \$41,005,514. The reports, however, show much greater activty and the execution of

long-delayed building plans. Only 15 of the 70 cities report decreases. An increase of 5% is shown for the 11 months of 1915, as compared with the same period last year. This year Gun Fights Enliven the total is \$639,204,144; last year it

The greatest gain for the month is reported in the Bronx, New York, with 649%. New York City as a whole shows 163%; Omaha reports 391%; Lincoln. 373%; Detroit 215%; Boston 122%; Seattle 248%; Chicago 67%; Philadelphia 94%.


