

CHARTS URGED FOR USE IN EDUCATION OF OREGON PARENTS

State Board of Control Votes
in Favor of Child Welfare
Commission Proposition.

Salem, Or., Jan. 6.—The state board of control Wednesday voted in favor of a proposition of Mrs. Robert H. Tate, chairman of the Child Welfare Commission, that superintendents of the blind, feeble-minded, state industrial school for girls, state training school for boys and deaf school prepare charts for use in the traveling exhibit to be sent all over the state in an effort to educate the people as to better methods in the care of children. Mrs. Tate said the exhibit would probably make it possible to secure better legislation, and urged that there should be means provided at the state training school, for instance, for the segregation of the younger children. People should be educated, she believed, to the importance of allowing a girl from the industrial school the right to live right. Parents should be educated to take measures to prevent deafness, where possible, she insisted. A proposition of Lieutenant Charles L. Potter, of the United States army, that the state board should be permitted to retain the use of the Portage railroad tracks, one locomotive, four box cars and four flat cars and that other equipment be sold was adopted. Superintendent Hale of the state industrial school for boys, reported that the reasonable capacity of his place was 150 and that 132 were there now. He also complained of a likelihood of a shortage in funds, even if 150 was the limit, but was told that he should not refuse boys committed on that ground. The raising of the age limit from 16 to 18 years is the cause of the increase.

Elsie Stoop Paroled.
Salem, Or., Jan. 6.—The state board of control has paroled Elsie Stoop, of Elgin, upon recommendation of Matron Hopkins, of the state industrial school for girls.

Salem, Or., Jan. 6.—Whether the Salem Cherrians will accompany the Royal Rosarians of Portland, on a trip to Honolulu, will be considered at a meeting to be held in the near future. While it is not expected the Cherrians can make the trip as a body, it is believed that a number of the members will go.

Profit in Marion County.
Salem, Or., Jan. 6.—The office of Marion county recorder showed a profit of \$27,532 after salaries were paid, and that of the county clerk about \$2000 at the close of 1915.

Would Fix Tax on Bachelors Over 25

Aberdeen Councilman Proposes Measure to Make Up Deficit in Treasury by Loss of Saloon Licenses.
Aberdeen, Wash., Jan. 6.—Councilman James Emery proposes to introduce an ordinance in the council, fixing a tax of \$50 on bachelors over 25 years of age. This is in lieu of the plan to have an occupation tax to meet the loss of the saloon licenses.

City Officials of Newberg Nominated

Newberg, Or., Jan. 6.—Tuesday the usual caucus was held with a large attendance of both men and women voters to nominate a mayor, treasurer, recorder and three councilmen to be voted for at the election Monday. Mayor Jesse Lindsay was renominated for another term as was W. H. Woodworth, president of the First National bank for treasurer, and Miss Ida Woods for recorder. There were no nominations made in opposition in any of these cases. Miss Woods is serving her second term as recorder. The office combines that of city clerk and judge with jurisdiction over violations of city ordinances. She is the first to hold the office in Newberg and her women friends are especially pleased with her election. The election is to be held Monday next. Councilmen nominations were made by the voters of the respective wards as follows: First, Thomas Rood (incumbent by appointment for full vacancy); second, Theodore Gardner; third, Joseph B. Hollingsworth.

New York, Jan. 6.—(U. Woodrow Wilson Collects Three Months' Interest, \$67.50, on Three \$1000 Improvement Bonds.
San Diego, Jan. 6.—(U. P.)—That President Woodrow Wilson has faith in the financial stability and future expansion of the city of San Diego was learned today when a coupon from the White House reached the office of City Treasurer Don Stewart. The coupon called for \$67.50 which is three months' interest on three \$1000 improvement bonds. This is the first time since Stewart was called upon to pay interest to the president of the United States. Stewart believes that President Wilson's investment in San Diego securities is evidence of the city's financial stability and future expansion.

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HOOD RIVER LIBRARY MAY BE FORCED TO RUN ON HALF TIME

City and County Levies Do
Not Provide Money Enough
to Meet All the Expenses.

Hood River, Or., Jan. 6.—The Hood River county library may soon be run on half time unless the library commission succeeds in securing additional funds from the county court and city council with which to operate. The county budget only provides for an appropriation of \$1190, and the city tax levy will amount to about \$1000. It is stated that this is only about half sufficient to run the library for the year. The grange committee that appeared before the budget committee favored cutting out the county appropriation entirely and throw the library on the city, on the ground that the city was the direct beneficiary. Under present arrangements the librarian spends three days each week in other sections of the county in the interests of the library work and it was proposed to discontinue the services of the assistant librarian and close the library on the days that the librarian would be absent. Members of the city council at their meeting last night, proposed the institution of mandamus proceedings compelling the county court to pay to the library fund the sum of \$2750, which it is alleged, the county is bound to do under the contract with Andrew Carnegie. Hood River, Or., Jan. 6.—Fire insurance rates on country property in the Hood River valley have been raised by all of the old-line fire insurance companies. It is stated by local agents here that there have been so many fires in Hood River valley this year that a raise in rates was made necessary in order that premiums might be proportionate to losses.

Prineville Council Bars All Near-Beers

Ordinance Is Unanimously Adopted by City Fathers—Saloon Men Were Planning to Handle Soft Drinks.
Prineville, Or., Jan. 6.—The city council has unanimously approved an ordinance prohibiting the sale of all brands of near-beer. Those who have been in the saloon business prior to January 1, were arranging to continue in business and handle the temperance drinks mentioned. This has been stopped by the council. Henry Gray, a wealthy stockman and an ardent prohibition worker, was appointed city marshal.

COTTAGE GROVE HAD REMARKABLE HEALTH RECORD DURING 1915

No Cases of Contagious Disease Reported; Pure Water Supply of City Given Credit

Cottage Grove, Or., Jan. 6.—There were more than three times as many births as deaths in Cottage Grove during 1915, and of 16 deaths only two were under 15 years of age, while 11 were between the ages of 50 and 83. Three were between the ages of 15 and 50. This is probably the most remarkable record ever made here and shows an unusual condition of health, for which the pure city water is probably in large part responsible. According to the annual report of City Health Officer Oglesby, there were no cases of typhoid fever, scarlet fever, smallpox or diphtheria and no cases of tuberculosis. The number of births was 65, of which 32 were males and 33 females.

They told how they robbed the Heflich store of a quantity of pocket scarves, lights and batteries and how they broke into the Neely home and stole clothing. They got some beer and were intoxicated when caught by the police. "I went out for a good time," explained one boy. Ward was sent back to the reform school, being out on parole. The case against the others was continued until Saturday.

Nehalem Channel Is Safe For Schooners

Nehalem, Or., Jan. 6.—Soundings on Nehalem bar, made by Captain Farley, Garibaldi lifesaving service, show 25 feet of water at the shallowest place at high tide, which means about seven feet at low water. The recent freshet has cleared out the new channel and made it safe for lumber schooners. The south jetty, which is now complete, has changed the channel nearly a mile north and definitely located it.
