Prohibition Law Discussed.
The Women's Political Science club held its weekly meeting Tuesday afternoon. Parliamentary drill was ably conducted by Mrs. Margaret Fortner and those participating in the study felt the hour was well spent.

E. A. Baker, attorney for the Anti-Saloon league, addressed the women on the prohibition law now in force in Oregon.
Mr. Baker said that one of its chief benefits would be to assist the return of property; that in 40 days there should be an improvement in collections. He discussed the whole law in detail, paying particular attention to pharmacists and physicians and discussing many features of the law.
Mr. Baker advocated the support and encouragement of public officials whose duty it is to enforce the law. He pointed out that even though we have a prohibition law in operation, we yet are probably a long way from prohibition, and that possibly many years would be needed to entirely suppress the illegal use of intoxicants.

When people ask me to reduce the frame of the hand, they may as well file a request to be given the moon. If they attempt such an impossibility they are extremely foolish.

If the hand is fat and puffy, there is need for exercise and diet to reduce the weight of the whole body. The same is true of the foot. As to the face, its roundness can only be diminished in the same way.

I would not advise anyone to bleach their hair. The ultimate results are not desirable, no matter what the temporary effect may be.

THE SHOPPING FRAUD

Just once in a while I am ashamed of women—not often!

I had a touch of this the other day when the head of the art needlework department of one of the big stores told me how some would spend hours matching skeins of silk or wool and would keep the salespeople on the jump attending to their wants, and within an hour or two afterward would return the entire lot of materials to be exchanged or charged off. Possibly, it would be but a single skein of cotton which the woman would return—or maybe but a hank of wool; but anyhow, it set one to thinking that any who would consume so much time and worry over so small a matter, must have a valuable life to be willing to so aimlessly consume time.

There is even a worse side to this exchange mania, one which more than anything else brings to light the pettiness of some women—not, of course, any whom we know; not any in our neighborhood, but the woman in the next block, or the next town. I observed one of the leading merchants, recently, in speaking of the flood of after Christmas exchanges, "that women have actually brought back to me more than 100 exchange years after they were purchased." He related an incident of a woman who had bought a remnant of a silk had kept it for 10 years and then decided that she did not want it. When she applied for the exchange and was asked the history of the purchase, she said that it had been in her trunk all that time and was as good as when purchased, and so she saw no reason why it should not be exchanged. I ordered it charged up as a loss to my personal account," said the head of the firm, "and let it go at that."

I heard a woman boast that she had taken a pair of shoes to a department store which she knew to be very accommodating in exchanges. "I really had purchased the shoes elsewhere," said she, "and had forgotten them, but when I studied them over an old trunk I decided to try to exchange them and to get credit for use in the purchase of something which I wanted and do you know they actually gave me the shoes and I obtained the full credit asked and applied it upon another purchase! Wasn't that great?" "Great!" I said, "yes, a great fraud upon you."

"Why?" she asked, innocently, and it really looked like too great an undertaking to explain to her "why." I think the person who would indulge in such a scheme, if she would save all the expenses entailed by the employees to wrap, deliver, unwrap and return as well as the place items under the books and to replace them at the passing wh of the exchange—mad clientele, who thus fritter away that precious commodity—time.

ABOUT CHILDREN

It is very important to have a child's shoes fit perfectly. If too large they will be apt to rub and make the feet sore. If too tight they will be equally uncomfortable. The stockings should also fit perfectly, otherwise they will rub the feet into blisters. If too short they will cause a bunion. So you see the fit of both shoes and stockings is important.

Don't shake or scold a child who wakes up and cries out in the night. Often night terrors are a purely nervous affliction and any harshness only makes matters worse.

A STOCKING BOX

It is easy to make a stocking box to fit a bureau or chest of drawers. Cut up a long pasteboard box such as coats and suits are delivered in to make the stocking box. The partitions which divide the long narrow box into compartments should be placed at intervals of about five or six inches apart, according to the length of the box. Cover all the pieces of pasteboard with cretonne or the outside of the box and the inside with plushy velvet or silk to match.

Your silk stockings should be kept in this box each one separate in one of the compartments. This makes it easier to select just the right pair when one is in a hurry, for the various occasions. The modern woman has bronze stockings for bronze slippers.

Deferred Cablegram Service Suspended

Western Union Forced to Refuse Transatlantic Business to Protect Its Regular Customers.

The Western Union Telegraph company announces that owing to a temporary shortage of facilities it will be necessary to suspend for a few days the handling of transatlantic deferred messages. Every effort will be made to restore deferred service and cable letters at the earliest moment and announcement will be made as soon as conditions permit the restoration of these services.

The company states that the necessity for this action is greatly regretted but the suspension of deferred service by other transatlantic cable companies some days ago has resulted in a flood of deferred messages to Western Union cables, and it therefore becomes necessary in order to protect the company's regular patrons and its own expedited service to temporarily suspend all but the regular full paid service.

MOCK GIBLETS

Mrs. O. C. C. contributes the following recipe, which she vouches for:

Two pounds of liver from which all the tough fibers have been removed; let it lay in cold salt water for at least 10 hours, then boil in salted water until extra tender. Remove from fire and cool, then cut into small pieces and put by ready for morning. In the morning place the sausage over the fire with sufficient milk to nicely cover the liver and when just at the boiling point thicken with flour to form a thin gravy; have ready on a platter thin slices of freshly roasted bread, pour the giblets over the toast and serve at once.

This not only helps the farmer's wife to save a bit of liver left from the butcher's but provides the city housewife with a dainty breakfast for the over night guest at very little expense.

FOR NERVOUS PEOPLE

Nervous people need nourishing nerve building food, says Nurse. Eggs, served in various ways, milk, cereals, should be a standard part of such a diet. Cooked tomatoes and red meats. Serve quantities of fruit and fresh vegetables and bran bread or biscuit. Be careful to avoid any excess of sweets and starch if the patient is stout.

NUT AND OLIVE SANDWICHES

WICHES if you want something especially nice for Sunday evening supper or for an afternoon function, try these sandwiches.

Nut Sandwiches—Chop and throw into boiling water to loosen the skins, leaving them in for five minutes. Drain and lay in ice cold water for the same time. Dry, rub the skins and spread upon cloth to dry perfectly. It is well to blanch and dry them the day before they are used or at least several hours before making the sandwiches. Chop and allow to two tablespoonfuls of chopped nuts half as much sweet cream cheese. Work into a paste and spread upon thin slices of crustless bread. Blanching the nuts takes the bitter taste from them and renders them more wholesome.

Olive Sandwiches—They are best when equal portions of plain olives and of pimientos are used. Mince fine, work into a paste with a little mayonnaise dressing and spread upon thin slices of crustless bread. They are especially nice when made with gram bread.
