WATOCAN LOBBYERS

Attorney Asks Federal Judge Whether The Journal Is Not in Contempt of Court.

W. C. Bristol, as counsel for Mrs. T. B. Potter in her suit to foreclose on a mortgage on the Bayview property, presented before Judge C. E. Wolverton in federal court this morning the question of whether or not The Journal was in contempt of court when it published an advertisement on January 2 at the instance of Haycocean lot buyers. The advertisement referred to the mortgage as an "illegal mortgage," in calling for a better property owners to outline a defense.

Bristol said he was satisfied that neither Judge Wolverton nor Judge Bean would be influenced by any such publication, but he wished to protest against the publication of an advertisement publishing prejudicial matter concerning litigation while the case is pending. He referred to three alleged instances of the kind.

Judge Wolverton referred the matter to District Attorney Clarence H. Reames for an investigation as to whether there was any contempt. It was shown that the word "illegal" was changed to "called" in the advertisement was repeated the following day.

Mr. Reames told the court that it had not been found necessary to file for complaints to present subjects of the advertisement. The subject of the office always had been ready and it was his practice to make all such investigations without court instruction.

RULING WILL AFFECT

TEACHERS APPLYING FOR HIGH SCHOOL OBS

Fifteen Semester Hours in Education Necessary to Teach the Upper Grades.

Will Bar Incompetents

Acted Upon by Superintendent of Public Instruction at Request of Colleges.

Salem, Or., Jan. 8.—After June 1916, no certificate to teach in the high schools of this state will be granted to the graduates of a standard college or university unless the applicant has completed 15 semester hours in education, Superintendent of Public Instruction Churchill has announced.

"The certificate law of 1911 provides that in order to teach in a high school of this state an applicant must hold a life certificate based upon an examination or must have graduated from a standard university or college and must have completed 15 semester hours in education," said Superintendent Churchill today.

Could Make Up Work.

"At the time the law went into effect very few universities or colleges were prepared to give the 15 semester hours in education and applicants were, therefore, permitted by this department to make up this work by private study and correspondence courses and to take an examination in the proper subjects.

"Since that time the universities and colleges have been organizing departments of education and are now well prepared to offer courses in this work."

Legality of Enactment Prohibiting Artificial Jetties Still Remains in Doubt.

Roseburg, Or., Jan. 8.—Judge J. W. Hamilton has rendered his decision in the case of W. H. Gilliam against Orren Thompson, dismissing the case without costs to either side, giving it as his opinion that the court had no jurisdiction.

The case is of interest to fishermen as it was instigated for the purpose of testing the legality of enactment of the 1915 legislative prohibiting the use of artificial jetties in fishing.

Gilliam had been fishing with several artificial jetties which, it was claimed, caused eddies in which it was unlawful to fish. In order to make a test case his net and boat were confiscated by Thompson, acting as a deputy game warden. When the grand jury failed to indict Gilliam, a temporary injunction was secured enjoining the commission from seizing the net.

Falling Tree Puts Baker in Darkness

Plants Using Electric Power Stopped by Damage to Power Line and Stores Use Candles in the Late Afternoon.

Baker, Or., Jan. 8.—For several hours Friday Baker was without electric power. Damage to the power line was caused by the falling of a tree, shortly before 6 o'clock. Plants using electric power were unable to operate and candles were called into service in stores and other places, during the late afternoon.

Indicted for Murder.

Baker, Or., Jan. 8.—The grand jury early last evening returned the indictment of James MacCombs, murderer of Leonard Gould, whom he shot in the latter's blacksmith shop last November.

PORTLAND CHAMBER NAMES COMMITTEE TO CONSIDER TARIFF

Body Will Act With Similar Committees Throughout the Country.

The Portland Chamber of Commerce announced this morning the appointment of a permanent tariff commission committee.

The committee is named at the request of the Chamber of Commerce of the United States, which is one of its important policies the taking of the tariff out of politics through the creation of a permanent tariff commission.

A. Bales is chairman of this new tariff commission, the other members being A. G. Labbe, T. S. Townsend, O. E. Heintz, Lloyd J. Wentworth, C. H. Farrington, E. J. Crawford and H. B. Miller.

The national committee consists of F. F. Prentiss, Cleveland; William H. Harrison, Portland; Daniel P. Morse, William Goldman, Daniel W. Whitmore, all of New York; Caesar Cone, Greensboro, N. C.; E. W. McCullough and Francis T. Simmons, Chicago.

The committee of the Portland Chamber of Commerce will make a study of the question in Portland and Oregon and will report back to the national body.

Ban May Be Placed On Patent Medicines

Those Which Can Be Used as Intoxicating Beverages Likely to Be Barred Under Prohibition Law.

Salem, Or., Jan. 8.—Whether patent medicines can be used as an intoxicating beverage will be a ruling factor in deciding if they can be sold legally in Oregon, according to Attorney General Brown in an opinion. The test is whether the goods come under the head of intoxicating liquor within the meaning of the statute, according to Brown. He says that he knows that certain bitters were intoxicating beverages at one time, but is not certain as to their status now. He has requested the board of pharmacy to make an analysis of a number of medical preparations to ascertain if they can be used as intoxicating beverages.

He quotes a Georgia decision that the sale of certain patent medicines is unlawful because they can be used as a beverage, despite the fact that they contain helpful medicinal properties.

A former wholesale liquor firm was told today that it could not deal in alcohol for use of mechanical or any other purposes.

Arrests in Pendleton Show Big Decrease

Pendleton, Or., Jan. 8.—If the first week of the new year is any indication, the prohibition law is going to achieve results in Pendleton. Exclusive of arrests during the new year celebration there has been but one arrest all week by the police, and that was for vagrancy.

Last year there were 17 arrests in the first week of the year, exclusive of those on the first.

Rocked Sweetheart's Home.

Berkeley, Cal., Jan. 8.—(U. P.)—Antoly Lankovsky, university student, was denied entrance to the house where the object of his heart's desire resided, so he bombarded the place with rocks. He's in jail today.

The high jumping exhibition of "premier" northwest champion jumpers, owned by J. D. Farrell, president of the O.W.R. & N., was a feature of the evening. Mr. Farrell also exhibited "Old Glory" and "Union Jack," prize winners at the Panama-Pacific International exposition.

Baker Couple Face Extortion Charge

Indictments Returned Against James Pruitt and Wife for Alleged Threats to Doctor for Mann Act Violation.

Baker, Or., Jan. 8.—Indictments charging extortion were returned by the grand jury last evening against James Pruitt and his wife, Julia Pruitt. Testimony before the grand jury showed they threatened Dr. H. E. Curry with exposure of alleged violation of the Mann act in bringing Mrs. Pruitt here from Denver before her marriage, for immoral purposes, unless he paid them \$3000.

Mrs. Pruitt was Curry's stenographer at the time the latter was arrested on a federal charge two or three years ago, for illegal use of the mails in procuring a divorce.

The Pruitts are not now in Baker, but an effort will be made to bring them here for trial, if they can be located.
