HUMOR AND TRAGEDY DIVIDE HONORS THIS WEEK AT COLUMBIA

Absorbing Drama Tells of Heroic Self-Sacrifice of One Sister for Other.

Honors at the Columbia theatre are evenly divided this week. For half of the program one roars with laughter; the other half one grips the sides of his seat, following closely an absorbing drama in which Washington social life and an idyllic existence in the South Sea Isles are blended together.

The comedy is a Keystone, called "Disco Heights and Daring Heights," and is replete with remarkable stunts in aeroplane and automobile. And not least of the thrills is the blowing up of a brick factory chimney some 200 feet in height.

With friends, all three go on a yachting trip to southern seas. The yacht burns, and Elizabeth and the diplomat are carried ashore to an uninhabited island. The younger sister is rescued by a freighter.

Elizabeth nurses her former lover to health, and after an idyllic existence for months, believing his wife dead, he claims the sister as his wife.

The younger girl reaches home, and on the birth of a child recovers her memory of the catastrophe. She character a steamer and begins a search for her sister and husband.

The island is reached, and Elizabeth, recognizing her sister in the landing party, makes another supreme sacrifice by walking to her death in the breakers that her sister may have her husband back again.

Well acted and well staged, "Cross Currents" is absorbing in its interest.
