Lebanon Wants Its Library Reopened

Lebanon, Or., Jan. 12.—A library association has been organized in this city, to take charge of and reopen the public library, closed about a month ago. The library was formerly under the control of the local V. C. T. U., but owing to the fact that the burden of maintaining it fell too heavily on a few, it was decided to perfect the organization of a library association. A committee was appointed by the union to secure subscribers, who bought shares at \$1 each, which puts the financing of the enterprise on a firmer basis. The library was established seven years ago, and has had a large and increased patronage, and the fact of its being closed is not only a loss, but a great disappointment to the reading public. 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Weather Conditions. The large high pressure area still dominates weather conditions over the central portion of the country; moderate depressions are over the north Pacific slope and the extreme northeast, respectively. Precipitation has occurred in northern California, the northwest western Montana, and in most sections from the Mississippi valley eastward. The weather is decidedly colder in the Michigan valley and the upper Lake region; it is warmer on most of the Pacific slope, in the northern Rocky Mountain states, interior western Canada and in the northeast. Temperatures are much below normal in the lower Willamette valley, southeastern Washington, from the Rocky Mountains west to the Canadian range, and in central Canada. The line of freezing temperatures this morning extends about to the Mexican border. The conditions are favorable for unsettled weather in this district tonight and Friday, probably with moderate depressions over the Pacific slope and the extreme northeast. Temperature changes are indicated, and winds will be mostly northerly.

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Snow Shovelers Charge 25 Cents An Hour for Work

Misconstruing a published statement "no fee charged" has resulted in a flood of applications to the municipal free employment bureau for snow shovelers. The men charge 25 cents per hour for their labor. The city charges them no fee for sending them to the job, however. The belief that the city is providing shovelers free and the notices given householders that sidewalks must be cleared of snow together is keeping the municipal bureau's telephone working overtime. The bureau wishes it understood that the men sent out charge 25 cents an hour and that they get all paid them and the city charges nothing.

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
