

CORONER SAYS LOWE IS NOT TO BLAME FOR KILLING HIS BROTHER

Determines After an Investigation That Shooting in Mountains Was Accidental

Eugene, Or., Jan. 14.—Coroner Veatch holds Audren Lowe blameless for killing his brother, Terry Lowe, in the mountains above Yonah, 35 miles east of Eugene, Wednesday afternoon.

The coroner made a trip to the scene of the shooting today and took the statements of Audren Lowe as to details of the shooting, and those of Burley Williams and Dayton Thompson, who were called by telephone by Lowe and his father to assist in bringing the body out of the mountains.

Audren Lowe told a straightforward story, declaring he did not know his brother was on the same side of the canyon that he was hunting on, they having agreed to keep on opposite sides. Terry had shot deer and evidently followed the animal's tracks to the side of the canyon where Audren was.

Snow Falls at Eugene.

Eugene, Or., Jan. 14.—An inch of snow fell in Eugene last evening after the ground had become bare of more than an inch that fell this morning. The temperature last night was 26 degrees, which is the lowest reached since the latter part of December when it reached 26. Since the first of the year eight inches of snow have fallen in Eugene. All but that which fell today has melted in the valley. In the mountains and even low hills surrounding the city the snow lies from three inches to several feet deep.

Children Get Bulk Of Burnett Estate

Will of Pioneer Resident and Coat Operator of Seattle, Disposing of Property Worth \$500,000, Filed.

Seattle, Jan. 14.—An estate valued at approximately \$500,000 is disposed of in the will filed for probate of the late Charles H. Burnett Sr., pioneer coal operator and one of the oldest residents of the Puget sound country. He died in this city at 5 o'clock last Sunday afternoon.

He bequeathed \$5000 each to Clarence Andrews and Stephen Andrews, nephews, and \$5000 to Estella Harkness, a niece. The residue of the estate is divided equally between the two children, Charles H. Burnett Jr., and Mrs. Amy L. Bond, who are named executors without bond and who are instructed to provide for Mr. Jeanette McLain, their maternal grandmother, with a monthly allowance of \$50 as long as she lives.

He was bitter at Huerta's imprisonment "like a common criminal," and declared that he had not been shown the respect that Huerta on many occasions had voluntarily given to Americans.

General Victoriano Huerta, who left his stamp inextricably upon Mexican affairs, was born to the role of "Iron man" in the village of Colatlan, Jalisco, Mexico, December 27, 1854. Indian blood coursed in his veins and marked him with the fierce stolidity that Mexico came at last to fear. The spirit of the soldier seemed ingrained. From early boyhood the love of fighting, the thrill of arms, was upon him. So it was that he got a military training in the military academy of Chapultepec from which he was graduated in 1876.

able for the killings. He insisted that the two men had been shot when their adherents attempted to rescue them.

About this time, Gustavus Madero, brother of Francisco, who had been thrown into prison by Huerta, was given the ley de fuero (law of flight), and shot in the back and slain as he was leaving his guards after being told he could go free.

Recognition Was Refused.

The government of the United States refused to recognize Huerta as president. In April, 1914, after a series of parleys between Huerta and Nelson O'Shaughnessy, American charge d'affaires at Mexico City, American marines landed and seized Vera Cruz.

On July 15, 1914, through pressure of revolutionary chieftains and their repeated successes against federal forces, Huerta was forced to resign the presidency and he retired to Barcelona, Spain.

In April, 1915, Huerta came to the United States and temporarily took up his residence at New York.

His name was repeatedly mentioned in connection with alleged revolutionary movements fostered in the United States and in July, 1915, he was charged with violating the American neutrality laws.

While hovering between life and death at his home in El Paso, Huerta was formally indicted on the neutrality charge by the grand jury at San Antonio.

Death at State School.

Dec. Or., Jan. 14.—Roy Vernon of this place, aged 16, died at the state school for the deaf at Salem, January 9, 1916. The boy was captain of the

basketball team at the school, and was to have played in a game the day of his death.

City and County Exchange Duns For Water Bills

Portland is exchanging water duns with Multnomah county now-a-days.
