#### WHO WILL GIVE THE FINAL "PUSH?"

All that is now required to assure the construction of a copra mill at Portland is the final "push" that will put the load of financing over the hill. A large portion of the money has already been raised by the joint efforts of the Trade and Commerce and the Manufactures' and Industries' Bureaus of the Chamber of Commerce, and the offering of a very small sum of money within a few days will spell

extracted, and is produced most abundantly in the Philippine Islands. The exportation of copra increased since the American occupation from nome 18,000 metric tons in 1899 to 140,000 metric tons in 1942. The Pacific Coast is the logical point of entry for this commodity into the United States, where the consumption is growing as rapidly as the production.

A copra mill at Portland will mean a regular supply of incoming cargoes for steamship lines to the Orient of about 500 tons per month. The distribution of a Portland-made product to all parts of the United States to care for an aiready created demand.

The connection of Portland with a rapidly growing new industry of nation-wide importance will place Portland in close touch with every biscuit and cracker factory, every candy factory and every soap

factory in the United States, besides strengthening those already located here.

It will add more men to a disproportionately small industrial payroll. It will aid in establishing kindred industries in the city.

The Beownsville Woolen Mills have taken over the entire building at the southwest corner of Third and Morrison streets. It is being remodeled to provide apace for their moders wholesale tailoring plant on the upper floors. J. L. Bowman, the president of this concern, states that when the new plant is in operation by March 1st, there will be an average of 1,000 made-to-measure asits for men and young men produced rank week. In addition to catering to the five retail stores in Oregon belonging to the Brownsville Woolen Mills, samples are being distributed among 200 agests in the Pacific Northwest. From these samples orders will be taken which will be manufactured in Portland it is estimated that at least \$260,000,000 worth of wholesale tailoring orders are shipped East every year.
