

COMMITTEEMAN FOR OREGON IS BECOMING SHINING G. O. P. LIGHT

Name of Ralph Williams Frequently Hyphenated With Barnes, Penrose and Crane

"RELIABILITY" IS REASON

Williams' Position on Convention Arrangements Committee Is Important.

Washington, Jan. 18.—(WASHINGTON BUREAU OF THE JOURNAL.)—New distinction is coming these days to Ralph E. Williams, Republican national committeeman from Oregon. Not only has he been placed on the committee to arrange for the Chicago convention, but in the dispatches of eastern political writers he is coming to be hyphenated with William Barnes, Boies Penrose and W. Murray Crane. The criterion of the national committee is thus coming to be frequently designated as the Barnes-Penrose-Crane-Williams combination, an expression that defines itself as soon as uttered. All of these men are survivors from the committee faction that sat in Chicago in 1912 and hammered down the Roosevelt contests of that year. At that time Guggenheim of Colorado was a leading spirit of the dominant faction, and his name was usually linked up with Barnes, Penrose and Crane. Guggenheim has since vanished from the firing line, and Williams of Oregon is apparently being accepted as his successor in the higher councils of the big party bosses.

Several Reasons Given. Aside from his long service on the committee, and his "reliability," two other reasons are given for his being entered into the favor shown the Oregon member at this time. One is the fact that Williams represents the far western and progressive state of Oregon, which helps to balance the inner circle geographically. Another is that Williams cleared his title in 1914 in a primary election, being one of the few members of the national committee who has had direct endorsement by his party.

So, in preparing the machinery for the next convention, Williams was picked as the fittest man from the far west. Other Westerners wanted the place on the special committee to prepare for the convention, but they were men at the top who are constantly watching the deal and fixing the rewards, named Williams. The Oregon committeeman is credited with a "long head" and his efforts for tariff reform have been remembered with appreciation. Being one of the older members in service, it was not difficult to advance him.

Progressives Are Few. Progressives are practically unrepresented on the P. national committee as now constituted. They are so rare as to form no obstacle to any plan that may be worked out by the majority of the old time Republicans.

While the spread of presidential primaries has eliminated a large number of possible contests for the next convention, in the state because they are the most numerous, there will be few Republican primaries this year, since the Republicans have decided not to have primaries except where the law requires them. As a result, there is likely to be another batch of contests before the next national convention meets.

This means that the national committee may have some important duties to perform. After the Chicago affair of 1912, predictions were made that the national committee in the future would have power to do such things over again, but the old crowd that "threw out of the window" at that time is going into action again and will again shape in a considerable degree the temporary roll of delegates.

FULLY HALF OF BOYS AT TRAINING SCHOOL DEPENDENT, NOT BAD

Superintendent Hale Says Judges Committing Them to Save Counties Expense.

Salem, Or., Jan. 18.—Superintendent Hale, of the state training school for boys, started the state board of control Monday when he declared that fully one-half the inmates of his institution were sent there by county judges because they were dependent and not because they were bad. "The counties are just shoving them off on the state because they have to support them," declared Hale.

Examples Are Given. As an example, he cited the case of three boys from one family, aged 11, 12 and 14, committed from Union county, who were received today. They were alleged to have stolen some tobacco. "Under the present system there is no way of segregating the older boys from the younger and the very bad from the trifling offenders," Hale declared.

He told of one county judge who tried to commit a harmless boy of 9 years to the institution. The board passed a resolution authorizing Hale to parole all the boys he believed were improperly committed to the institution just as soon as spring came and they could be properly taken care of elsewhere.

Pendleton, Or., Jan. 17.—Professor A. C. Hampton, who was last week elected to the superintendency of schools in this city, has been connected with the local schools for nearly nine years. He was elected in 1907 to the principalship of the high school and held that position until his election as superintendent. However, he has been acting superintendent since the resignation of Professor J. S. Landers last spring.

Professor Hampton is a native son of Oregon, having been raised in Polk county. His training was received in the state normal school at Monmouth, the University of Oregon and Chicago university. Before coming to Pendleton he taught four years in various parts of the state. He is 36 years old.

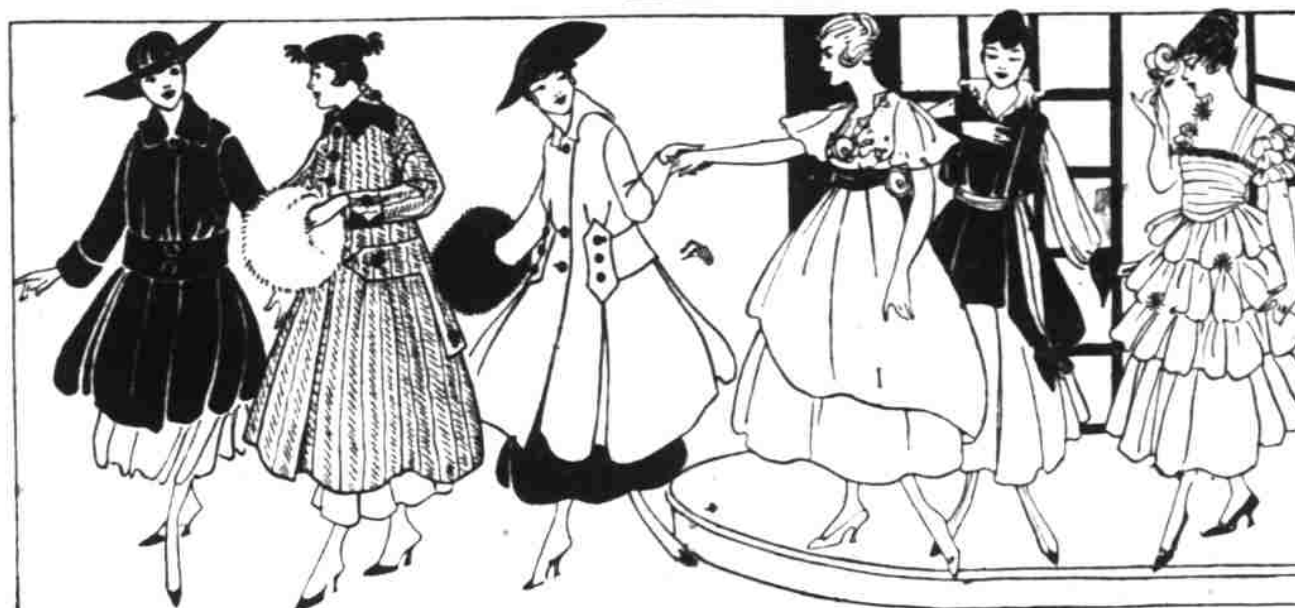
