Beauty Chat

THE watchword of modern employment is efficiency. There are about 40,000,000 persons 10 years of age and over employed in this country. It has been said that the well being of the average family in the United States depends upon the employment of these millions. Efficiency in their work is demanded by the employers of all these workers. You owe it to yourself and to your employer to be efficient.

By efficiency is meant not so much knowing how to do your work as to be capable of doing it well, day after day. This depends more, perhaps, on your physical condition than anything else. Don't neglect keeping yourself in trim in order that you may do your work well.

It is a well known fact that city people are peculiarly susceptible to diseases such as pneumonia. The mortality from pneumonia is increasing yearly. The causes are easily understood. The population in cities is increasing in ratio to the population of the rural districts. The shifting of population to cities affects the incidence of pneumonia by increasing the number who take little outdoor exercise; by favoring over-indulgence in eating and drinking; by increasing the

facilities for contact with infection, and, last, by increasing the pollution of the air that is breathed both inside and outside of habitations, shops and offices.

The only way in which disease can be prevented is by reducing the number of susceptibles. That can be done by educating the masses by teaching them, through the mediums of the public press, the schools and the universities, in addition to the public health agencies and the work of the medical profession.

Men and women must learn to avoid any excess of their daily need of food; they must learn that a "fat" person is a vulnerable person and the laws of nature are to be obeyed implicitly. Comfortable clothing, daily bathing and a reasonable amount of sleep and exercise comprise about two-thirds of the requirements for physical efficiency, and food contributes the other third.

Too many working women acquire the habit of eating but little breakfast, lunching on a soda or sundae and then eating too large a meal in the evening. Naturally their digestions become poor and their bodies undernourished. I think one of the best diets in the world is that of fruit. There is no article that has increased in use during the last few years so rapidly as fruit. It

is nature's own food and the best sort of remedy for sallow skin and a morose condition. There are certain acids in fruit which purify the blood and help an overworked digestive system to resume a normal condition again.

It is splendid for the diet of the working woman, who feels that she can work better after her lunch period if she has not a meal of bulk, and yet knows the foolishness of trying to subsist on what she buys at the soda fountain.

Don't let yourself become inefficient because you neglect to keep your physical condition up to the necessary standard. You cannot do good work if you are physically weak or incapable. Health is the basis of all efficiency.
