Made Good Showing During Former Short Tenure of Office Under Gov. West.

La Grande, Or., Jan. 21.—John S. Hodgkin, Democrat, has given out his announcement as candidate for district attorney for Union county.

Mr. Hodgkin has practiced law in Wallawa and Union counties for several years. He was West's appointee for the office under the law giving to each county a prosecuting attorney, but under the supreme court decision he had to give up the office.

Dr. Jordan Predicts Civilization After War Will Start 50 Years Ahead of Close of the Civil War.

Stanford University, Cal., Jan. 21.—(U. P.)—When the war is over, civilization will start 50 years ahead of where it was at the end of our civil war, or the Franco-Prussian war.

There is nothing in this war to change one's opinion of war or of the possibility and necessity of international peace. The anarchy of armament is sure to make war a possibility, but this anarchy of armament is only a temporary thing.

"Civilization is playing a great game against murderers, robbers, duelists and sticklers in this game. It must win every move or lose the whole series."

Wife Is Entitled to One-Half of Savings

Question Arose in Divorce Case Where Man Had Turned Over Pay to Wife for 36 Years, Who Had Saved \$12,000

Jersey City, N. J., Jan. 21.—(U. P.)—A New Jersey husband and wife are entitled to equal shares of their joint savings. That is the gist of a decision handed down by Vice Chancellor Stevens yesterday.

The case is less simple than it sounds, for it took the court 10 months to solve its intricacies. James W. Donnelly, the petitioner, had turned over his pay envelope to his wife for 36 years. She had saved \$12,000 after paying family expenses.

Must Prove Pauper Or No Appeal Given

John Grant Lyman, Under Mail Fraud Conviction, Was Speculator Figure in Escape From Oakland Hospital.

San Francisco, Jan. 21.—(U. P.)—John Grant Lyman, convicted in the United States court of the southern district for using the mails to defraud, must prove to the court of appeals that he is a pauper and unable to pay the docketing fee of \$25 before his appeal from the judgment of the lower court is filed here.

Lyman was originally indicted for carrying on an extensive fraud in regard to lands in Panama. He was finally arrested and taken to Providence hospital, Oakland, for medical attention. While there he managed to mysteriously escape and it was some time before he was captured in Medford, Or. He then represented to the court that he was absolutely penniless, but desired to appeal his case.

Noy Lyman must make another plea here of being a pauper before the appeal will be docketed, the government paying the fee.

Combination Wagon, Rail Bridge Is Asked

Mill Man Anticipates Extension of Willamette Pacific From Cushman to Florence, Distance of Four Miles.

Eugene, Or., Jan. 21.—A petition has been presented to the Lane county court to make the proposed bridge across the North Fork of the Willamette river, between Cushman, the present terminus of the Willamette Pacific railway, and Florence, a combination wagon and rail bridge, with a view to the construction of a spur of the Willamette Pacific from Cushman to Florence, a distance of four miles.

The petition was presented by H. P. Dutton, superintendent of the Tidewater Mill company, which operates a sawmill at Florence. This company is backed by Porter Brothers, railroad contractors.

Security Congress Wants Preparedness

Washington, Jan. 21.—(U. P.)—An insistent demand for military and naval preparedness was voiced at the opening of a three-day session of the National Security congress in Washington Thursday.

Addressed by Colonel Theodore Roosevelt, assailing present conditions of preparedness, was read by his sister, Mrs. Douglas Robinson, of New York, at the evening session.

Robert Bacon, of New York, former secretary of state and ambassador to France, warned the congress that the insular character of the country has gone and that the security supposedly afforded by the two oceans has gone.

Snow Is Melting Away. Aberdeen, Wash., Jan. 21.—A hard southeast storm is rapidly clearing away the snow and making the outlook for the operation of mills and logging favorable. Many have started for the woods, having received notice of camp resumption.

Peairs, superintendent of Indian schools, Washington, D. C. The first institute was held at Chemawa in 1914.

'Coons Are Numerous. Chemawa, Or., Jan. 20.—During the past week 12 raccoons have been killed in Kaiser Bottom by a party of Salem sportsmen, composed of Dr. R. E. Lee Bleisner, Dr. Griffiths, Dr. J. C. Evans and some other members of the Oregon state hospital staff.
