Northern China Has Joined in Rebellion

First Division of Yuan Shi Kai Army Now Guarding "Gate to Peking," Is Expected to Join Republicans.
San Francisco, Jan. 22.—(U. P.)—Northern China, heretofore passive under the rule of Yuan Shi Kai, has joined southern China in revolting against the imperial regime, cable advice to Tong King Chong, president of the Chinese Republic association and editor of the Chinese Republic Journal, stated today. The Republicans occupied Kweihsuancheng, the cable stated. The first division of the Yuan Shi Kai army at Kailan, comprising 10,000 regular soldiers stationed at "gate to Peking," is reported to be ready to join the advancing republicans. These are the troops Yuan depended on to guard the approach to his capital, according to local Chinese.

Red Cross Branch Is Formed at Cairo

First Work of Committee Will Be to Care for 40,000 Homeless Armenians Living in Tents at Fort Said.

Washington, Jan. 22.—(U. P.)—The American Red Cross today authorized the formation of an American committee in Cairo, Egypt, to handle European war relief work. The officers are: Chairman, Dr. F. H. Henry; treasurer, Dr. John Griffin; secretary, Stephen Brownbridge.

The first work of the committee will be the relief of the 40,000 homeless Armenians now at Fort Said. Most of them came from the historic town of Antioch and are living in an improvised tent village.

Charged With "Bunko" Game.

Families Driven Out Homes by Log Boom

Carried by Tide, Strikes Pavilion at Salmon Beach, Wash., and People Flee to Safety in Nearby Mills.

Tacoma, Wash., Jan. 22.—(U. P. S.)—Several Salmon beach families were forced to flee for their lives when a heavy log boom, carried by a strong tide and wind, struck the pavilion and tore it from its foundations, thus taking what personal effects they could pick up in their haste, they fled to the safety of the hills back of the beach.

The boom tore out a pilings from under two houses owned by the Ross Launch company. Mr. Charles Zeigler, who runs a grocery store, said that if the boom had not broken it would have pulled dry house and landing on the beach to the water.

WILSON PLANS TALKS ON PREPAREDNESS TO KEEP BUSINESS GOING

President's Speaking Tour, as Now Arranged, Includes Seven Middle West Cities.

Washington, Jan. 22.—(U. P. S.)—President Wilson's speaking tour through the middle west in support of preparedness will begin January 28, and will include seven cities, Pittsburg, Cleveland, Milwaukee, Chicago, Des Moines, Topeka and Kansas City. He will be accompanied by Mrs. Wilson and will return to Washington on February 4.

Leaves Capital January 28.
The president will leave here on the night of January 28 and will speak the next day in Pittsburg. In the evening he will speak in Cleveland and will spend Sunday there. The following day he will speak in Milwaukee, and in Chicago in the evening.

Will Avoid Nebraska Entirely.
But the president declined to be swayed from his original intention to avoid Nebraska entirely.

It was learned at the White House today that President Wilson would not reply to the attacks of Colonel Roosevelt on his swing through the middle west.

The president will make practically the same speech in each of the seven cities. He will talk not only about military preparedness, but will point out the necessity of business preparedness. His first speech will be in New York on January 27.

T. R. to Ignore Bryan.
New York, Jan. 22.—(U. P. S.)—Colonel Roosevelt has no intention of trailing William J. Bryan if Bryan trails President Wilson.

The president's secretary made this statement. He denied reports that the colonel would swat Bryan. He said that the president's time Bryan swatted the president's plot for more soldiers and battleships.

Prison Terms for Usurious Bankers

Washington, Jan. 22.—(U. P. S.)—Legislation to prescribe prison sentences for national bankers who charge usurious interest rates is recommended by Comptroller of the currency John Skilton Williams. He declares that he is serious considering action looking toward the annulment of charters of national banks, which are persistent violators of the usury law.

"Some banks have admitted under oath," he said, "that they were charging not 100 per cent, but 500 and 1000 per cent in some cases. One bank admitted an average rate of 25 per cent on all loans. The record shows that on some small loans as high as 2000 per cent is being charged."

"I have no authority over such matters except to bring suit for the annulment of the charter of the bank. The department of justice should be authorized to proceed against the user and the borrower should not be required to bring suit. As the law now stands the borrower may sue on usurious charges, but no borrower is going to do this. He fears he will be blacklisted if he may want to borrow again."

"Information we have gathered shows that usurious rates are most prevalent in the southwestern and southern states. In early all parts of the country banks have been found that charge excessive rates."

Germans Sank 24 Ships in December

Reliable Information Declares Three of Them Were British; Allies' Losses Will Aggregate About 130,000 Tons.

Berlin (Via Sayville), Jan. 22.—(U. P. S.)—The Semi-Official Transoceanic News Bureau states:

"Competent German authorities declare that during December, 24 ships, among which were one British auxiliary cruiser and two British transports, totaling 104,764 tons, were destroyed by Austro-German fleets. Reliable reports regarding ships destroyed by mines and collisions are still lacking. The real losses of the entire allies therefore in the aggregate probably will not be less than 130,000 tons."

Oakland, Cal., Jan. 22.—(U. P.)—The body of an unidentified man was found lying near the Southern Pacific right of way, off Decoto street. There were no marks on his body and police officers believe the man dropped dead while walking.

Bookers Are Arrested.
Los Angeles, Jan. 22.—(U. P. S.)—In a crusade against race hand-book operators, Chief of Police Selvey and 25 officers Friday raided 18 offices in downtown buildings and arrested a score of men. The police seized the books as evidence.

Walter Jackson Sargeant Crossed Plains to Oregon With Parents at Age of 4.

McMinnville, Or., Jan. 22.—In the death of Walter Jackson Sargeant, of Sheridan, Yamhill county loses one of its old-time merchants formerly in business at Bellevue. Mr. Sargeant died at his home at Sheridan January 12, after a lingering illness. He came to Oregon by ox team with his parents, from Illinois, when four years of age. He was reared and educated in Polk county near Ballston. Mr. Sargeant was born in Springfield, Ill., March 10, 1847. December, 1865, he married Martha A. Gant and to them four children were born. He conducted a general merchandise store at Bellevue for 14 years and retired from business in 1905.

Three years ago he moved from his Bellevue neighborhood farm to Sheridan. He served in the Civil war as a member of the First Oregon Volunteers, Company A. After 19 months he was honorably discharged.

Mr. Sargeant last year was president of the Yamhill County Veteran association and he was a member of Donaldson Post G. A. R. of Sheridan. He is survived by his wife, Martha A. Sargeant, a son, Dr. A. R. Sargeant of Douglas, Alaska, a daughter, Mrs. Leonard S. Hopfield of McMinnville; also by three sisters and three brothers.

John Peterson Dies.
Chemawa, Or., Jan. 22.—John Peterson, a native of Sweden, aged 83 years, died at his home on the Portland road Sunday morning and was buried in the Haystack cemetery Tuesday, the Rev. R. F.
