

RACING MEN TALK OF COMPETING WITH THE STATE FAIR PROGRAM

Plan of Establishing an Independent Track in Salem Is Now Being Discussed.

DEPENDS ON FAIR BOARD

Worsemen Fear That Change in Board's Membership Means Curtailment of Amusement Features.

Salem, Or., Jan. 28.—If the state fair board decides to make the race card for the next fair of small importance, it is possible that racing men will establish a track at Salem and hold a meet at the same time the fair is being held.

A well known racing man of the northwest has already broached the subject of establishing an independent track here and keeping it running during the six days the fair is held. With the resignations of J. H. Booth, a member of the National Trotting association, and N. K. West, an enthusiastic racing man, the board is feared by horsemen and those who like good track meets that the performance at the famous old Lone Oak track may be unduly curtailed by the new board.

Governor Withycombe has looked with scant favor on the amusement features of the fair despite the fact that it was pointed out that the agricultural features would not alone attract the crowds and it was necessary to please all classes. With Booth and West out, it is feared that the radicals will put racing down and out for good.

Articles of Incorporation.

Salem, Or., Jan. 28.—The Bend Water, Light & Power company of Bend has filed articles with Corporation Commissioner Schulerman increasing its capital stock from \$225,000 to \$300,000.

Sentenced to County Jail.

Salem, Or., Jan. 28.—George Yoman was sentenced to serve 30 days in the county jail and sentence suspended in circuit court. He was charged with obtaining money under false pretenses when arrested at Tacoma and brought here, but the charge was changed to petty larceny.

Can't Locate Color Key.

Salem, Or., Jan. 28.—Secretary of State Olcott has received a request from a Philadelphia firm which has the contract for building the Washington memorial chapel at Valley Forge for a color key for the state arms. The secretary was unable to locate any color key.

Reaches Father's Death Bed.

Salem, Or., Jan. 28.—Mrs. G. H. Alden, wife of Dean Alden of Williamette university, reached Seattle an hour before her father, Edward S. Page, died there Wednesday night. Dean Alden has gone north to attend the funeral. The late Mr. Page was for many years engaged in the lumber business in northern Minnesota.

High School Teams Debate.

Salem, Or., Jan. 28.—One Salem high school debating team will meet the Newberg team at Newberg Friday night, while the other will meet the Jefferson team here the same evening. In both debates the subject will be whether the United States should adopt the essential features of the Swiss system of military training and service.

COUNCIL REFUSES TO PASS DRASTIC DANCE REGULATING MEASURE

Pendleton City Fathers Think Mayor Best's Ordinance Goes Too Far; New Draft.

Pendleton, Or., Jan. 28.—Mayor Best's dance regulating ordinance failed to get by the committee Thursday evening and there is little hope for it being adopted in its present form. While the majority of the council seems favorably disposed toward those provisions directed against raving and suggestive dancing, there is strong opposition to the sections which have been characterized as too drastic, unjust and unnecessary. The ordinance committee will meet with the mayor during the week to frame some acceptable ordinance.

Another near-clash between the mayor and council occurred over the prohibition ordinance drafted to give the city power to deal with bootleggers. The first draft of the ordinance prohibited any private citizen from having more than two quarts of liquor in his house and extended the search and seizure clause of the state law so that the police at any time could enter a private dwelling. This clause created so much opposition that it was revised to conform with the state law, thus empowering the police to search only such places as are charged in a complaint with being nuisances.

In a general way the city ordinance is merely an adaptation of the state law to municipal purposes. Heavier penalties are added and it makes misrepresentation to a common carrier a misdemeanor. The council, however, refused to pass the ordinance until a week was given for study of its provisions.

Guns to Be Confiscated.

Pendleton, Or., Jan. 28.—Deputy Game Warden George Vonkin of Umatilla county has served notice hereafter he will confiscate all guns, ammunition or other properties used in fishing and hunting and belonging to violators of the game laws. This is a state law giving him this power and he intends exercising it. Johnson Addison and George Howard, two young men of this city, convicted of hunting without proper licenses, were the first to suffer, and a foreigner, who had not secured the necessary permit, also lost his gun.

Wealthy Recluse of Hoquiam Found Dead

S. Dunlap, Reported to Be Very Wealthy, Had Never Allowed Anyone to Enter Home.

Hoquiam, Wash., Jan. 28.—S. Dunlap, who for 60 years has lived alone in a small shack on the east Hoquiam river and accumulated a large fortune, never allowing a soul to enter his home, was found dead last evening.

Dunlap, who was about 85 and came here from Portland, has all of his wealth deposited in Portland banks, making his money by cattle raising and great frugality. Once and only once relatives came to visit him. He stopped them at the boat and ordered them back, declaring "no one but himself had ever crossed his threshold and never would." Close mouthed, he never told friends about his early life or kinsmen.

Dunlap had been dead for about two days and was found by George Sparling, a distant neighbor. The body was brought here.

Logging Camps Will Run Full Capacity

Sunset Timber Company of Raymond Announces Opening of Camps on P. S. & W. R. R.—To Employ 200.

Raymond, Wash., Jan. 28.—Official announcement has been made by officers of the Sunset Timber company that within the next 30 days their camps on the Puget Sound & Willapa Harbor railway will be opened to full capacity. This will mean employment for about 200 more men than the company is now employing, and it has been three years since the Sunset camps operated full capacity. This announcement coupled with the well grounded expectation that the three side mills in the city will be operating full time within the next 60 days, gives a very optimistic feeling among the business men of Raymond.

The logging camps which were closed down on account of the late cold snap, resumed operations Tuesday of this week and will likely continue to operate despite the three or four inches of snowfall Tuesday night as the weather gives indications of moderating.

Pendleton Cellars Robbed of Liquors

Pendleton, Or., Jan. 28.—Prohibition in Pendleton has developed a new type of criminal, the liquor thief. Within the last week no less than half a dozen cellars of private homes have been broken into, the heaviest losses being former saloon men. Herman Peters lost several cases of beer, W. G. Bogert lost a half dozen quarts of whiskey and a whole barrel of beer was stolen from another place.

Petty bootleggers are believed to be responsible.

Buy's Kelso Grocery Company.
Kelso, Wash., Jan. 28.—Fred Kenney has purchased the Kelso Grocery company stock and business from S. L. Roberts, who has been proprietor of the grocery store for the last two years.

Cottage Grove Man Dies.
Cottage Grove, Or., Jan. 28.—Edgar King died at Salem Tuesday afternoon following a lingering illness. His affliction was the result of an injury to the spine received several years ago. The body arrived from Salem yesterday and the funeral was held today.

POULTRY ASSOCIATION FORMED BY SOUTHERN OREGON ENTHUSIASTS

Jackson, Josephine and Klamath Counties Are Included in Territory.

E. W. HUNTER PRESIDENT

First Show Ever Organized in District Will Be Held February 9 to 12 at Medford.

Medford, Or., Jan. 28.—The Southern Oregon Poultry association has been organized, with E. W. Hunter as president, Roy B. Peebles, secretary and an executive committee of five members. Its territory comprises Jackson, Josephine and Klamath counties.

It will hold the first poultry show ever organized in this district during the second week in February, opening on the ninth and continuing to the twelfth, inclusive. It is offering an attractive list of premiums. Entrance blanks are being obtained from poultry people with show birds in many parts of the state, including fanciers in Eugene and Salem.

Rogue river valley is an ideal poultry region. However, it is a neglected industry here. The association has expressed the ambition to raise the volume of the output next year to one carload of live poultry a week, which, with the by-products, will amount to an income from that source of \$200,000.

Spraying Kills Bees.

Medford, Or., Jan. 28.—Bee men of Jackson county have sought professional advice as to what to do to protect their colonies from the destructive results of fruit men's spraying their orchards when in bloom. Should the latter practice be continued it will mean the elimination of the bee industry in this valley.

Professor Lovett of the O. A. C. has written that fruit men should be urged to discontinue the practice of spraying when the fruit trees are in bloom, that it possesses no added virtue over spraying at any other appropriate time, and that it seriously menaces the life of the apiarist's business.

Fruitists have threatened the bee men, it is said, in one or two districts of the county, with their purpose to continue the practice because they fear that the bees help to spread fruit diseases. Professor Lovett, however, discredits that theory.

Duma to Visit England.

London, Jan. 28.—I. N. S.—This patch of revived here from Petrograd say that the upper and lower houses of the Russian parliament will confer shortly on the subject of a visit of members of the duma to England. This visit probably will be made during the eastern holidays.
