OLD CODES OF UNITED STATES PROVE TO BE NO SECRET TO EUROPE

President's Personal Representative Will Ask That New Codes Be Prepared.

Berlin, via Amsterdam, Jan. 27.—Practically every belligerent in Europe knows the supposedly secret diplomatic codes of the United States government, it was learned today. Colonel House, President Wilson's personal envoy, will ask the state department to change its cipher.

No diplomatic agent of the United States in Europe can now send a message in code to Washington with the certainty that Europe will not know its contents.

While European nations cannot examine all messages, they can, and have, gained information which they knew in advance was to be transmitted.

Ambassador Penfield of Vienna was recently involved in such an incident. He telegraphed Vienna that he was about to send a dispatch, then he telegraphed it in code by the usual route via Rome and Paris. Four days later the American minister at Rome, Switzerland, wired that the dispatch had not arrived. Penfield forwarded another version, which arrived before the original. The original was mysteriously delayed.

There are three codes used by American ambassadors. These are said to be from five to seven years old, though usually codes are changed every two years to keep them from falling into the hands of spies.

European agents are said to understand well the United States "green code," supposed to be the most secret of all, while the navy's is equally well known.

Foreign agents could gain knowledge of the code, for instance, by the fact that the state department at Washington gave out a translation of an Austrian message, translated literally from the code. Any intelligent man saw this translation and then saw the code message as it passed through the hands of cable officials on its way to Washington would have little difficulty in working out the system.

Stricken With Hemorrhage.

San Bernardino, Cal., Jan. 27.—(U. N. S.)—Stricken with a hemorrhage while arguing in the \$100,000 polo suit, on trial in the San Bernardino courts, Attorney D. A. Poland, representing Mrs. Ella Thomson, claimant to the property, was carried from the court room today. He was taken to his hotel. His condition is said to be critical.

Millionaire Flying Corps.

Paris, Jan. 28.—(U. N. S.)—A flying corps, composed exclusively of wealthy young Americans is being formed here with the approval of the military authorities, by Elliott Cowden of Grimmer Park, New York. The strength of the corps will be 32, every one of them a millionaire or an heir to millions.

ITALIAN SPAGHETTI

A favorite recipe for this delicious dish is as follows: One can tomato sauce, one tablespoon sugar, two tablespoons full of onion cut fine, two butter, two tablespoons salt, bit of bay leaf, sprig of parsley, pepper, corn, bay leaf—parley through a strainer. Add a little extract of beef if desired and add the flour. When well blended add the hot liquid and the sugar. Stir well, pour over the spaghetti which has previously been cooked, at serve with grated cheese. The spaghetti should be cooked in long strips rather than broken into short pieces. To accomplish this, hold the quantity to be cooked in the hand and dip the end into boiling water which has been lightly salted. As the spaghetti softens it will bend and may be coiled under the water. Cook spaghetti 30 minutes.
