YOUTH'S PROMISING CAREER CUT SHORT BY FATAL ACCIDENT

Tribute to Character of Walter H. Harris Jr., Paid by One of His Friends.

Walter H. Harris Jr., who was accidentally killed by the discharge of his own revolver Monday night, was a young man with very high ambitions. One of his intimate friends pays him the following tribute:

"He was very desirous of securing the best education possible, and did not consider it below his station to engage in any form of honest labor. As a mere youth he used to carry two milk routes and a paper route every evening and work in a grocery store on Saturday. Later he used to get up at 2 a. m. and carry his paper route over the burglarly settled community around his home. He arrived home at 7 a. m. and hastily ate his breakfast and was off to Washington high school. In the afternoon he often solicited for new subscribers and collected his bills and also put in many Saturdays in this manner. He studied evenings and often studied all night until time to carry his papers. He had just completed arrangements with an eastern firm to sell common household necessities as extracts, spices, soups, etc. because he found the remuneration from the route insufficient to meet his expenses.

"Walter was a boy full of national pride and honor and he joined the naval militia of the Washington high school because he wanted to know how to defend his country in case of war. He was running for senior lieutenant of his company and was bringing in new recruits in order that he might secure enough votes to be sure of the position. He planned to go to the Michigan law school and then to Columbia university, and then he hoped to work his way into the houses of congress, where he could help make clean laws for his country.
